## Hidden Among Us <br> The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

Sylvester Adams Sylvester Adams was born around 1768 in Winchester, Louden County, VA and died after March 1857 was the son of Daniel and Hannah Adams of Louden Co, VA. After the American Revolution, the Adams family moved to North Carolina and later to Ken County The The 1820 Censi showty that Sylvester and his family had moyed and were iving in Rockcastle County: On 15 December 1841 ylvester Adams, being a County, applied for a pension for his service during the Revolutionary War. Ac cording to Adams, he would have applied much earlier
but was told that since he but was told that since he he was not eligible for any compensation. He was informed later that this was not true and submitted the reviewing information for Ty According to his pension tered the sylvesterenYorktownand served eleven,
