

Department for Human Resources Says "No Cut-Back in Nutrition Program for Elderly"

Nutrition programs for Kentucky's elderly will not be decreased this year, despite cut-backs anticipated by the Department for Human Resources.

The department's division for aging services, the state agency which administers congregate meal programs for the elderly, has received \$764,316 to supplement nutrition programs for senior citizens this fiscal year.

Safety Rules For

Wood-Cutting Equipment

With the growing popular-of wood-burning stoves re Kentuckians are becoming ity of wood-burning stoves more Kentuckians are becoming part-time lumberjacks, cutting helr own firewood for the winter Many are unfamiliated to the control of the many are unfamiliated. Too often, accidents and infuries are the result.

Edsel Moore, manager of the Department for Human Resources consumer product safety branch, estimates that 1,000 Kentuckians will be injured this fall while cutting firewood. "Chain saws by their basic nature can be very dangerous," injuries related to chain saws tend to be much more severe than injuries resource than injuries resource than injuries resourced to more severe than injuries resourced to more severe than injuries resourced to make the consumer to the consumer to

According to Moore, the element most common in chain saw accidents is the inexper-ience of the opreators. Improper use of the machines and chain saw "kick-back" are implicated in most of these injuries, he

savs.

anoore explained that kick-back is a sudden jerk in an upward and backward motion that usually happens when the tip of the saw strikes something or becomes jammed in the wood. He says the chain saw industry is working on a voluntary standard aimed at preventing chain saw kick-back.

"It is most important that
anyone who uses or plant to use
a chain saw carefully read and
observe certain precautions. A
person who does not understand
the instructions or precautions
should consult someone who is
knowledgeable about chain
saws." says More.

2. Never hold a chain saw
over your head.
3. Do not use a chain saw
that is too small for the job.
4. Buy or rent equipment
with built-in safety features

safety glasses.
6. Keep safety in mind
when selecting work clothes.
7. Never use a chain saw
while alone. Having someone
around to help can prevent
many accidents as well as save
your life if an accident happens.
8. Avoid distractions.
8. Avoid distractions.
9. Make sure the chain saw
is in good mechanical condition.
The physical condition of
the operator is important. "Oppreviating a chain saw is strenuous
work." Moore says. "An operator who is alert and in good
physical condition is less accident prone."

Privett said the state's 15 area development districts, which administer nutrition programs for the elderly on local levels, had already planned to cope with program decreases by making staff cutbacks and cuting the number of serving days grass area development district, which includes 17 counties, would have served 9,000 less meals during the 1980 fiscal

which includes 17 counties, would have served 9,000 less meals during the 1980 fiscal year as compared with 1979. Esther Rigby, nutrition project director for the Bluegrass district, has planned to cut from 247 serving days annually to 208 at the district's 21 meal sites. She said centers normally serving meals to the elderly five days a week would probably have only been open four days weekly. The additional money

makes the reductions unnecessary, she said.

The Barren River area development district would have dropped 10,000 meals served to elderly in that 10-county areas the said have been said he had made plans to cut from serving 750 meals daily to 700 meals a day. He said he had already temporarily reduced some staff to half time and has asked centers to limit, their hours to fifur to six hours a day-rather than eight.

"The supplement funding has been a lifesaver for us," Guthrie said. "Our next step would have been to close one or two of our 14 meal centers

two of our 14 meal centers altogether."

He has reinstated the staff

He has reinstated the staff to full time, and 750 meals are being served daily to elderly persons in that district.

Michalczyk sald the federal dollars are distributed to area development districts based on the districts population of elderly persons. The goal of the supplemental monies, he said, "is to bring the number of meals back, at a minimum, to 1979 fiscal year levels."



agencies is to actively pursue

However, some collection agencies have gone overboard in
trying to collect personal, family household debts.
The Fair Debt Collection
Practices Act limits how a debt
collector may contact you at an
inconvenient time, such as before 8 a.m. or after 9 p.m., or at
an unusual place. A collector

These measures are de-signed to prevent collection a-gencies from attempting to "shame" someone into paying a

debt.

The Fair Debt Collection
Practices Act also prohibits abusive practices, such as: using

nage: repeatedly using the telephone to annoy someone or advertising a debt.

Also, a debt collector may not say you will be arrested or imprisoned if you do not pay your debt. He cannot give false information concerning your credit status.

If a debt collector should call you collect, you do not have to accept the charges. You also are not responsible for paying telegram fees.

Not all debt collectors are subject to the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act. It does not apply to banks or businesses

may not contact you at work if your employer objects and may only contact your atterney if you have hired one.

A collection agency must stop contacting you if you write them and ask them to stop. Collection agencies are not allowed to send post cards.

A debt collector is allowed to contact another person in pursuit of your debt, but only to locate you, the cannot say it it because you have "bad debts."

In most cases, a collection agency may not talk to any persons, other than you, more than once. The agency can person, other than you, more than once. Loss Estimated at over \$300,000 in Kentucky Casket Fire


Loss has been estimated at over \$300,000 in a later after-noon fire which destroyed the Kentucky Casket Co. at Liv-ingston last Friday. Monroe Baker, owner of the

Monroe Baker, owner of the company, said that no cause had yet been determined for the blaze which broke out after all employees had left about 4:30 p.m. The fire was discovered about an hour afterwards and fire-fighting units from Livingston, Brodhead, Mt. Vermon and East Bernstadt responded

to a call for help to fight the fire. The firemen did an excellent job in keeping any surrounding property from being damaged. Livingston only last year organized a volunteer department.

Mr. Baker said about 20 employees had been put out of work because of the fire and at this time he was not sure whether or not the business would be rebuilt. There was o nly a minimum of insurance, Mr. Baker said.

Baker bought the business 20 years ago from Mrs. Lauda Webb. In the past, casket shells flad been purchased by the company and finished in their operation. But, in the past two years, Mr. Baker said he had invested about \$100,000 in installing welding supply equipment so that the complete process could be done at Livingston. Around 300 finished and unfinished caskets were lost in the fire.



No injuries were sustained in the fire last Friday afternoon which destroyed the Kentucky Casket Company at Livingston. Three out-of-




