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Two jailed for stealing 80 Lortab

A man and woman, accused of stealing 80 Lortabs from a Orlando man on September 11th, are still being held in the Rockcastle County Detention Center under a \$10,000 cash bond each.

According to Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds, Jonathan S. Northern, 29, of Village Street, London and a companion, Angela Newcomb Medley, 25, of Livingston, are accused of stealing the Lortabs from Edward McGuire, who lives on Big Cave Road, when the two went to his home on the 11th.

Reynolds said Medley apparently knew where the pills were kept and, when McGuire went to a bedroom to put clothes on, Northern took the pills from McGuire's medicine bottle which he kept in the

Reynolds said Medley told McGuire she would get the pills back from Northern, after McGuire found the empty pill bottle, but instead, Medley left with Northern in a vehicle.

When Northern and Medley were first arrested, they were placed under a \$25,000 cash bond, which was reduced on October 1st to the current \$10,000.

Both defendants have a December 1st court date, to see if they are indicted by the Rockcastle Grand Jury.

There was less money for mortgage payments, credit card payments, car payments and even food. Then the price of food went up because it took more money to transport food to the locations where it was sold at a much higher price.

Causes of Alzheimer's Disease Presented by Dr. George W. Griffith

What causes Alzheimer's disease? People have blamed neredity, aluminum cooking bowls, viruses, and numerous other

Many comments have been made about the possibility of aluminum causing Alzheimer's. Yet, there are no studies that



show that aluminum plays a role, and most experts state that there is absolutely no need to worry about using aluminum cooking bowls or aluminum-containing medicines and deodorants. Nor have other chemicals been proven to be a cause.

Alzheimer's Disease is definitely not the same as aging, although increasing age is the biggest known risk factor. The older a person gets, the more likely he

will develop Alzheimer's.

The brain can maintain its capabilities throughout life much better than most other organs in the body. For a person who does not get Alzheimer's, his mind should continue to function normally, although perhaps slower and be a bit more forgetful.

Besides aging, we know that heredity plays a role at times. A few cases appear to run in families. And among identical twins, if one gets Alzheimer's disease, the other has a 40% chance of developing it. Persons with certain genetic abnormalities, such as Down's Syndrome, are much more likely to develop Alzheimer's disease. Yet, 90% of cases appear not to be related to any genetic factor and their cause remains un-

Researchers have identified a protein, called b-amyloid, that is elevated in Alzheimer's, but have not found its exact relationship to the illness. Medicines which may affect this bamyloid and other medicines that may be useful for Alzheimer's are undergoing trials but are not yet available.

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Success(ful) stories help Kentucky writer fulfill lifelong dream

Compared to most successful authors, Ann Gabhart has always been the outsider.

A high school dropout and mother of two at 19, she seldom expanded her horizons beyond the small Kentucky farm where she was raised.

She did finish high school through correspondence courses. Another course, in writing, was discovered on the back of a magazine. In her youth Ann was such

a big fan of the Hardy Boys and Nancy Drew mysteries that at age 10, she decided to write a mystery of her own. That started her down the writing trail she's traveled ever since.

Although little in Ann's background suggested she would become a published author, she always had that dream and goal before her.

While she enjoyed being a farmwife and mother, she never stopped working toward her goal of seeing her work in print.

After several of her articles and stories were published in small magazines, Ann's goal was realized in a big way in 1978 when Warner Books published her first novel.

A Forbidden Yearning is a historical romance focused on the settling of Kentucky.

Over the next three decades, her published works would include another historical romance novel, nearly a dozen fiction books for young readers, and more recently, four inspirational fiction novels.

Her only work of non-fic-

tion, Angels At The Crossroads, was published in 2006.

At age 60 she has gained a measure of notoriety for all the aforementioned, but also for writing The Outsider, a historical Christian fiction novel published this fall.

The book with the colorful cover featuring a beautiful Shaker girl was ranked at number 20 for Christian fiction books in September.

The book may be new to the market, but not to its author.

"I wrote The Outsider 25 years ago, but they (the editors) didn't like it," she says while sitting on a sofa in her rural Anderson County home.

"My editor came to see me after my first inspirational novel, The Scent of Lilacs, came out. I told her about the Shakers having a village in Mercer County and how I had written a book about them.

"I had to dig it out of my closet and do a major rewrite for the inspirational market, but they liked it so well that I'm now under contract to do a second one," she says.

The Shaker books require tons of research to make them historically accurate, making for a very time-consuming endeavor, according to Gabhart.

Angels At The Crossroads, which is Jerry Shepherd's story of redemption and love, required little research, but a lot of listening.

Jerry, a Kentucky native, had been singing alongside Gabhart's husband in a quartet for four years. During long bus



Wednesday night Bible Study is at 7 p.m.



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
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

2. Be supportive – and show him the respect that you expect from him. Remember this is a partnership.


3. Keep yourself attractive





Thacker signs with EKU

Former RCHS track and field standout Morgan Thacker recently signed with Eastern Kentucky University after receiving a full scholarship to participate in track and field. Morgan graduated from RCHS this past year after having distinguished herself as one of the greatest track and field athletes in RCHS history.

After eleven years of track and field experience, Morgan has compiled many records and awards at RCHS. She is the alltime record holder in both indoor and outdoor long jump with a career best mark of 18'3.5" and was ranked 26th in the U.S. in the event during the 2008 indoor track season. She went on to win her second Class 2A State Championship title in the event, narrowly missing the state record. Morgan is also the all-time indoor and outdoor record holder in triple jump, having leaped a career best 35'3' at last year's state championships. Besides her dominance in the field events, Morgan also holds alltime RCHS records in the 55 and 100-meter dashes, and is ranked # 2 all-time in the 200. She has also been a part of many record-setting indoor and

Rockets blow Patriots off football field 35-13

The Rockcastle County Rocket football team is 4 and 2 on the season after a 35-13 win over Lincoln County on Friday night.

The Rockets wasted little time getting on the scoreboard, enroute to ruining the Patriots homecoming.

The Patriots, now 0-5 on the season, managed only 155 yards of offense against the Rocket defense, which has played superbly all year long.

The Rockets scored all five of their touchdowns in the first half, to take a 35-0 lead into the locker room at halftime.

Rocket scoring began when senior Jared Smith recovered a fumble and returned it 46 yards for a touchdown, after only three minutes had ticked off the clock.

Five and half minutes later,

senior Casey Hayes scored on a one yard run to give the Rockets a 14-0 lead with 3:30 still left on the clock in the first period.

With 7:30 to play in the second period, Hayes scored again, this time on a 14 yard run from scrimmage and the Rockets led 21-0.

Senior Cody Mize added another score on a 12 yard run with 5:00 to go in the half and junior Matt Bullens picked off a Patriot pass and returned it 35 yards for the touchdown and the final score of the first half.

Junior quarterback and placekicker Dustin Bishop made all five extra point kicks he attempted in the first half.

The Patriots had the only two scores of the second half.
One score came on a 35 yard interception return and the

other was a 76 yard touchdown run from scrimmage.

Offensively, the Rockets had 252 yards - 206 on the ground and 46 through the air.

Hayes had 143 yards on 26 carries and scored two touchdowns. Mize had 44 yards on 8 carries, Jon Miller got 5 yards on 4 carries and Jadon Brock had 2 yards on one carry.

Bishop was 5 for 14 passing with one interception.

Smith caught two passes for 18 yards, Dustin Bullock had one catch for 17 yards, Jamie Todd, caught one pass for 8 yards and Mize caught one pass for 3 yards.



A part of RCHS football history, the 1977 team was 8-2

"The Rock is Hard" phrase has been around for 31 years

When the 1977-78 season opened, then Head Coach Glen Polly, who was the first head coach at RCHS, had every reason to be optimistic.

He and assistants Jim Cox and Larry Travis had a foundation, of 13 seasoned seniors and six equally seasoned juniors, of talented players which gave them every reason to expect good things for the sixth team at the ROCK, since the consolidation of schools.

One word could only describe the Rockets of 1977 - Power. The Rockets had an offensive line that was big for that era of high school football and they were fundamentally sound. The Rocket's offensive line blew most of their ten opponents off the line of scrimmage in 1977, which attributed much to their success. The line

was made of up of center Robert Owens; guards, Dusty Carloftis and Casey Hines; tackles, Mark Holbrook and Bryan Stokes and ends, Rick Anderkin and Harold Ballinger, Jr.

Hunt, Mark Poynter, Todd Fields, Walter Browning, Eddie Thompson, Tony Saylor, Denzil Chasteen, Matt Poynter, Keith Bussell, Tim Hooker, Ty Huffines, Bo Huffines, Kenny Johnson, Mike Mullins,

Polly's backfield was one of the best fielded by any Rockcastle team he had had. The leadership of quarterback and offensive captain Earl Lewis Hammons, who was often referred to as the team's heart and soul, was outstanding. A tough hard-nosed runner, coupled with a strong arm, made him a force to be reckoned with. Hammons had a stable of running backs, possessing strength and speed, that, at the time, any high school school would have loved to have.

The one-two punch of Billy Hackworth and David Owens gave defenders fits. Hackworth, who was named All-State in 1977 and Owens a two-time All-Stater in 1976 and 77, along with sophomore Steve Mitchell, was one of the best ever assembled at RCHS.

Hackworth led the team in rushing with 1,183 yards and he also led the Rockets in scoring in 1977. Owens also had a 1,000 yard rushing season his senior year, with 1,003 yards, helping him to a total of 2,387 yards for his career at RCHS, which was the most during Polly's era.

The Rocket offense as a whole scored 276 points in 1977, during a time before spread offenses and rule changes favored offensive teams.

Great teams always have great defensive units and the 1977 bunch certainly had plenty of defense.


Led by defensive captain, and all-state linebacker Mike Miller, the 1977 team gave up few first downs and fewer points (116) for the entire sea-

The good defensive play by the Rockets prompted defensive nose guard Robert Owens to coin the phrase, "The Rock is Hard!" which is still the Rockcastle football cry.









Riddle said the group had divided the proposed annexation area up so that neighbors could talk to neighbors and see if they wanted to sign the group's petition.

A petition seeking the placement of the annexation question on the ballot must be received in Mayor Clarice Kirby's office 60 days after the ordinance was published on September 25th.

Riddle said she had only been turned down by one person when she asked them to sign the petition.

The group was scheduled to meet again this Wednesday to go over their petitions and see how many signatures they currently have.

According to state law, if 50 percent of resident voters, or owners of real property within the proposed territory to be annexed, petition the Mayor in opposition to the proposal, the annexation question would be placed on the ballot in 2010.

"We simply want the people who are being affected by the annexation to have a say as to whether or not they want to be in the city," Riddle said.



Marching Rockets prepare for another doubleheader

The Marching Rockets have been working toward the Semi Finals for the past four months and there are now only two regular season competitions remaining. Class AAAA East Regional Quarterfinals are scheduled for October 25th in Rowan County. The Marching Rockets qualified to compete in Regional competition on their first time out at East Jessamine. Percussion - The Heartbeat of the Marching Band

The human voice was probably the first musical instrument, but percussion instruments such as hands and feet, then sticks, rocks, and logs were almost certainly the next steps in the evolution of music. Percussion instruments are musical instruments that are struck (or sometimes shaken or scraped) to produce sound. This category includes instruments whose own hard substance is made to vibrate (idiophones) and instruments that

Baptist Church in Somerset. Approximately 100 youth and adult leaders representing 10 Boy Scout troops from Pulaski, Wayne, Madison, Rockcastle, Lincoln and Casey counties participated in the program.

Boys were able to select from 17 different merit badges, ranging from astronomy to wilderness survival, taught by volunteer instructors from the public and private sectors. In all the boys began work on 140 merit badges during the weekend.

In addition, 13 adults participated in leadership or CPR training classes.

Those attending the camporee were treated to a special presentation by a Native American Indian group from Casey County and a concert by the Somerset band "Live Fish." meal Dutch oven cook-off.

The Center, headquartered in Somerset, is a non-profit economic development organization that serves 42 counties in Southern and Eastern Kentucky.

include a tight membrane that vibrates (membranophones). Percussion instruments may produce tones of definite or indefinite pitch. Their primary function is often rhythmic, but many are used as melody instruments.

The "backbone" or "the heartbeat" of a marching band is the percussion section. The percussion section in a marching band is usually quite large. In a KMEA Marching Contest percussion is judged as part of the whole program and also by itself for a separate score. Scoring guidelines used by judges are complicated and details are included at the end of this

Percussion in a marching band is subdivided into two separate functioning parts - the drum line and the pit. Percussion instruments with indefinite pitch (unpitched) are generally used on the drumline. It is the beat of the bass drum that keeps the marchers in step and at a regular speed, and it is the snare drum that provides that crisp, decisive air to the tunes played. Snare drums have two heads, with the top head, called the "batter head," being the one the player strikes. The "snares" of a snare drum are strings of plastic or twisted wire that run across the center of the bottom head ("snare head") and vibrate furiously against it when the drum is struck. The tenors consist of 4 or 5 single-headed tom toms of varying size arranged in an arc that are carried as a set.

THE DRUMLINE of the 2008 Marching Rockets consists of two bass drums, a snare and tenors. The section leader for all percussion, pit and drumline is Tony Potter. He is a senior and this is his fifth year marching and his second as percussion section leader. He played in the pit his first year and has marched drumline ever since. This year he marches with the snare. The best part of band for Tony is, "Going out and having something to do. Belonging to something." His least favorite band activity is "practice." He feels that NIGHTSCAPES is "more energetic than past shows. It's different." He's planning to pursue a career in criminal justice.

Kyle Hayes, section leader for the drumline, is a junior. He marches the bass drum and this is his 3rd year with the Marching Rockets. He played in pit during his freshman year and also plays a full set of drums on the side. The best part of band for Kyle is "Going to competitions and having fun and eating all the food." His current favorite song to play is Waking the Demon by Bullet for my Valentine. He is not so fond of "having to get up early for competitions and band camp." About NIGHTSCAPES he said, "I really like it." Just before walking out on the field in competitions, Kyle will "slap himself in the face". He is currently planning to major in a computer field in college and is hoping for a music scholarship to help finance that goal.

Brandon Bullock is an eighth grader and this is his first year marching with the Rockets. He also plays the big bass drum. He enjoys playing the guitar, bass and a full set of drums in his free time. His favorite song right now is Back in Black by AC/DC. The best part of band is "is getting in free to all the football games." His least favorite band activity is practice. When asked about this year's show, NIGHTSCAPES, he said, "I like it better than PHYZYX." He prepares for competitions by relaxing and "listening to my Ipod." He is also involved in a metal band that is just starting up called License to Kill. This band includes kids from both the middle and the high school. Brandon plays the drums and some guitar in the band.

The fourth member of the drumline is freshman Jarrett Hamm. He marches with the tenors. This is his 2nd year marching. He also "fools around with the guitar and bass". His favorite band activity is "competitions" and his least favorite activities are "practice and band camp." His favorite music to play is "80's stuff".

NIGHTSCAPES "is a lot better than I thought it would be. It's better than I was expecting with all the new people." His preparation for competitions always includes "putting my hair up into the hat." He wants to be a rock star and currently is part of a metal band called Failure to Conform.

THE PIT PERCUSSION section has some very unique and exotic instruments. It was a fad that brought the bass drum, cymbals, and triangle from Turkey into popularity first in Europe and then in the United States. The personal guards of the Turkish Sultans, the Janissaries, were renowned for their bands, which relied on the bass drum, cymbals, and triangle. During the eighteenth century, military bands all over Europe copied their style and imported their instruments. After Beethoven used them in the finale of his Ninth Symphony in 1824 to evoke the sound of a military band on the march, they became a staple of marching bands.

Other instruments found in the pit of the Marching Rockets are the timpani, the bongos, the marimba, the xylophone, the cabasa, and various bells. The timpani, also called kettledrums, are the original percussion instruments of the orchestra and were first used in cavalry bands. The "kettle" of a kettledrum is called the "bowl" and is made of copper or brass. The "head" of the drum, the surface that the player strikes, is a piece calfskin or Mylar plastic stretched over the rim of the bowl. The timpani are a pitched instrument and are tuned by adjusting the tension of the heads. Timpanists can vary the sound of a drum by using drumsticks with harder or softer heads, and by striking the drum at different distances from the rim. Bongos are of Afro-Cuban origin and are a pair of permanently attached small single-headed drums the larger of which is tuned about fifth below the smaller drum.

The xylophone is a percussion instrument consisting of a row of chromatically tuned wooden bars, arranged in the manner of a piano keyboard. The bars are supported by a wooden frame over resonator tubes and they are sounded by being struck with mallets. Playing the xylophone well requires great precision to hit just the right bar at the right time, which produces a musical tone. The marimba is of African and Latin American origin. The modern marimba is a mellower version of the xylophone, but it's bigger and has a wider range of notes. The cabasa (or cabaca), is a percussion instrument of Afro-Brazilian origin that is a small cylinder covered by several strings of beads that is shaken with a circular motion. It provides a metallic, rattling sound when shaken or twisted, similar to the sound of a rattlesnake.

Mallory Harper is the section leader for the Marching Rockets' pit this season. She is a sophomore and this is her 3rd year with the band. She plays the marimba, xvlophone and bells and also plays pit percussion during concert season. The best part of band for Mallory is "going to the competitions", while her least favorite is "band camp." Her favorite song to play is Moonlight Sonata" by Beethoven. When asked about NIGHTSCAPES she said, "It's pretty awesome. It's one of the best shows we've had." It was watching her older sister Morgan per-

form at band competitions that inspired Mallory to also get involved with the band. "It looked like fun."


Sophomore A.J. Rehor is in his second year with the Marching Rockets as a pit percussionist. He plays the bass drum, the cymbals, the cabasa and the cowbells. For his own enjoyment he also plays a full set of drums, a little guitar, sings in the RCHS choir, and is involved in 2 metal bands; one, Super Dupers, as drummer and one, Aneurysm, as manager. AJ enjoys band because he likes "hanging out with my friends and having a good time". His favorite song to play with the band is Hey Baby. His least favorite part of band is all the 'practice". He thinks NIGHTSCAPES is "the best show we've had". Before competitions he likes to "take it easy and try not to stress about it". Last week he watched the EKU Marching Band perform and was impressed with their professionalism and hopes that he can continue with marching band through college.

Sarah Morgan, also a sophomore, is new to the band and

Rockcastle County. She just recently moved here from Leslie County and plays the xylophone and bells in pit percussion. She also enjoys playing the violin at home. 

GEAR UP

Good grades and planning make college possible

big dreams and good grades. It also calls for making plans that students and their parents can make together, one step at a time, with help from a new campaign called KnowHow2GOKy. "It simplifies the steps to get into college," says Bruce Brooks, who manages the campaign for the Council on Postsecondary Education.

Kentucky legislators believe Kentuckians want a better quality of life and one way to achieve that is through postsecondary education and training, especially a college degree. How can a degree help? When comparing those who don't graduate from college and those who do, college graduates earn a higher salary, have more secure jobs and find increased opportunities for exploring their interests and expanding their horizons.

Yet, sending a child to college can be overwhelming, especially for parents who haven't attended college themselves. Brooks emphasizes that the new campaign provides resources that eliminate the need for parents and students to have all of the answers to their questions about college. KnowHow2GOKy can direct them to the resources they need step-by-step.

One easily accessible source for KnowHow2GOKy information is the local GEAR UP coordinator.

In Rockcastle County, the coordinator is Nancy Hale 606-256-4816, (phone nancy.hale@rockcastle.kyschools.us).

Another way for parents to learn about these resources is through the campaign website (www.knowhow2goky.org). The "Are you ready for college?" quiz helps students begin to understand the long-term

College requires more than take and the classes they should sign up for to be admitted to college.

> KnowHow2GOKy offers four steps to college and details about how students can take those steps. The steps include: be a pain; push yourself; find the right fit and put your hands on some cash.

> Parents are oftentimes most concerned about that final tip because it involves the life of the entire family. Brooks says parents can do their children a favor by asking them to sit by their side when they pay the family's bills or balance the checkbook. Those tasks can help children understand why education is important and how to manage their own affairs when they leave home.

> "Unfortunately in our state there's a large contingency of people who think they can't afford it and don't recognize the fact that there are lots of funding options and if you start early enough everyone can go," Brooks says. The site helps users understand some of these funding resources and how they work.

> Brooks says there are also hurdles other than finances. He hopes parents will use the campaign resources to understand those hurdles and give their child a reality check about them. The four tips can provide a starting place for those conversations.

One myth Brooks hopes the campaign will help clear up is about the role the school will play in the child's preparation for higher education. "Most parents will say the guidance counselor is going to take care of this. But the reality is the guidance counselors don't have that kind of time," he says. Guidance counselor caseloads average 500 students each.

Of course, parents are busy, planning they need to under- too. But if they can help their children begin the college planning process and keep a list of the questions that must be answered by a high school guidance counselors or college admissions counselor. When meeting with those people, students can have their specific questions answered more efficiently to best meet their individual needs.


Brooks wants parents to know, "They don't have to know the answers. They just have to know where to find the answers." KnowHow2GOKy is a good step to discovering those answers.



Ordinance #2008-6

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax for city purposes in the corporate limits of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky

Whereas, Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 92.280 requires that the legislative body of each city annually levy an ad valorem tax for city purposes, and,

Whereas, KRS 92.330 requires that all taxes be levied by ordinance, and,

Whereas, KRS 83A.130 requires that the legislative body, by ordinance provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and,

Whereas, the city has calculated the tax rate(s) for real and personal property in accordance with KRS chapter 132.

Now Therefore Be It Ordained, by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

Section One: Tax Levy - Real estate and personal property

A. An ad valorem tax rate of <u>16.6</u> cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of real property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

B. An ad valorem tax rate of $\underline{16.6}$ cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of personal property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty

All said taxes shall be due and payable at the City Offices as set forth on the tax bill. Taxes paid prior to the due date shall receive a two percent (2%) discount. Taxes paid up to thirty (30) days after the due date shall be at the face amount. Taxes paid more than thirty (30) days after the due date shall be charged a ten percent (10%) penalty.

Section Three: Effective Date and Use Thereof This ordinance applies to the 2008 calendar year

This ordinance applies to the 2008 calendar year tax assessment and all receipts shall be used for city purposes and accounted in the 2009 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years in reference to delinquent collections.

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
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

Anyone wanting to lose weight can get off track by the temptation of unhealthy foods in the workplace. For people to lose weight and effectively stick to a diet, they often need

ings by dumping out the candy dish and replacing it with fruit or replacing soda with water in their refrigerator. However, many times the food environment at work cannot be controlled. In the workplace, food is everywhere from pastries at morning meetings to the tempting snack drawers and vending

According to the 2003-2004 National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, almost 66 percent of the U.S. adults are overweight or obese. Kentucky has the fourth highest obesity rate in the nation. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention states that individuals who are overweight or obese are at a higher risk for high blood pressure, high cholesterol, high triglycerides, osteoarthritis, diabetes, stroke, sleep apnea and gall bladder disease.

While not all weight is gained on the job, changing the workplace eating environment can help dieters stay focused and keep others healthier. There are several things people can do to change how food is offered at the work environment. One of the first things adults should consider is bringing their lunch to work rather than eating out every day. Most of us know a turkey sandwich is healthier than a hamburger, but we are a rushed society and fast food can seem more convenient than packing a lunch to those who live on the go. Oftentimes, meals at fast food restaurants tend to be in larger portions than adults really need, but the extra calories are consumed because they are easily available and accessible. Packing a lunch will also help limit the size of the meal and also create healthier food choices. Consider packing a lunch the night before, if you

feel too rushed to do so in the morning.

Portions can also be limited when serving pastries, cakes or soda at meetings and events. Allowing employees to help themselves at these functions can also help them consume smaller portions. If you are concerned about the food choices at these gatherings, talk to the person who orders the food or the caterer and ask if they can replace the some of the current food offerings with healthier options such as fruit and vegetable trays or at least offer fruits and vegetables as alternatives. Many times the caterer can offer baked or broiled options instead of only fried foods. Also make sure there is water available at meetings and events. A healthy employee potluck meal is also an option when sharing lunch

with co-workers. Vending machines also pose a problem for dieters. Many times when employees go to the vending machines for snacks, the only options they are given are candy bars, potato chips, cookies, soda and brownies. Find out who stocks the vending machine and talk with them about offering healthier snack options such as pretzels, baked or low fat chips and water.

Eating healthy at work can be a challenge, but it is possible and can help to achieve weight loss goals in the New Year. To receive more information about healthy and nutritious foods, contact the Rockcastle Cooperative Extension Service at 256-2403.


