LVFD gets grant for smoke alarms

300 alarms will be installed

in homes

The Livingston Volunteer Fire Department has received a grant to install amoke alarms in area homes that do not have working smoke alarms. The grant, which is overseen by the Kenneky Department for Public Health and the Kenneky Injury Prevention and Research Center at the Very March 1997 of the West Control and Prevention. In addition to receiving 300 smoke alarms, the fire department will receive fire safety educational materials and funding to help cover the expense of installing the alarms. McCool says that having the smoke alarms. McCool says that having the alarms installed by firefighten is a major part of the project. "The firefightes have to install the alarms to people, because they forget to put them up, and them just give alarms to people, because they forget to put them up, and they won't do any good unless they're installed. When the frefighters put them up, we know they're in place and working." Chief Stallsworth said that the firefighters are ready to dee he job. "We worked hard to get this grant and we're going to keep working to help protect the people in this community."

A Leash Law is defined as a dog having to be under the control of their master at all times when off the owner's property. Carloftis said.

At present, dogs have free rein during daylight hours but are suppoged to be kept up at night, except for hunting dogs. Of course, Carloftis

said, any dog, oft an owner's property, without a license, is subject to be picked up by the Dog Warden at any time, unless the owner has a kirsneo license. Most complaints are coming from the Brodhead area. (Carloftis said.

Board extends Superintendent's contract to 2007

After a three hour evaluation on Thursday night, Rockcastle County, School Superintendent Larry Hammond received another exten-sion on his contract. Hammond. 48, has been superin-

dent of the local school system for the past nine years and is in his 26th year of employment by the local

year of employment by the local school system.

He began his career with the local school system.

He began his career with the local school system when he accepted a job as an elementary teacher at the former Livingston School. From there he moved on to Rockeastle-High School, as a teacher in Industrial Technology. He was then hired at transportation director and later as Director of Student Services.

"I appreciate the board's confidence in me and some of the hard decisions me and my staff have had to make," he said. "I really appreciate the efforts put forth by the people

to make," he said. "I really appreciate the efforts put forth by the people who we work with on a daily basis," he said.

The Rockcastle school system employs over 500 people and ha a budget of \$23 million.

As, of course, the highest paid employee of the system, Hammond will earn just under \$93,000 in the next school year.

In other business, the board ap-proved guidelines to determine SBDM allocations for the upcoming school year. The guidelines are ba-sically the same as those used for the current school year, with one signifi-cant change.
