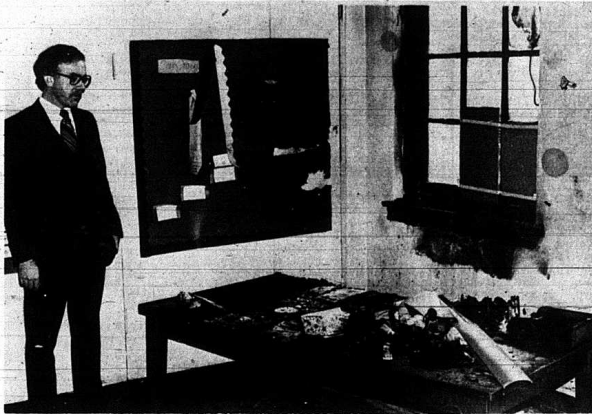

## Water Line Breaks

Trouble erupted in the form of a water line break about 1:30 a.m., Monday morning and, to make matters worse, the temperature was a frigid 1 degree below zero at the time.

According to Matt Powell, Jr., water superintendent, the break, which was near the intersection of West Main and Hwy. 25, took about five hours to fix. A six-inch valve broke necessitating shutting off valves circling the western half of the city. Most of the trouble and time was spent trying to open the frozen valve box covers. Hot water and sledge hammers were used to break the covers loose and a hole finally had to be knocked in the cast iron, covering of one box in order to shut off that particular valve.

## Arson Suspected in Numerous Fires in the Brodhead Area

Arson is suspected in an early Sunday morning fire at Brodhead Elementary School which damaged a second grade classroom.

The fire, which was apparently set through a window, which had been broken out in the older white block section of the school, was discovered soon after it was set by Brodhead Police Chief Wayne Denny as he was making his rounds about 5 a.m.

Mostly smoke damage and damage to the drapes and shades was done to the room

which is occupied by Mrs. Judy Doyle and her second grade class.

On December 31st, about 6 p.m., the old theatre building on Main Street in Erothead was apparently set on fire; however, it too was discovered before it could get out of control. The unoccupied building belongs to Lee Taylor.

A Monday night fire, destroying a vacant dwelling and a small building across from Rockcastle Steel Co. on Hwy. 150 near the railroad tracks, has also aroused suspicions of arson, according to Brodhead Fire

Chief Everett Brailey.

The Brodhead Fire Department also answered a call to a fire on Christmas Eve which burned a vacant house, off the Brodhead Conway Road next to the Dix River, which burned to the ground.

And a barn, belonging to Wade Lambert on the Brodhead-Copper Creek Road, burned early Saturday night. The Brodhead Fire Department arrived too late to save the structure.

All the suspected arson cases have been turned over to State Police Detective Acciaro, arson investigator.

## Local Fire Department Busy

A five-room dwelling, belonging to Henry "Hank" Coates of Cox Lane in Mt. Vernon was completely gutted by fire late Friday morning, January 2.

The Mt. Vernon Fire Department responded but were hampered in their efforts to extinguish the blaze by a poor water supply. According to John Rush, the fire started in the kitchen around the flue which possibly overheated from a new wood heating stove. No one was at home at the time.

A car, parked on Ferguson St. and belonging to Mary Harmon, caught fire Sunday afternoon. The Mt. Vernon Fire Department responded and put out the fire which had already done extensive damage.

Last Thursday night, about 9:15 p.m., local firemen responded to a call reporting a fire at the dwelling of Don Putnam of Pongo. The call turned out to be a false alarm.

Heavy damages to the building and contents were incurred in a fire at the Burr Gulf Service Station Monday night about 11:15 p.m.

The building, owned by Kastle Investments Corp., apparently caught fire around the furnace area near the ceiling and the cause was possibly electrical in nature, according to fireman John Rush.

The Mt. Vernon Fire Department was assisted in fighting the blaze by the Livingston Fire Department and by private water haulers.

Sammy Carrol of Mt. Vernon owned the contents of the building and operated the business.

## Raises Granted by Fiscal Court

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court met in regular session Tuesday and, upon the recommendation of County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker, approved a \$50 a month raise, effective January 1, for the nine ambulance drivers.

With the raise, drivers will be earning \$629.19 a month. The raise for five of the drivers will be funded from CETA program funds with the other four drivers' raises coming from ambulance service revenue.

## What Price A Joke?

Genuinely disturbing to many area residents are reports of recent calls in false fire alarms. The motivations for such actions are something that puzzles the average sane, caring and concerned citizen.

The most recent, and potentially dangerous, run answered by the Mt. Vernon Fire Department was in response to a call reporting a fire at Pongo, 30 miles round trip from Mt. Vernon. The caller gave a false identity and when firemen tried to call to verify the report, the line was busy. Light snow and freezing temperatures made the curvy, hilly road extremely hazardous, especially for the fire truck which was carrying a heavy load of water.

The purpose of a fire department is to save lives and property. The local fire department is completely dependent upon volunteer time and the quality of men in our fire department is a credit to our community.

It is too bad when irresponsible people dictate the service available to a community as has happened in this case for now, understandably, the fire department has decided that unless it can positively identify or otherwise verify a fire report outside the city limits, it will not respond to the call.

Their reasoning is simple. While the fire truck is outside the city limits making a run to a non-existent fire, a real fire might break out and the truck will be unavailable for the call. It is a sad commentary on our society today that people have so little respect for the lives and property of others that they would endanger them heedlessly.

We agree with the fire department's decision and only hope that in the future certain people will find a better way to amuse themselves.

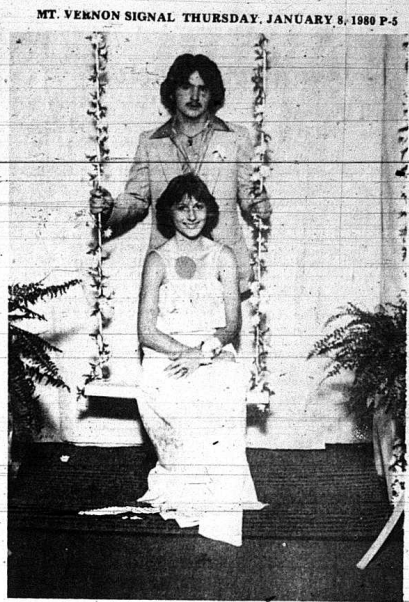

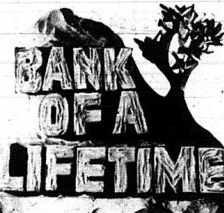

We would like to thank the girls cheerleaders and the freshmen boys' team for their tremendous support during the game. It was great to hear the vocal support given to our teams. Thanks!!

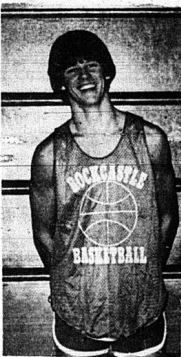

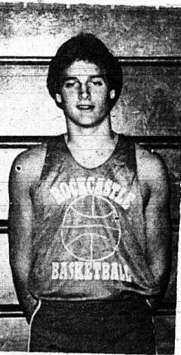

### Record Keeping Helps Make Money Behave

If you want to make your money behave, keep close track of how you spend it. Buy a household record book and start writing down. It's the first step toward developing the kind of money management skill that makes it possible to set up a budget you can live with. A realistic budget, coupled with some self-discipline, can have the same effect as an annual raise.

If the word "budget" bothers you, just think of it as a spending plan based on your own lifestyle, problems and goals.

Carry a little notebook and jot down cash expenses day by day. Get the rest of the family to do the same thing, or take a few minutes each day for a "cash recall" from each person. At the end of the week, transfer to the record book all cash expenses and any items paid for by check.

Total up the categories each month. A family spending pattern will start to emerge. Take a look at it with the rest of your clan and see where you might plug up some spending leaks. There'll be a place to enter income from all sources each month and you can quickly check income totals against out-of-pocket totals and see how you're doing.

One category that can mislead you is "Food." Don't forget to include school lunches and other meals away from home. Before you put your groceries away, separate out and write down money spent for alcoholic beverages, canning and freezing supplies, pet food, cleaning products, paper goods, cosmetics

and other non-food items. This will give you a more accurate spending breakdown.

If you have the time and patience to reconstruct last year's spending pattern, it will help give you a basis for comparison. You can get most of the information you need from your checking account records and from the deductions listed on your paycheck stubs. You can probably make a fairly accurate guess on many of the things you paid cash for, too.

A variety store or office supply store is probably the best place to find your record book or ledger. You could buy either a soft-cover record book for each year or a ledger to which you can keep adding ledger sheets. You can usually find household record sheets with the headings already printed, but you might prefer the ones which allow you to fill in the spending categories yourself.

Record keeping is just the beginning, but it's a good one. A pocket calculator is a big help, too, and it might also be a fun way to get the children involved

in what should be a family project - making your money behave.

### Good Records Pay Off At Tax Time

At least once a year - when income tax time rolls around - people renew their determination to better organize their records system, or set up a system.

It's probably too late for this year's filing, but organizing records and business papers will pay off next April 15.

A record system does not have to be highly detailed. Simple records will often serve your purpose. The secret to useful records lies in keeping them accurate and up-to-date. We suggest that one member of the family be made responsible for entering expenditures in a living-expense record book, preferably on a certain day each week. 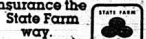

Besides expense records which help in tax filing, a system for keeping other family records, such as a household inventory, net worth statement, real estate and investment records are recommended.

A well-kept record system helps a family or individual study spending habits, determine when purchases can best be made, study the cost of installment buying and the amount spent on credit and teach children principles of money management.

County home economics extension agents have more information on setting up a records system, including a publication, "Keeping Important Records and Business Papers."

The Veterans Administration is urging all World War II veterans to apply regardless of whether any insurance was held. The VA will check for eligibility. A veteran who had \$10,000 insurance would be entitled to dividends as follows: 12 months \$70; 24 months \$156; 36 months \$234; 48 months \$312.

## MICHIANA POINT OF VIEW

# Opportunity to become millionaire with Colonel Sanders recalled

(Ed's Note: The following, reprinted from the December 28th issue of the South Bend Tribune, was written by Raymond

McClure, a native of Rockcastle County and former editor of the Mt. Vernon Signal for many years. pma)

I'm always amazed how the paths of people cross; how opportunity can knock and how some of us never seem to get to the door in time.

I was reminded of that last week when I heard the news that Col. Harland Sanders, king of fried chicken and someone whom I had predicted years before would live forever, had "passed away comfortably" in a Louisville hospital.

His passing brought back memories of a warm summer day in 1987 in southeastern Kentucky, a summer that had brought more sun than rain. Any breeze aggravated the dust. Any shade was a refreshing welcome.

My search for news as a weekly newspaper editor had brought me to the old country store in Renfro Valley, an area with a popular country music bardance and tourist center dedicated to the encouragement of true mountain music.

I heard the roar before I saw the big, white, old-model Cadillac career around a curve on U.S. 25 followed by clouds of dust. It raced past the store and swerved into the parking lot at Renfro's big barn (theatre) several hundred yards away where it came to a gravel-crunching stop that once again brought swirls of dust.

Startled, the only thing I could think of to say was, "What was that?"

The late country music singer Red Foley was standing near the store porch. Foley walked over to me and said that "restaurant fellow from just one block of Corbin who sells fried chicken."

I wondered aloud what had brought him to Renfro Valley. "Trying to sell some fried chicken to John Lair. I guess," Foley said with a little laugh.

John Lair was still in at 86, owner and master of ceremonies for the Renfro Valley Bardance. A native of the valley, he had come home to Renfro in 1939 after years as impresario of the WLS Bardance in Chicago to build the music and tourist complex.

In the distance, I saw a white-suited robust man get out of the white Cadillac and walk briskly toward the main office. I remembered him then. It had been at least 20 years before when my family and I had stopped for lunch at his restaurant in

Corbin. I remembered the red-faced "Southern-appearing" man smiling from behind a steamy grill and greeting customers - the picture of a Kentucky gentleman with chicken on his stove and on his mind even then.

Curious about the visitor at Renfro, I hurried to the office. At the door, I met the man in white. We almost collided. He glowered at me, grunted and hurried to the Cadillac where he repeated his speedy arrival with dust flying. I didn't notice at the time it was gold dust.

I was shortly to learn the colonel had missed seeing Lair by minutes. His 45-minute trip from Corbin had been just a joy ride.

From time to time, I would see the old Cadillac whiz by the office window at the Newspaper, the robust driver bent and intent on the road ahead.

Thinking back, at that time in his career, the Kentucky colonel was doing financially well with his Corbin restaurant. But his preoccupation with his chicken recipe and its promotion had seemingly become an obsession. He wanted to try his kind of chicken all over the world.

Because of that desire, he tried to sell his recipe through a type of franchise. He believed Lair, who had made heads of money in music, would be the ideal partner. But Lair was just as determined as the colonel to avoid any financial entanglement.

One afternoon, while I talked with Lair about a project, the colonel drove into the parking area. Lair suddenly recalled something he had to do and "let me back" to the office. I followed.

But the colonel was not to be deterred. He found Lair out back. I stood some distance away while the Colonel talked in hurried tones with Lair nodding from time to time. After their discussion was over, I met the colonel officially, but I brushed him aside in favor of my business engagement with Lair.

Lair later explained the colonel was trying to peddle his chicken recipe, but he (Lair) was not interested in investing at that time. He mused that I might like to risk a thousand dollars.

I declined with a grunt. But I ask you: who in 1958 would want to invest a thousand dollars in a fried chicken empire that was only the dream of a man 70 years of age?

A few weeks later, I met the colonel face to face at a local service station. Remembering me, he talked briefly about his restaurant; how everyone liked his finger lickin' good fried chicken and how a few "investments" were still being accepted.

I thought to myself, "I wouldn't give you a dime for your old chicken recipe, even with your restaurant thrown in."

Someone else did. Lexington lawyer John Y. Brown, Jr. and a Texas millionaire bought the chicken recipe and the Kentucky Fried Chicken name. The rest is history.

I have often counted my mistakes in dollars. The way I figure it, my thousand dollars would have become worth over a million.

It was on July 4, 1977, that the colonel came back to Renfro Valley to honor Lair on John Lair Day. I saw him there, but this time the Colonel King had been financially good to me. I did shake his hand. It felt like a roll of hundred dollar bills.

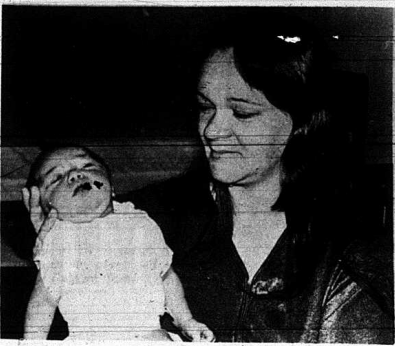
The colonel is gone now. They said during his last bout with leukemia, he still had fried chicken on his hospital menu, but I sort of doubt that, not that the colonel would be shy about it.

The Colonel King has been financially good to a lot of folks during the years he has been a multi-millionaire. Some of his words will live on long after him, for example, the Lincoln Memorial University at Harrogate, Tenn.

His is a simple, straightforward Horatio Alger story of a good old Hoosier boy born in Henryville, Ind., who some folks in Kentucky say, finally saw the light and moved south to Kentucky to seek and find his fortune.

I've been told his mentor, Lawyer Brown, now Kentucky Governor Brown, laid the colonel out in state and style in the rotunda of the Capitol Building in Frankfort.

The colonel would have liked that. I liked that. In fact, I even thought about going to see him in repose, a position he never became accustomed to. But you know it's nearly 400 miles from here to Frankfort and well, with all this high priced gas, I decided to pay my respects at a later date.

got married, they married. By that time, they had dated seven years. What took them so long? "She wouldn't say 'yes,'" Mr. Hiatt said. Mrs. Hiatt had a different story. "We had to grow up for one thing and he went to the Navy. And, for another thing, I guess we didn't have anything to marry with."

Mr. Hiatt proposed by asking Mrs. Hiatt to "Jump the broomstick." "She was a little hesitant about answering, but she said 'yes,'" they were married less than a week later, on December 24, 1920. It wasn't customary to give engagement rings then. Nobody could afford them. "We didn't have wedding

during business hours. Four other children followed the first. Betty was born in 1928, Betty in 1930, Jack in 1932 and June in 1936. "We thought we weren't going to have any boys," said Mrs. Hiatt.

The Depression affected business at the store. "It was rough," said Mr. Hiatt. "There wasn't any money in those days. What people had to pay for their groceries with was mostly chickens and eggs. Some ran out of money and came begging." One man came into the store and said his family was hungry and they wanted to eat. He asked Mr. Hiatt for food and didn't make any offer to pay for it. Mr. Hiatt said, "I just smiled and commenced waiting on him. I asked him what kind of flour he was used to and he said, 'Well, I ain't been used to using none

The effects of the Depression lasted a decade. What was it like raising seven children during that time? "You'll have to try it to find out," said Mr. Hiatt. "We got by -- we always had enough to eat and enough to wear. We didn't have any conveniences."

Besides the store, Mr. Hiatt also became postmaster at Wildie in 1930. It gave them a boost. At that time, the Post Office paid less than \$500 a year. Stamps were only two cents then.

In 1937, they moved into a large, two-story frame house up the hill from the store. World War II started shortly after. Was it as bad as World War I? "I don't believe people were as discouraged in World War I as in World War II," Mr. Hiatt said. "But it was a bad time. People hated to see the boys leave."

All seven children went to

college and five of them finished completely. All seven are or have been schoolteachers. They now have 21 grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren. Their eldest daughter died in 1975.

Mrs. Hiatt hated to see the children leave home but she wouldn't have had them not to marry. "Her and Jean got married," said Mr. Hiatt.

Mr. Hiatt was postmaster for 21 years at Wildie. He was in the store 38 1/2 years. He retired in 1966. "I enjoyed the store. I hated to leave it. That was my life -- it was what I wanted to do when I was a kid."

As far as the marriage was concerned, there were never any doubtful times. Back then people married for keeps, didn't they? "Amen," said Mr. Hiatt. "They don't do that today, do they?"

"Does it seem like 60 years?" "It really doesn't," said Mrs. Hiatt. "I don't think we hardly realized we had had time."

Mr. Hiatt didn't agree. "Yes, I guess so. It's been a happy 60 years. We've enjoyed life and we've enjoyed raising our family. I always felt like I could hold the Post Office if I pulled through and I did."

They both feel very fortunate. "I'm proud of my family," Mr. Hiatt said. "Yes, we are," said Mrs. Hiatt. "We talk about it a lot."

Are they going to go for another 60? "I'm hoping to go another 60," said Mr. Hiatt. Mrs. Hiatt laughed.

**Will Only 144,000 Be In Heaven?**

Jehovah's Witnesses teach, but the Bible, rightly divided, does not. These people make a LITERAL translation out of the most figurative book in the New Testament-Revelation. They cite Rev. 14:3, 7, 4, but ignore the context of the passage, as well as its figurative meaning.

That the "great multitude" was in heaven is evident from the language used. They "stood before the throne" and "before the Lamb, clothed in white robes." Rev. 9:9.

The 144,000 were Jewish virgin men. Rev. 14:4. The Jehovah's Witnesses then are forced to the conclusion that only 144,000 Jewish virgin men will go to heaven. This would exclude all the great Bible characters who were married such as: Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Peter. It would also exclude all women from heaven!

The 144,000 were only the "first fruits unto God." Rev. 14:4. This strongly implies that more were to follow and that these 144,000 would not be a lone. In the "great multitude which no man could number" (Rev. 7:9) did follow.

God is no respecter of persons (Acts 10:34). Paul says, "Blessed are they that his commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life and may enter in through the gates into the city." Everything in the New Testament is based on the saved are going to heaven. Nothing is said about their living on an earthly physical globe.

It cannot help but admire the zeal of the people calling themselves Jehovah's Witnesses, but their doctrines are false because they are based upon a twisting of the Scripture (II Pet. 3:16). They are zealous, but zealously wrong. They may be sincere, but sincerely wrong. If one blindly follows the blind, Jesus said that both will fall into the ditch (Matt. 15:14). All false doctrines fall in the light of God's Word.
