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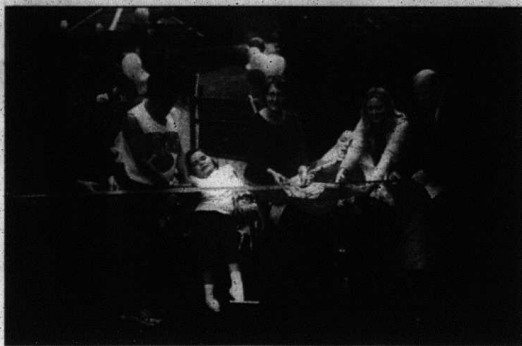

Local, state, national races on the ballot

Voters will decide next Tuesday on many issues

Tuesday is a very important day in the world when Americans will decide who leads the free world.

There will also be races for local offices and also a constitutional amendment on the ballot, which asks voters to approve or disapprove of same sex marriages.

Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Houk said Wednesday she expects a high turn-out from the 11,800 registered voters in Rockcastle County.

Mrs. Houk said she had received a larger number than usual absentee ballots and had more than the usual phone calls to her office, concerning where people vote.

Many voting booth locations in the county have been changed in recent years and those still on the voting register, showed simply call the clerk's office at 256-2831 to see where they are registered to vote, according to Mrs. Houk.

Besides the race for President, between incumbent George W. Bush and Senator John Kerry, local residents will have many choices to make.

Former Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette, who is now one of the Circuit Judges for Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln Counties, is facing a challenge from Scott Lawless, a Somerset attorney and a former assistant Pulaski County attorney.

Burdette served as Rockcastle County Attorney for ten years.

His assistant, Billy Reynolds, who was appointed to fill Burdette's unexpired term, is running unopposed for the county attorney's seat.

Other unopposed candidates are State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon, and U.S. Congressman Harold Rogers of Somerset.

Also unopposed are Rockcastle County School Board members, Chairman Terry Burton, Martin Vanzant and Mike Burdette.

Incumbent U.S. Senator Jim Bunning, who lives in Northern Kentucky is facing a stiff challenge from

Daniel Mongiardo, a Hazard doctor, who serves in the Kentucky legislature.

Long-time local district judge Mike Henry faces Rod Messer, a Circuit Judge in Laurel and Knox Counties for the third district Court of Appeals position which became vacant upon the retirement of R.W. Dyche of London.

There will also be races for city council seats in all local cities.

Al Mt. Vernon, incumbents Betty Carter Bussett, Wayne Bullock and Joe Mullins are seeking re-election. Former councilman Jackie Renner is also on the ballot, as is Shelley Raines Lewis.

Steve Renfro and Bryan Hansel did not seek re-election to the council.

There will also be two write-in candidates on the ballot in Mt. Vernon.

Sharon Saylor and current councilmember Loneta Daugherty are eligible for write-in votes.

Mrs. Houk said no other write-in votes will be counted and that either or both women could be elected over a candidate on the ballot.

In Broadhead, five people will fight for four seats on the council.

They are incumbents, Johnny Wilcox, Everett Albring and Larry Taylor; Jeff King and Rick D. Branham.

In Livingston, incumbents Ed C. McHargue, Charlie Newcomb, Katha Carpenter and Todd Mink are seeking re-election. Bobby Phelps and Bobby Propper are also seeking one of the four seats.

Constitutional Amendment

Number One will ask Kentucky voters whether they approve or disapprove of same sex marriages.

Voters should be aware, that if they vote no on the amendment, they are voting in support of same sex marriages.

A yes vote on the amendment is actually vote for the constitution amendment which enforces the ban on same sex marriages.

The amendment is only on the ballot because legislators wanted to make sure no such action happened in Kentucky.

According to Mrs. Houk, whose office is responsible for issuing marriage licenses in Rockcastle County, as it stands now, same sex marriages are not allowed.

U.S. Homeland Security Secretary Tom Ridge will be the keynote speaker at the Southern and Eastern Kentucky Summit of The Tennessee Valley Corridor.

The summit will deal with timely topics of homeland security and technology-based economic development.

The summit is being held Thursday and Friday, Nov. 4 and 5, at The Center for Rural Development in Somerset and will be hosted by Senator Hal Rogers. Rogers said that during the summit, he would have some announcements that will be of particular interest to the Fifth District.

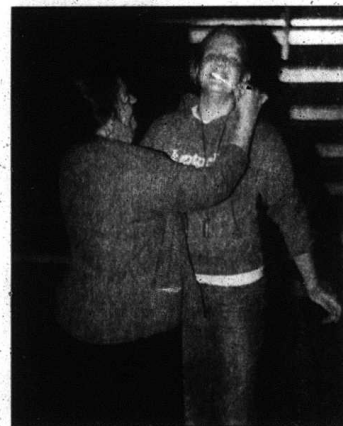
In federal court Miller pleads guilty to drug charges

Steven Wayne Miller, 37, of Orlando-pled guilty last week to manufacturing over 1,200 marijuana plants.

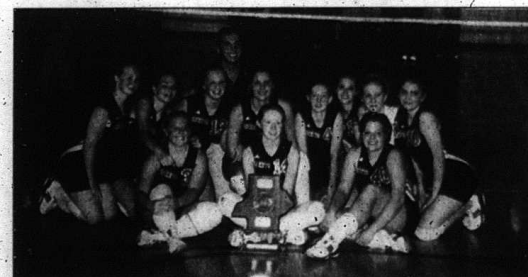
Miller agreed to surrender real property, a Honda ATV, utility trailer, heater, lights and scales, according to the U.S. Attorney's office.

"Let's count our blessings"

If you were a visitor to this country during this campaign season, and every previous one that I can remember, you would have thought America was on the brink of collapse. Office seekers sharing tales of woe, which were brought on by the incumbent. Incumbents telling us how dim the future will be unless they are re-elected. The rest of us are left to sort out for ourselves the true state of our nation. So, here's some sorting.

In the early 1990's, I was fortunate enough to study abroad for a summer. This young American was abruptly and unexpectedly introduced to the horror felt by Britain's who, with a group of friends innocently waiting in a train station one evening, alarms and sirens suddenly filled the station, followed quickly by dozens of police and other officials. Everyone was hurriedly directed toward the exits. Throngs of people began grabbing their bags, double-timing and running to escape. A bomb was report-

edly in the station. With the sirens and yells directing us out, I looked around my group and the only ones standing still after the initial few seconds were myself and my American friends, all with a "What the heck?" look on our faces. Four hours later, the all clear was given. A successful intervention or false alarm? I do not know. But, I do know the feeling of terror.

The Americans - Standing still. Never having known such a thing. Soon afterward, when the horror had passed, and so the "coolness" of what we had just experienced, I unexpectedly realized how fortunate I was to be an American. I lived in a country that kept its citizens safe from harm.

Times have changed. People hate us because of the very things we enjoy: freedom, love, prosperity, and liberty. Decades of swelling hatred finally combined with effective organization and financing and resulted in 9/11. But, even though we were attacked with a devastating affect, we do not live in daily fear. We don't send our children to school and fear they will be taken hostage and tortured. We don't go to work and pray that our building won't be car bombed. We drive along our highways, visit loved ones, take vacations, go to work, play in the parks, and attend sporting events in peace. We remain possibly the only country in which the sky is the limit to success and a safety net is in place when we fall. We are free to worship.

Chewing Tobacco Can Cause Cancer

Chewing tobacco has become more popular among school-aged athletes in recent years. Its use has increased considerably in young males as well as adult men. Professional athletes are often seen with a big chew in their cheek, free samples are given out at sporting events, and advertisements promoting its use are seen in sports magazines and in stadiums.



The nicotine in chewing tobacco is absorbed quickly and the amount a person gets is equal to smoking cigarettes. Although this nicotine may have a stimulating effect, it has not been shown to improve the skills of athletes.

Another reason for its popularity is that it has not acquired the stigma of causing cancer that cigarettes have. Yet it is known to be associated with a number of different forms of cancer, including cancers of the mouth, throat, larynx and esophagus. The chances of developing oral cancer are many times higher in men who chew. There are also reports that it is associated with cancer of the colon and bladder.

The risk of cancer is a big concern with so many people using it at younger ages - half of the users are under 19 - and it is usually harder to kick the habit of chewing than to quit smoking.

Using alcohol along with the tobacco will further increase the chance of developing cancers in the mouth and esophagus. For cancer of the esophagus, the combination of alcohol and tobacco increases the risk many-fold.

Chewing tobacco does cause cancer and even great athletes are not immune. Babe Ruth died of oral cancer.

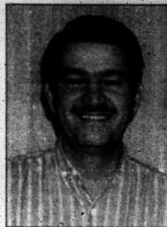
Willie Allen In Loving Memory

Dear Editor,

On November 2nd Kentucky's voters will vote to the polls and approve or reject a change to the state Constitution to define marriage as a union between one man and one woman and to mandate that no such legal status be given to unmarried individuals. The Kentucky Constitution does not currently define marriage. The Amendment (No. 1) will appear on the ballot as follows: Are you in favor of amending the Kentucky Constitution to provide that only a marriage between one man and one woman shall be a marriage in Kentucky, and that a legal status identical to or similar to marriage for

unmarried individuals shall not be valid or recognized?

A "YES" vote will change the Kentucky Constitution to define marriage in Kentucky as that between one man and one woman only. In addition, the proposed amendment would not allow legal recognition of same-sex marriages performed out of state. Kentucky would not allow legal status identical to or similar to marriage for unmarried individuals, such as civil unions, regardless of where they were performed.

This is an important issue where states are attempting to enact legislation to protect traditional marriage. A "YES" vote for Amendment No. 1 will do just that. This is an opportunity for the voice of Kentuckians to be heard. We, as a state, can protect marriage between one man and one woman by voting "YES" on Tuesday, November 2nd.

However, February 26th, Senator Bunning opposed a measure that would require safety standards for child safety devices on handgrips, voting against fellow senator Mitch McConnell.

However, when an amendment to Senator John McCain's bill, requiring criminal background checks on all firearms transactions came to a vote in March, Senator Bunning voted against it. He voted against it.

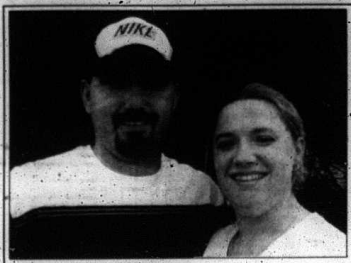


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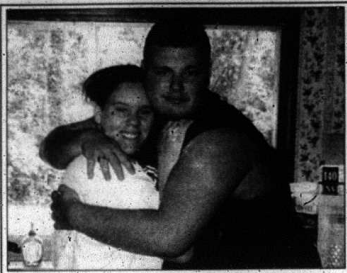

Female Athletes Face Higher Risk for Knee Injury

The second game was a thriller with the score tied twelve times before Arnold again served her team to the 25-21 win with the final four service points of the game.

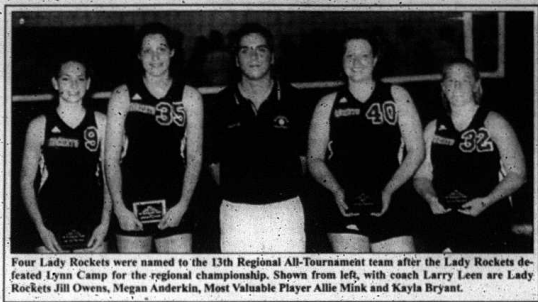
Arnold and Owens led for service honors in the game with eight points each, including two aces. Not Arnold and six aces for Owens and Arnold added two kills.

"We are going to have to improve on our mistakes this week against Knox Central and especially as we head into the play-offs," Larkey added.

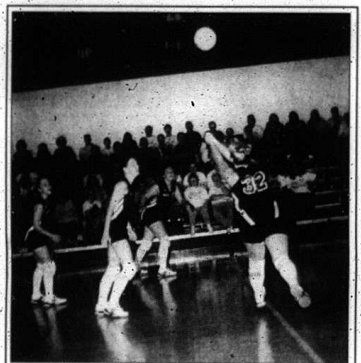
Besides all the penalties, the Rocket offense had a non-traditional Rocket performance, fumbling the football away twice and they also had an interception.

Not a good tournament

I dreaded going to the volleyball regional tournament at Lynn Camp last week. It's a small gym, all the seating is on one side and the Lynn Camp Lady Wildcats were picked to win after holding sway over the rockets in their two matches during regular season. Guess what? I was right.

Things went along very well the first two nights. The Rockets easily handled Bell and Whitley counties. However, Thursday night, all fears were realized. To begin with, Rocket fans were surrounded by adult Lynn Camp fans on their right and the Lynn Camp student section on the left. We wound up sitting up against the student section and we should have moved — immediately.

Our fans, sitting next to the student section in the first few rows, got to see the bare orange-painted backs of several male Lynn Camp students for most of the night instead of the action on the left side of the court.

After the Lynn Camp players were introduced, during which several Rocket fans applauded (a common courtesy), and while the Rockets were being introduced, Lynn Camp students set up a "Let's Go Wildcats" chant in an attempt to drown out the Rockets' introduction. My son-in-law took care of that situation immediately and effectively.

Taking absolutely nothing from the Lady Rockets who played the best first game of the season, the Wildcats seems intimidated, confused and out of rhythm.

As a footnote, the Rockets play Friday at 3 p.m. at the Frankfort Convention Center and, guess what? we get to play the winner of the 7th Region again. This time it is Assumption who is ranked first in the state and third in the nation. Last year, it was Sacred Heart, the eventual winner of the tournament, and they were ranked fifth in the nation.



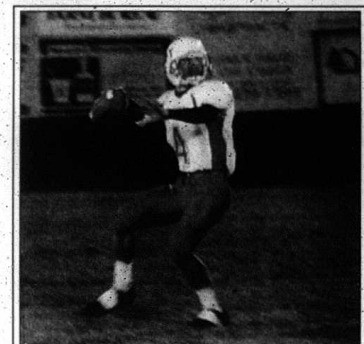

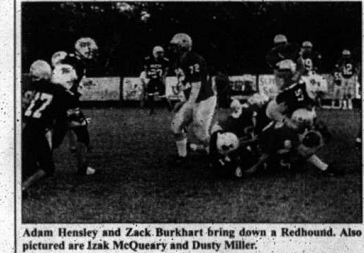

The RCHS cross-country teams recently competed at the Pulaski County Invitational held at G.E. Field in Somerset. Several of the state's top ranked teams competed, most notably host Pulaski County High School and Bishop Brossart.

The RCHS girls' team moved up to third place in the Kentucky Prep Class 2A State ranking with an awesome team performance. At the meet, the girls took four of the top six positions and had five in the top fifteen. RCHS defeated Pulaski County, ranked 10th in Class 3A, by two points to take the team title. Bishop Brossart, ranked fourth in Class A, finished third overall. The most amazing thing about the RCHS girls' team to date is its youthful composition. The average grade level of the seven-member team is 7.7, or just under eighth grade.

Kayla Hayes led RCHS with an awesome performance. Kayla finished in third place overall with an impressive effort of 20:48. Jessi Asher ran an exceptional race as well and finished fourth overall with a tremendous effort of 21:18. The girls actually took the top six spots in the race. Kayla Hayes led the way for Rockcastle and won for the second time in as many chances at Mercer County, site of the Class 2A Region IV Championships. Michaela Hunter ran an awesome race and placed second overall. Laura Dollins ran very close to Michaela and placed third. Jessi Asher ran well and finished fourth overall. 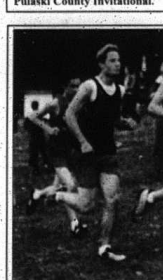

Planning for a safe Election Day

On November 2nd, millions of Kentuckians will head to a church, firehouse, school, or other polling location to exercise one of our most fundamental rights -- the right to vote. I am optimistic that we will see participation in this election at higher levels than we have seen in over a decade.

As we go to the polls, we continue to be affected by the events of September 11, 2001, and every day we must be vigilant and aware of the changed environment around us. Election Day is unfortunately no exception.

Our friends in Spain discovered this a few months ago with the successful attempt to affect the outcome of their elections. As a result, some have speculated that similar attempts to disrupt Election Day here in the United States might occur.

While these fears are understandable, my office has not received any information about credible threats to Kentucky or any polling site in the country.

Still we must remain cautious and prepared for any unforeseen circumstance that may face our Commonwealth on Election Day.

That's why since early summer, representatives from my office, the Kentucky State Board of Elections, the Kentucky Department of Homeland Security, and other agencies have been meeting to develop a plan for the unlikely event of a disruption on Election Day. During these discussions, we determined that existing laws provided a good framework for how to react to such a disruption.

We also developed a coordinated communications plan for all agencies that might be involved on Election Day. Local county sheriffs serve on their county board of elections and will be able to share information with our State Board of Elections and other law enforcement officials.

Furthermore, I will be at the State Board of Elections monitoring the

day's proceedings, while a representative from my office will be present at the State's Emergency Operations Center. We are confident that communications in the event of any Election Day disruption will be managed in an effective manner.

The goal of this plan is to provide a fair and honest election in the safest way possible. Our hope is that voters will not notice any difference from any past Election Days.

We will continue to evaluate any possible threats to the election process and what response may be required. We will remain in constant communication with local elections officials, and just recently, sent them a memorandum discussing existing election laws that they might find helpful on Election Day.

Kentuckians can rest easy on Election Day, knowing that we are well prepared for this election. On November 2, I urge you to join your fellow Americans at the polls and exercise your right to vote.

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

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"It is Written"

October is End Domestic Violence Month. In America, Domestic Violence is a serious problem that affects all levels of society. Domestic violence cuts across all racial, religious, educational, and socioeconomic lines. Studies indicate that over two million women per year are assaulted by their partners. In addition, studies indicate that there are over 835,000 men who are victims of domestic violence.

Nearly one quarter of the women in America—more than 12 million—will be abused by their partner at some during their lives.

FBI statistics indicate that 30% of women who were murdered in 1999 were killed by their intimate partners. Some studies report the following findings:

22-25% of women seeking care in emergency rooms are there because of domestic violence.

25% of women who attempt suicide are victims of domestic violence.

45-60% of mothers of abused children have been victims of domestic violence.

Domestic Violence is always about power and control and takes many forms. Physical abuse is the most obvious. But domestic violence

usually begins as verbal/emotional abuse, put-downs, name calling, attacks on self-esteem. Psychological abuse involves threats, intimidation, weapons placed in sight, suicidal behavior, etc. Isolation is a form of abuse in which the abuser controls who one has as a friend, monitors phone calls, moves victim away from family, keeps victim from going to church or other social events. Other forms abuse includes sexual abuse and economic abuse.

Domestic Violence is a community problem and it takes a community to stop it. Action must be taken at all levels of society to stop domestic violence. Police officers and Officers of the court must recognize the signs and take swift action against the perpetrator while protecting the victims. Doctors, Nurses, EMT & ER workers must consistently report suspicious injuries. Schoolteachers and administrators, church pastors, social workers must all be aware of the signs of domestic violence and take appropriate actions.

Each member of society must become more aware of this very serious problem and insist on strong community action to end domestic violence.



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Agricultural News

It's Official
On October 22, 2004 President Bush signed the American Jobs Creation Act of 2004, which included the Fair and Equitable Tobacco Reform, commonly referred to as the Tobacco Buyout Bill.

Under this legislation, payments will be made to tobacco quota holders and producers effective with the 2005 crop. Quota holders will receive a \$7 per pound payment based on the basic quota at the 2002 marketing year level. Producers of quota tobacco will receive a \$3 per pound payment based on their share of risk in producing the 2002, 2003, or 2004 crop. Payments will be made in 10 equal installments beginning in 2005 and ending in 2014. Signup for the program is expected to begin in early 2005 at local FSA county offices.

At this time FSA is not prepared to advise producers of payments as Federal regulations and program policies and procedures are being drafted and developed to be finalized over the next several months. FSA will continue to administer the 2004 tobacco crop with marketing and price support programs in effect through the end of the applicable kind of tobacco marketing season, September 30, 2005.

Warehouse Designation
As a condition of price support of burley tobacco producers are required to inform FSA of the ware-

house where they will market tobacco. This is required by completing the form FSA-808, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold.

The regular re-designation schedule is as follows:
November 1, 2004 through November 5, 2004

November 29, 2004 through December 3, 2004

January 3, 2005 through January 7, 2005

January 31, 2005 through February 4, 2005

During re-designation periods marketing cards will be effective 10 days after the re-designation period ends.

The warehouse number will be indicated with a number on the marketing card and if a producer decides to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the card, the producer must return the card to the FSA office in a specific time period to request another marketing card.
