### NOTES FROM MEADOWBROOK FARM

Call your chicken Rocks over. Alfalfa is the best molting crop known. It does not pay to be careless with farm machinery. There is nothing equal to mother's milk for a young foal. The honey bee is necessary in the pollenation of fruit trees. Whitewash is a cheap aid to the keeping of a sweet and sanitary stable. This is the time of year when it is necessary to keep the cultivator going overtime. After cooling, milk should be all cases be held at the lowest available temperature. Good ventilation is absolutely essential, but drafts must be prevented in the lambing shed. The best way to get rid of mosquitoes, like the balance of our troubles, is not to raise 'em. The Guernsey, when it comes to butter fat, holds a distinguished place as a record breaker. The cost of 100 pounds' gain in a cow is \$1.10, while it is nearly \$6.00 for two-year-olds. The cultivation of beans should be along the same lines as of corn, if possible more intensive. Spray the first time for the special purpose of filling every blossom on the tree with the poison used. Breaking broody hens is not a hard task, a few days' work in the feeding and housing is all that is required. The United States produces one-fifth of the wheat and three-fourths of all the corn grown in the world. Do not wait until the broody fever becomes chronic, but discourage her as soon as she shows signs of it. Alfalfa is one of the best plants to furnish a good food for chickens, but ordinarily it is a poor food for them. Sheep shorn well at a discount because the wool cannot be pulled until it has a growth of three-quarters of an inch. Brush the udder and surrounding parts just before milking and wipe them with a clean damp cloth or sponge. Keep small turkey poulters out of the long, wet grass in the morning and see that they are well covered during heavy showers. Butter from fresh and properly ripened cream not over one day old keeps better than does butter made from average cream. An important feature in the successful management of the sow and litter is to get the little pigs to suck as early as possible. It is found that success in dairying depends as much on the kind of care and management bestowed on the herd, as upon the breed. When you weed and thin out the family garden don't forget the poultry; they will relish the garden waste and put it to a good use. Plan to raise a few flocks of general purpose standard-bred birds this season. They will yield much more satisfaction and profit than a mixed flock. If you have Jerseys, give them lots of fresh corn and see that they are not succed on scrub feed and fodder. They were not intended for that purpose. By two or three plantings of sweet corn two weeks or so apart, you can have tender juicy corn on the table three times as long as one planting can give them. Cooked fish makes good summer and cold-weather food for your stock. It is cause indigestion and diarrhoea in hot weather if well scalded and mixed with ground grain. The butter fat from your fresh cream is apparently in a more stable condition than that in the fat in the sour cream over one day old, and not so predisposed to decomposition. Brookfield, Ky July, 24 1911. Mr. Albright— I am not much of a writer, as I never had to write anything that was to be published, but as I know there is a big future for Rockcastle county if the farmers will work right and cultivate their lands properly and the business people appreciate the advantages of this county, I feel like I want to say a few things.

I came to Rockcastle many years ago and at once saw what could be done by proper work. I thought a very cheap farm, one that no one would work hard for, and I began in a systematic way to improve it. I saw how high a state of cultivation but I made it better every year. I worked hard and that work has the most good results. All of my ground is much richer than when I began to cultivate it.

roads and in the building of bridges. Both of these have been very greatly neglected. They have the power to levy the tax and to work the roads, as well as to build the bridges and more attention by these officers should be paid to the improvement of our highways, for that is the very first step toward the improvement in the fertility, as well as the looks of our farms. Without good roads and better schools, the great majority of the farmers will continue to take little interest in the development of our lands. Our live stock has improved in spite of the bad roads and the indifferent farming. More people are taking interest in improving their stock than at any time since I came to this county and it shows what can be done if the farmers will only try. It is as easy to have good stock as bad and much cheaper to maintain and much more profitable when you come to sell.

farmers cannot secure the best results for their labor and have a very poor chance of properly educating their children. Bad roads makes the distance to market much longer and harder and discourages home seekers who are compelled to travel over them. It prevents the children from getting higher education. I am proud that we are about to build one pike but there is not some way by which we can build more.

WASHINGTON LETTER AN "IMPARTIAL" INVESTIGATOR G. W. Burton, special agent of the tariff board who is now traveling in Europe gathering "exact information" to be used as the basis of tariff revision by the Republicans, is an Aldrich standpatter on the tariff questions, and was undoubtedly selected because of this qualification. Burton, on the side, has been writing letters back for publication in the Los Angeles Times. A high protectionist paper. This "impartial" investigator, gathering exact information in a recent letter declared that: "Your tariff revision demand, fellow Americans, is a fad." In another letter, exhorting the whole tariff revision suggestion, this "impartial" investigator made this judicial and carefully weighed observation: "The merchants of our country who are so invidiously shouting for lower duties in order to get the cost of living reduced, should stop making so much noise until they learn what they are talking about." All of which is interesting in view of the fact that President Taft insists Congress should not touch the iniquitous Payne. Aldrich rates until this impartial investigator, G. W. Burton, has told it what it ought to do.

CHECKERS COMING HOME TO ROOST. For many years the government paid a handsome rental for the use of the Union building in Wash-

ington. It develops now that one of the principal owners of the building is a daughter-in-law of Senator Hale, and that Senator Hale inserted in the Senate appropriation bill and item which compelled the government to lease the building. The principal mission this year which expenditure was sheer waste of the secret service fund performed was to provide a place for Senator Hale's political speech. Nor was that all. While Senator was in exercise of almost unlimited power in the Senate as chairman of the appropriations committee, his son, Frederick Hale, secretly received a fee of \$5,000 out of the secret service fund for alleged diplomatic labors in helping to fix a Canadian boundary line. No one can find out what young Hale actually did to earn this \$5,000. These and other acts of Mr. Hale while he was Senator justify the demand that he be given an opportunity to explain. Perhaps he will demand it in justice to himself. It most restrains him the opportunity may be forced upon him by one of the House investigating committees.

EXPENSIVE TRUST BUSTING. Fifty-nine thousand dollars was the amount paid Frank B. Kellogg the Republican trust-buster by the Government, between 1907 and 1911. It is believed that Kellogg received as much, if not more from the trust. It was developed before the Stanley committee that in one instance he received fees from the steel trust while being paid by the government to prosecute its friends and ally, the pit trust.

McKendrick, another trust-buster received \$64,000 from the public treasury for his services in the tobacco and coal carrying railroad cases. In all the Republican spend more than \$3,000,000 in ten years for trust busting, and the trusts are still with us.
