





But anyone who says he has seen a ghost, heard a haunt rattling chains on stairs or watched a door open and close without human help will stand by the stories.

There is supposed to be an invisible horseman and his steed who ride the roads in Morgan County. They reported-ly have been heard countiess times gilloping along the Lick-ing Ryder Road, past a few scattered farmhouses, only to scattered farmhouses, only to that might have been the scene of a hanging during the Civil of a hanging during the Civil

It is said that during the war a tree in the area was used for hangings. One time a rope was looped around a huge limb of the tree to hang a Northern sympathizer.

Capt. John T. Williams heard of the incident and left West Liberty to stop the killing. He supposedly arrived just in time to save the man, even though they fought on opposite sides.

There was the boundary tree in the Kentucky Highlands that disappeared overnight, taking list trunk and roots on its ghostly journey and healing the spot where it stood. The late Henry P. 
