Wouldn't a nice if ther were signs out on the lake d d spots.

Well, on several lakes a round Kentucky there are such signs, and more are going up al the time. Thé signs, pictures of a fish approaching a hook, indi cate where man-made fish at-
tractors have been established. Currently, the Kentucky De partment of Fish and Wildife Resources, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Tennessee $V$ alley Authority are engaged in attractor programs.

Most attractors are made from brush piles anchored to the bottom. Brush is easily ob tained and seems to attract fish better than "artificial" object such as old tires or concre blocks.
With the crappie spawning season upon us, anglers should
find these attractors particular ly productive since they ought to form natural magnets for spawning crappie. However studies have shown that almos all fish--everything from bass to ing much of the year.
Most of the attractors estab. lished by the Fish and Wildlife Department cover about an acre of lake bottom and are marked at each corner by a bouy with
the fish attractor symbol stenciled on it.
A lot of fishermen think they have to park their boat right next to a bouy to be over productive water," says Bill McLemore. the biologist in
charge of the attractor program for Western Kentucky. Actually. McLemore says, there might not be any brush right beside the bouy, since these markers
"One way to determine if you're over an attractor is to notice how often your hook gets snagged on rush," McLemore up, you're not fishing in the right place."
