State Experts Give Big Plans for Schools, But Neglect to Say How to Finance Them

When the state Board of Education experts presented their
study of the Rockeastle School
System to the Rockcastle School System to the Rockcastle School
Board April 2, they made several recommendations that would cost a lot of money. They suggested
"phrasing' in new facilities at Mt.
Vernon and Livingston Elemen. Vernon and Livingston Elementary Schools in a long-range pro-
gram, and they suggested building seventh and eighth graders as top priority for any capital construc-
tion plans. tion plans.
Funding such projects may
ot be easy. School superinten not be easy. School superinten-
dent Charles Parsons told board members that a proposed "School Building Authority"' a bonding
agency for districts' in need of construction money, became a polconstruction money, became a polsion of the Kentucky Legislature last winter. Thus. a potential
source of money for Rockcastle schools was lost.

The Board has been trying to "save" money from the par equalization program, another special
state program, for the past three years. Par equalization "equal. izes', money spent in each school district by putting all money set
aside for schools together and dividing it according to the number of students each district has. This way the rich districts lose the districts. par equalization had a Catch 22. While the state provided more money, it also asked that some advantage of par equaliz.
tion was lost to smaller counties
who had been paying teachers less. Even with the provision, however, Rockcastle County has been able
to to accumulate $\$ 250,580$ in its con-
struction fund, most of which was possible because of par equali.

Cumberland...black bass slow nightcrawlers at the heads of trib utaries and run-ins, crappie slow still fishing and jigging minnows willow bushes (two to four feet) rockfish fair casting while doll flies and trolling crank and stick baits on Beaver Creek; in head-
