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Community Trust gives property to **Brodhead**

Rockcastle County's Community Trust Bank has made a land donation to the City of Brodhead.

The city recently received a deed from Community Trust for a four to five acre parcel of property located on Hwy. 150 (Main Street), which the bank had gotten back because of a bad loan.

The land is the former Simpson Feed Mill, which had been to sold to someone else, some years ago.

"The city of Brodhead had inquired about the property for the purpose of putting in a city park because they had acquired some other property adjacent to it and we were more than willing to help them out," said Mike Blount Area Market President for Community Trust.

"Community Trust is proud to be a part of this future city park and happy to donate the land for them to use," he added.

Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash said the other property in the area, which is across Dix River, next to the property donated by Community Trust, was purchased from the Russell Bullock heirs for \$18,200.

Cash said Jeff King owner of Eastern Kentucky Recycling, and a Brodhead resident, will dismantle the feed mill for the sheet metal and that the city will advertise for bids to cleanup both pieces of property. Cash said there are some abandoned buildings on the other piece of property, which also is about four acres.

The Mayor said the city would work to obtain state and/ or federal grants to fund construction of the new city park.

Cash said the short term goal of the Brodhead council was to have the property ready for the annual Memorial Day weekend homecoming. "We've got the same carnival coming that was at the Little World's Fair last year and we want to put them

Local woman dies in single car accident on Saturday

Funeral services were held Wednesday for a Rockcastle County woman who died in a single car accident on North Wilderness Road, sometime Saturday afternoon.

Kentucky State Trooper Staci Walker, said Regina Gaye Morgan, 37, of Old Sigmon Loop, was found dead in the wreckage of her 1998 Honda Civic around 1:30 p.m., after a passing motorist saw the car upside down in a branch that leads to Roundstone Creek.

Walker said Morgan was traveling south when she left the road, crossed the northbound lane and traveled 354 feet before hitting a small bridge embankment on the side of the road.

"The impact from the crash caused her car to flip and she was partially ejected from the vehicle through the back window," Walker said. The state trooper said there were no witnesses to the actual crash and that there was no skid marks on the highway or any indication of brakes being applied before the impact.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell pronounced Morgan dead at the scene around 2 p.m. Dowell said Morgan had apparently been dead for only a short period of time.

Dowell, who ordered an au-

Gasoline vapors in dental office cause several days off

You may have noticed in the past year that the dentist office of Dr. John Parsons on Main Street in Mt. Vernon has been closed a lot more than in past years. A whole lot more than the normal days off, since the office was opened in 1979.

Gasoline vapors inside the building are to blame for the 21 days Dr. Parsons has had to close his office since June 4th of last year. But gas vapor prob-

"In 1994 we noticed a heavy gasoline odor in the office and, even though there had been gasoline odors in the building before this time it was unbearable," Parsons recalls. The dentist said he also had sewer problems at the same time.

Dr. Parsons said that when he had a plumber come to repair the sewer line, the plumber

In the very near future some of Rockcastle County's elected officials, mainly members of the fiscal court, will have some tough decisions to make -- or not make.

For whatever my opinion is worth, I think planning and zoning in the county is needed in some form. I think it can be done without some of the outrageous and ridiculous regulations other cities and counties in Kentucky have adopted and, if it is kept simple and above board, it will no doubt benefit the county as a whole.

It will only increase land value and it should help Rockcastle become more attractive to prospective employers and other businesses that have always looked elsewhere when wanting to expand their businesses or make a new investment.

It would only make sense for the county to adopt a Land Use Master Plan and implement planning and zoning as a whole, which would bring in all three cities.

Jason Proctor identified that course very well in his letter to the editor last week. A course that has left Rockcastle probably the least developed and furthest behind economically among the counties along Kentucky's I-75 corridor.

Proctor was being nice and although I don't know about all the counties north of Scott County on I-75, every county from Scott County to Whitley County is definitely much more developed than Rockcastle. They have much more to offer their residents and overall they have a better quality of life.

Some would and will argue that the quality of life in our county is fine and in many ways it is. Certainly the quality of people living here, make it much better than in many areas, but just because you live in a friendly county, doesn't mean that things couldn't be

Just ask your neighbor who gets up every morning at 4 a.m., buys a half tank of gas for \$35 and drives an hour or longer to work.

Ask the same man, who returns home 12 to 13 hours later, if he is lucky, and loads up his family for a night out at the skating rink, bowling alley, movie theatre and/or restaurant in another town, after he has put another \$35 worth of gas in his vehicle.

The price of gas alone is making it tough on just about everyone, especially that hard

working man or woman who has to make their living elsewhere but who wants to raise their family in this county.



Rockcastle Memories The Northern Lights By David J. Griffin

Have you ever seen the Aurora Borealis, commonly called the Northern Lights? It has been my good fortune to see the phenomenon twice in my 60 plus years. Once you witness this dazzling, dancing, curtain of light you will never forget the experience.

The amazing display of green, yellow, orange, or red flickering ribbon of light fills the sky and then fades away after a short time. My first experience of such a sight was in the early 50's while living on our small farm in Rockcastle



was slowly waving back and forth and appeared to expand in all directions. Finally, it simply faded away. I had not witnessed anything like this in my young eight years and was surprised to find that neither had my mother or my grandparents.

The aurora is most usually seen in the late night or early morning northern sky. Also it is most often viewed when the sky is clear and the air is chilly. Most sightings are witnessed in February, March, and October. One source stated that the lights often occur when the moon is new because the sky is dark during this phase.

The spectacle of the Northern Lights occurs because highenergy particles (ions) radiate from the surface of the sun at tremendous rates of speed. The stream of plasma is known as solar wind. When these particles collide with the gasses in the earth's ionosphere, they begin to glow – the exhibition that we know as the Aurora Borealis. This display can cause interference with television broadcasts and satellite communications.

My second sighting of the Northern Lights occurred in February of 1992. My wife and I were watching a basketball game in our home with our friend Larry Jefferson. Following the game, he left our house on Furnace Mountain to return to his own home. We calmly straightened up the living room and started upstairs to bed when, all of a sudden, there was a hard pounding at our door. It seemed so frantic that it startled

I cautiously opened the door to find Larry back on our doorstep. He nearly pushed his way inside, racing toward the back door saying, "You have to come out on your deck and see the sky!" We quickly followed him to the back deck and proceeded to witness a most spectacular appearance of the Northern Lights. They were flickering all over the northern sky with an eerie glow of red and green. It didn't last very long - or at least it doesn't seem do in my memory. We watched until it slowly began to dissipate.



paid, on some occasions, to be an instigator and a rabble rouser, but mostly I've just followed my nose and tried to tune into the difference between right and wrong----to do good and avoid evil----and that's not usually an easy call to make. It's never black and white on any political issue. It's always trying to figure out the proper shade of gray.

Last summer, just when I'd decided to lay down my hatchet and settle into a life of writing poetry and perhaps the next great American novel, I had a call from a much younger friend who convinced me that I should give some thought to working for Habitat for Humanity of Madison and Clark Counties before I made like an old cowboy and hung my reins.

"You are only 59 years old," she yelled. "You can't quit now!"

Actually quitting was not even on my mind. I imagined myself actually starting to live the life that I'd always dreamed of. You know, Jesse Stuart, Harry Caudill, John Fox, Jr., Janice Holt Giles, Bobbie Ann Mason, James Still and that crowd of acclaimed writers. I was thinking to myself that it was high time I did a decent piece of writing and join the halls of the acclaimed.

And then I was reminded that most of that crowd started when they were closer to 19 than 59. And that they had actually done some decent before they reached puberty. Unfortunately the stuff I wrote on the walls of the boy's restroom stalls at Letcher High is yet unpublished.

"Only 59" is not relevant in some circles. Suffice to say that it's not an ideal beginning point to launch a career wherein one intends to become a best- selling writer. And so, foreswearing fame and fortune as a writer, I signed on to Habitat for Humanity of Madison and Clark Counties as the fellow in charge of convincing my neighbors that our cause is more than worthwhile.

Here's what I know to be factual. Not many low income families can afford to own their own homes. Those who want to and are willing to work for it ought to be able to do just that. Kids who live in safe, decent, affordable housing that they can call their own do far, far better in school than those who don't. Parents who own their own homes fare far better in the workplace than those who don't. Habitat for Humanity helps solve those problems for families willing to work for a better way of life.

Starting on April 4th and ending on April 11th the 84 Lumber Co Store in Richmond will donate a framing board to our Habitat for Humanity affiliate for every caller who makes a donation to WEKU, the public radio station out of Eastern Kentucky University. It takes, on average, 360 planks including 2x4, 2X6 and 2X8 along with 40 sheets of plywood to frame a habitat house. We aim to raise enough support through WEKU to frame two houses over the next two weeks.

I can't take much credit for this, but it is community development at it's best and I'm oh so glad to be a part of it. All I can tell you is that I have WEKU playing classical music in the background as I write this piece and you can to anytime you simply google up the station and click on play live. If you live in Richmond, just

tune in to 88.9---you London-Corbin readers can listen into 88.5; that'll be 96.1 in Barbourville, 95.1 in Pikeville/Whitesburg: 90.9 Hazard/Whitesburg---all the same station but coming off different towers.

My next move is to try to get WMMT in Whitesburg to ask its listeners to tune into WEKU if they want some classical music and get WEKU to return the favor if they want some genuine mountain funk and pretty soon we'll have the two stations dominating the region, as they should. And in the meantime, we'll get some homes built for some kids who will be way better off than they would without us. And if you don't shop at 84 Lumber when you need a 2X4, don't be coming to me and complaining that you got ripped off at you know

Aurora Borealis to be visible this far south of the Arctic Circle. According to one source, people who live in the southern United States will only see the lights a few times in a given century. The best place in the states to witness the light show is near Fairbanks, Alaska. Two specific places are listed as the best viewing in that area. The first is near Cripple Creek off the Parks Highway just outside of Fairbanks. The other is at Chena Hot Springs Resort also near Fairbanks.

In 1994, my wife and I drove to Alaska and visited both of these areas. Unfortunately, we were not there at the time of the year when

one would see the aurora. I will have to say, though, that traveling to Alaska would be worth the effort just to see such awesome displays as they witness there.

The University of Alaska Fairbanks has a website (www.gedds.alaska.edu) that publishes a daily forecast of the probability of the Aurora's viewing. It not only lists the time of the day, but also gives a region where the event will most likely be visible. We also visited that university while in Fairbanks and saw some video of the most spectacular sightings during that particular time.

Late winter or early spring seems to be a great time to witness the Aurora. So for the next several weeks, I will be carefully watching the northern night sky from my deck on Furnace Mountain. Images of the northern lights are significantly more common today due to the use of digital photography. If you are fortunate enough to witness the show, a wide-angle lens and a sturdy tripod will be needed. The shutter should be left open for approximately 20 seconds.

If you should happen to see a view of the northern lights around here, I beg of you to let me know. (We had one a few years ago and I missed it!) Then let me know if you got some good photographs.

Judge Burdette presides with proficiency...

Dear Mt. Vernon Signal Editor: I write regarding Circuit Court Judge Jeff Burdette who serves Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski counties.

As a citizen interested in the function of my government I recently had the opportunity to observe Judge Burdette in the courtroom. Since citizens of Kentucky collectively choose judges in elections, and since many busy citizens do not have the opportunity to observe all public servants, I wish to share my observations.

As a whole I felt that Judge Burdette truly exemplified himself with outstanding proficiency, mediation skills and concern.

First, Judge Burdette proficiently moved along the numerous motions and cases he had on his docket that day. One reality of the court system is that judges often hear dozens of motions on varying subjects in a single day. An additional reality is that court cases often languish for years, sometimes because parties ignore legal

deadlines for extended periods. Judge Burdette was most proficient in enforcing the legal time limits for various issues. For example, if a party had exceeded the thirty day limit for answering written questions from an opposing party, Judge Burdette had a prepared order on his desk giving the party 10 or so additional days and he signed the order in the courtroom. By doing this as opposed to requiring the complaining party prepare an order, mail it and then wait for it to be signed - he moved the case forward.

Second, I feel that Judge Burdette showed excellent mediation skills in a divorce case involving a disputed house. Judge Burdette attempted to explain to both parties what the probable results would be if a full hearing had to be heard, and how they could save both themselves and the legal system an extended dispute. Although the final decision was left to the parties involved, Judge Burdette both moved the case along and did a good job of positioning himself as a neutral arbiter.

Third, and perhaps most significantly, I was truly impressed that Judge Burdette went the extra mile for a case involving child welfare. Judge Burdette took extra time out of his schedule to call the employer of a mother who was possibly leaving her child home unattended when she went to work. He also put the mother of the child under oath and inquired about the status of the child. His dedication and concern in this case stood out, especially in contrast to his efficient style in other motions.

There are many other impor-

tant functions a Judge performs. I did not, for example, have the opportunity to observe the quality of Judge Burdette's technical rulings, his willingness to be bound by laws that he may disagree with, or his understanding of proper evidence. (Nor will I comment on that goatee!) However, of the actions I saw, I was truly impressed.

noticed that there was raw gasoline in the commode in the staff restroom.

His building was evacuated for a week and the sewer line was dug up. The line collapsed and gasoline was in both the ditch the line ran in, as well as the sewer line. "Since the sewer line from B&F Gulf connected to the line to my office, I could only assume that the gasoline came from there," Parsons said.

Parsons said he reported the problem to the state and got little or no help and that gasoline fumes were still prevalent in the office.

The local dentist said he continued to call Frankfort and, at some point, someone from the state finally showed up at his office.

Parsons said the official from the state confirmed that there were gasoline smells in his office and as far away as the sewer treatment plant by the hospital, but that there was still not much done.

In 1996 the underground storage tanks at the former B&F Gulf, which was located above Parsons' office, were taken up, by order of the state and one of the tanks had a hole in it that had been leaking for a long time, Parsons said.

Monitoring wells were placed around the site and high levels of benzene, and other cancer-causing chemicals that are part of the chemical makeup of gasoline, were found in the groundwater.

"We thought this would get rid of the vapors inside my office, but it didn't. In fact, they increased, but this time there was good response from the Underground Storage Tank Branch Emergency Response Team out of London (USTB)," Parsons said.

Parsons said he thought part of the reason for the good response was the fact that the monitoring wells were still showing high levels of benzene, toluene, ethyl-benzene and xylene (commonly referred to as BTEX) in the ground water. "All of these, particularly benzene are highly carcinogenic," he said.

Parsons said the problems persisted and the USTB came to invesigate every time he called them. "My employees were complaining with headaches, nausea, rapid heart rates and dizziness and it just kept getting worse," Parsons said.

On June 4th of last year, Parsons and his staff went to work but were unable to stay in the office because of the gasoline odor. Parsons called the USTB and sent his employees home. The USTB responded quickly and arranged to do air samples inside his office the next day.

"The samples revealed benzene levels in the ambient air in my office at more than 24 times the accepted level for chronic exposure and I had to close my office for that whole week," he said.

Later on in June, a contractor hired by the state was at Parsons' building and dug up the parking lot behind his office. "It had been determined that so much gasoline had leaked from B&F Gulf that a great deal remained in the ground. They did not find the flow pattern, but they did find that the dirt and gravel they excavated was heavy with gasoline odor," Parsons said.

Since that time. Parsons has had to close his office on 21 separate occasions, with the most recent coming just two weeks ago. "Changes in temperature, barometic pressure changes and rain affesct the odors and vapors in the office," Parsons went on to say.

Other businesses and buildings on Main Street, including the *Signal* building, are now being affected too.

The USTB has been in Mt. Vernon more than 25 times this year and, as of last week, the clean-up is being handled by the State of Kentucky's EPA Emergency Response Team.

"They are now assessing the site and plan to move a contractor onto the property this week," Parsons said.

"All of the people who work with me, including myself, who have to work in this environment are very afraid. Benzene is what scares us the most because it is a very virulent carcinogen and we have been exposed to it for fifteen to twenty years at high levels. I have had two employees quit work because they are concerned for their health and the two employees that remain, and I, are also concerned," Parsons said.

Parsons said he estimates that he has had to close his office more than 50 times since 1994 because of the gasoline odors and that ambient air samples inside his office still show very high levels of benzene.

"We never know what we are coming into when we enter the office to work and, of those 21 days missed since June of last year, 14 of them have been since January 1st," he added.

In doing their assessment this week, the state will be attempting to confirm the source of the spill and Parsons says they will be doing whatever is necessary to clean up the site.

"I certainly welcome that, but myself and all of those who have worked here are concerned for our future health. Benzene causes many types of cancers, particularly those affecting the blood. We all feel like we are living "under the gun" for the rest of our lives. Cancer is a scary word," Parsons said.

of beauty in our county, there are also signs of the fact that we HAVE NOT done anything to plan for how land will be used in our county.

with no Currently, countywide land use master plan, basically any company or any business could locate anywhere without having to be accountable to any governing body. And while, on the surface, you might think that is great, ask the people in our neighboring Laurel County how they felt when an asphalt plant was located in the middle of a residential subdivision because there was no planning and zoning. The fact is we could have any number of undesirable or inappropriate businesses locate in our downtowns, in our neighborhoods or on some of our most prime agricultural land if we do not develop a plan for how Rockcastle County's land should be used to best meet the needs of our residents and land One of the other great ben-

efits of planned land use and planning and zoning is increased property values. With increased land values, landowners gain greater resale value for their properties. And, while there might be minor changes in taxes due, it also creates a stronger climate for community economic development because people outside of the county, looking for opportunities to invest in a new business, will know their investment will be protected because there are regulations on how land will be used adjacent or contiguous to their property. So, if I am a new business or industry, I know that if I invest millions of dollars in the development of a piece of property, I know that investment will be protected because of planned land use.

Another great benefit of planned land use and planning and zoning is the "map" it creates for the development of the infrastructure in Rockcastle County. Currently, because we have no plan for land use, we might not always make the best

long-term decisions regarding the development of water lines, sewer lines, electric service and road improvements and development. With planned land use in place, it is much easier to determine how utilities will be developed in the county and the three cities to meet the long-term needs of county businesses and residents.

When Rockcastle County is making application for grant funds, to both state and federal funding agencies for infrastructure and economic development projects assistance, the availability of planned land use and planning and zoning helps us be ranked as a stronger investment in the economy of Kentucky.

Finally, planned land use and planning and zoning will be developed and overseen with input from the entire county as the plans are created. As we continue to move forward with the plan, all residents of Rockcastle County will be given the opportunity to voice their opinion on what is appropriate to ensure that our plan will best serve the people of the county while at the same time creating an environment for progressive development to occur.

We have a beautiful county in Rockcastle, but we want to keep it that way. And, we want to make sure we create the environment for community economic development to occur now and for many years to come.

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Faith Chapel Pentecostal Church was est. in 1994

On September 28, 1994, 30 Christians established the Faith Pentecostal Church at Burr, making it one of the youngest churches in the county.

Church members, mostly from the Fairground Hill Holiness Church in Mt. Vernon, purchased the building they now call home from the Bible Baptist Church, after Bible Baptist outgrew the building and had to build a new one in Mt. Vernon. Bible Baptist built the church building in 1966 and 1967, according to Bible Baptist member Oscar Fain.

Pastor Virgil Bustle said founding members paid \$70,000 for the building and Mrs. Bessie Bustle, Virgil's wife, said the church was named Faith Chapel for a reason.

'We didn't have any money so we had to purchase the church on credit with the Faith

that we could pay the debt off," Mrs. Bustle said.

And their faith certainly paid off as members of the church were able to retire the debt in just four years.

Church secretary Peggy Falin said church members have also made many improvements to the structure since it was purchased, including all new pews, a kitchen in the basement, which also got new tile, a new bathroom upstairs, enlarged pulpit area and a spiral staircase for the downstairs, which made for a second exit in and out of the basement, eliminating a fire

Besides the weekly offering, a lot of the improvements were paid for with church fundraisers and most of the work was done by members of the church.

Falin estimated the cost of the improvements at approximately \$30,000. The pews alone cost around \$20,000.

Faith Chapel Pentecostal, has approximately 70 members with an average attendance of 35, is located on South Wilder-



About 80 percent of the sodium, the part of salt that we should avoid, comes from processed and preprepared foods. So that food on your plate may already have plenty of salt.

Research shows that eating less than 2,300 milligrams of sodium (about 1 teaspoon of salt) per day may reduce the risk of high blood pressure. Americans eat at about 30 percent to 50 percent more sodium that the recommended teaspoon each day.

By looking at food labels, you can see how easy it is to eat too much sodium. Some of the highest sources of sodium in the US diet are listed below with the amount of sodium in one serving:

Fried Chicken dinner, frozen, 1600 (milligrams sodium): Sub sandwich, 6" cold cuts 1600;

Fried Shrimp, 6-8, 1400; Chili con carne, canned,1100; Ham, cured, 1000 Chicken pot pie, frozen, 1000

Bacon Cheeseburger, 1000






Relationships Can Be Addictive

1. Addiction is a compulsive drive toward a substance or person. It is one thing to choose to be with another person but quite another to feel a compulsion that drives one toward that person.

2. Addiction produces panic

3. Addiction causes withdrawal symptoms when the object of the addiction is gone. Someone who leaves an abusive relationship may go through actual physical withdrawal while she recovers from her addiction.

4. After the mourning period is over there is often a feeling of liberation or achievement because the addict has beaten the addiction.

Victims of domestic violence do not enjoy being abused but may stay in an abusive relationship for many reasons, including fear, financial dependency and lack of support to escape. They may also stay because they are addicted to the abuser. Leaving him is just as difficult as the alcoholic quitting drinking or the pain pill addict going without his "medication.'

In his book on addiction to a person, Halpern lists some signs of addiction that an individual can look for in himself or her-

1. Though your objective mind tells you that the relationship is bad for you, you still are unable to leave and stay away.

2. The reasons you give for staying in the relationship do not make sense when examined

3. When you think about leaving, you feel a terror and emptiness inside that makes you cling even harder to the other


4. When you try to end it, you suffer withdrawal symptoms, such as insomnia, headaches, stomach pain and other physical symptoms.


5. When you think the relationship is over, you feel lost, alone and empty, possibly accompanied by a sense of free-

An addict does not feel complete by herself but needs someone or something else in order to feel whole. This other person or substance becomes the center of the addict's life, because it seems to fill the hole that she has inside. There is a massive downside to her addiction, however, because the addiction itself may destroy her. The unending search for another high requires her to keep seeking her drug and makes her use whatever means necessary to find it, including actions harmful to herself and/or oth-

In a relationship she may put up with horrible abuse in order to get the occasional high from feeling that he "completes" her. The highs become fewer and farther between, and the pain comes more often. Finally her self-esteem is ruined and her energy is spent. She finds herself trapped in an abusive relationship that she does not understand and does not know how to end.

"What Is Written"

The past few weeks we have been talking about the importance of taking things in context, let's look at another example today In John 15:1-2 we read, "I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman. Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away: and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit." Now here is how this passage is misapplied by some, in trying to uphold and endorse human denominationalism. Jesus is the vine, and the branches are the various churches. Here is a branch, and it is the Methodist Church, here is another branch on the vine and it is the Presbyterian Church, here is another branch and it is the Baptist Church, etc. They are all going in a different direction, but still each is connected to the vine -Jesus. This may sound good, and give comfort to denominational thinking, but the context of John 15 will not allow this explanation of the text. If you will notice in verse 6, "If a man abide not in me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered; and men gather them, and cast them into the fire, and they are burned." The branch is not a church, but a **man**! Individuals are what Jesus said the branches were.



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

Livestock Programs

Are you a rancher or livestock producer of Rockcastle County?

Did you suffer feed losses due to a natural disaster such as drought in 2005 or 2007?

If so, you may be eligible to receive benefits through the Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) being offered by the U-S Department of Agricul-

Have you already received the LCP payment for 2005 but think you had a greater feed loss in 2007? If so sign up again-you may be eligible for additional money.

Did you suffer livestock losses due to a natural disaster such as excessive heat in 2007? If so, you may be eligible to receive benefits through the

Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) being offered by the U-S Department of Agriculture.

At this time no deadline has been established for these pro-

Crop Disaster Program

The Crop Disaster Program (CDP) provides benefits to farmers who suffered quantity and quality losses from natural disasters and related conditions that happened in 2005, 2006 and for 2007 crops if the crop was planted or prevented from being planted before December 31, 2007.

Only producers who obtained crop insurance coverage or coverage under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for the year of loss will be eligible for CDP benefits. Producers must have suffered quantity losses in excess of 35 percent to be eligible for CDP.

At this time no deadline has been established for this program.

Dairy Program

Are you a dairy producer who suffered a loss in milk production during 2005 or 2007 due to a natural disaster?

If so, you may be eligible to receive benefits through the Dairy Disaster Assistance Payment Program (DDAP-III). DDAP-III applications will be accepted through May 5, 2008.

Dairy producers shall provide production evidence for 2003 through the year of disaster signup and submit the average number of dairy cows in the herd during each applicable calendar year in which benefits are being requested.

Dairy operations are eligible to apply for and receive payments for all years that the county office has a disaster designation on file, therefore; dairy producers of Rockcastle County are eligible for both

2005 and 2007.

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
