



Heat Stroke and Exhaustion; Two Dangers of Summertime

As the mercury climbs to near 100 degrees throughout Kentucky, heat-related illnesses are likely to occur. A department for Human Resources health official says people who know a little bit about the two-most common conditions may help save alife.

help save a life.

Those conditions are heat Those conditions are heat exhaustion and heat stroke. While both are caused by being exposed to too rauch heat and humidity, there is a critical difference in the two, said Dr. Carlos Hernandez, assistant commissioner for disease control and epidemiology in the department.

The critical difference is that heat exhaustion is usually a mild, temporary condition.

The criticial difference is that heat exhaustion is usually a mild, temporary condition, while heat stroke kills up to one-half its victims.

Heat stroke is a breakdown in the body's ability to carry off heat through perspiration. If the control of the control

Two or three holes are cut in the jug and the plastic bag is tied securely, to the top of the jug. The beetle is stracted to the jug by the bait; but when they hit the sides of the jug they side into the bag below. When the bag is full, they merely take it down, tiet they merely take it down, tiet the to and throw it away.






