## Rockcastle County May Be Declared Disaster Area As Result of Flooding

Following the June 6th flooding and the resulting property and crop damage in various parts of the county, a representative of the Division of Disaster Emergency Service is helping conduct an investigation and report with the help of Harold Ballinger of the local ASC office, Gary Asher, Rockcastle County Civil Defense Director, and Paul Hansel, County road foreman.

According to Bill Hendrickson, area co-ordinator, Rockcastle is one of 10 counties for which the report is being submitted to the Governor. He will then forward it to the President with a request that the area be declared a disaster area.

Hendrickson said that even though Rockcastle County is one of the counties less affected by the flooding, its losses have been estimated at \$2.7 million. Other counties included in the report are Jackson, Breathitt, Owsley, Pike, Estill, Perry, Lee, Knott and Magoffin.

In Rockcastle County, crop damage accounted for the largest losses, however, Hendrickson said that 3 or 4 families needed temporary housing and a total of 10 families were affected and will qualify for individual Family Grants in the amount of \$5,000 to replace household belongings.

Qualifying for Federal funds in the event the President gives approval, Rockcastle will be eligible for assistance from several state and federal agencies including Small Business Administration, Farmers Home Administration and public assistance for roads and bridges. Hendrickson further stated that if the area is not so declared that President Reagan could lose certain agencies to come in with aid anyway.

Hendrickson said Wednesday morning that he should have some word on the decision by Friday (tomorrow).

## Mayor Gives City Budget Message for 1981-82

The City of Mt. Vernon expects to take in \$113,976 this year and expend the same amount, according to a budget message given the City Council last week by Mayor Roland Mullins.

This year's budget is up almost \$15,000 from last year and the increase in income for the city is primarily in the property tax and franchise tax categories. In 1980-81, property taxes and franchise tax totaled \$46,500 and it is expected that these same two revenues will bring in \$57,000 in 1981-82. The income section of the general fund shows an increase in municipal aid (streets) from the \$17,500 in 1980-81 to \$24,400 in 1981-82. Revenue Sharing is expected to increase from \$19,864 to \$24,476. However, three categories—parking meter monies, court revenue and privilege licenses—are all expected to generate slightly less revenue this year than last.

On the debit side of the budget, salaries and fringe benefits are the big item of expense with \$46,053 budgeted for this-up almost \$4,000 from last year.

The budget for the water and sewer department is up some \$30,000 with increases in income in the sale of water and sewer service (\$252,000 as opposed to \$243,000 last year) and the inclusion of a \$20,000 Area

Development Fund Grant of \$20,000 accounting for the major difference.

Expense items for the department are headed by \$70,064 for personnel, fringe and other (as opposed to \$65,728 last year) and \$84,146 for supplies, equipment and other operating costs (\$52,764 last year). Utilities are also expected to cost some \$4,000 more with \$21,382 budgeted for this-last year it was \$17,000.

In Mayor Mullins' budget message to the council, it was pointed out that fire trucks, office equipment, police cars and other city-owned equipment are in substantial compliance with current needs; that all buildings are adequately maintained and that the city streets are essentially in excellent repair. Mayor Mullins also pointed out that sufficient funds are contained in the budget to adequately maintain existing streets. However, he also mentioned that isolated situations exist that should be given special attention such as the recently annexed Fairground Hill section.

In the Water and Sewer portion of the budget message, Mayor Mullins said that effective July 1, 1981, the water and sewer fund for the City is free of indebtedness (with the exception of bonds sold during the 1960's which are being amortized over a forty-year period).

The big item of interest in this section of the message is that both budgets are based on no increase in taxes and no increase in water and sewer bills to city of Mt. Vernon customers.

Mayor Mullins also made several recommendations in the water and sewer department budget and they were: (1) It is recommended that the engineering requirements be completed on the sewer plant so the City will be qualified for necessary federal monies should they become available to upgrade the system. (2) It is recommended that no expansion of the facility be undertaken prior to the federal government timetable which appears to be 1983 and that, (3) It is recommended that no new personnel be added during the 1981-82 fiscal year. The water and sewer fund is financially sound, Mayor Mullins' message said, as a result of the existing austerity program—reduction of 2.5 full-time equivalent personnel, expanding only when it is financially feasible.

Mullins also recommended to the council that any excess revenue generated by the increase in rates to the three big contractors—Western, Brodhead and Northern, be deposited and maintained for replacement purposes, thus reducing the need for increased individual bills in the future.

This was the second hearing on the 1981-82 budget which is scheduled for adoption at the July 13th meeting of the council.

## Healthy Children Make Father's Days Happy

Sometimes fathers of young children fail to let the true joy and privilege of fatherhood bestow itself upon them. They are often physically drained from working to provide financial security for young dependents while at the same time sharing the emotional strain of meeting the daily needs of small children.

One young father, Jimmy Whitaker and his wife, Sheila, feel especially grateful and thankful this Father's Day for the privilege of having their two healthy boys, Matthew, 2, and Marcus, 2 1/2 months.

Little Marcus was born at 1:30 p.m. on Friday, March 27th, one day before he was due, according to the doctor's predictions. As soon as he was born, a wheezing was detected. Jim and Sheila were assured the cause was likely fluid and mucus that needed to be suctioned, so the baby was whisked away. Jimmy came back home Friday afternoon to tell friends and family that all was well and to rest a few minutes before cleaning up and going back to the Lake Cumberland Medical Center in Somerset.

When he reached the hospital that night, he found out that his new son was not well. He had been put under an oxygen tent and intravenous feeding had been initiated. During the last stages of labor Sheila had been given Demerol and doctors thought the baby was possibly suffering from lingering effects of the drug. If this were the case, the effects would wear off in 24 hours. After 24 hours no change was evident.

Marcus' problem has not yet been fully understood named. He was, according to his mother, not able to inhale deeply enough to get the oxygen his

body needed. His breathing was so shallow and rapid (120 per minute compared to a normal of 40) that they were told by the attending pediatrician that fatigue could set in since it was impossible to continue breathing that fast and hard for very long.

The agony of being told by the doctor that the baby might die overwhelmed the young parents. Jimmy said people remarked to him that the baby had not really been that part of their lives yet and that its death would be easier to bear than if it were older. However Jimmy and Sheila did not agree and could not understand.

Doctors had begun trying to find a place for him in one of the two hospitals in Kentucky which treat critically ill babies, Norton Children's Hospital in Louisville or the U.K. Medical Center in Lexington. Beds at both facilities were full, but Norton finally agreed to take him anyway. On Sunday, March

29th, the state air transport plane with a doctor and two specially trained nurses from Norton, flew to Somerset and picked up 2-day old Marcus.

Since Sheila had only been allowed to hold the baby for two minutes, before he was loaded into the ambulance for the ride to the plane, he was wheeled into Sheila's room where the parents and both sets of grandparents waited to say goodbye. When Jim and Sheila tell about the parting, tears cannot be totally stifled even yet. Sheila said that the Baby was attached to numerous grotesque looking contraptions and was crying a weak, helpless cry. When she reached a hand through and patted him, his crying stopped (and everyone in the room started).

In the plane his breathing gave way and he was attached to a respirator which forced air deeper into his lungs. He re-

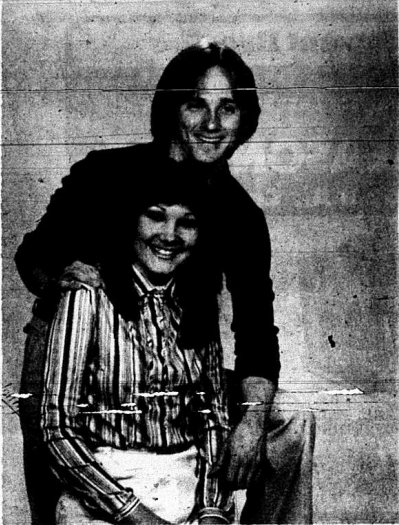

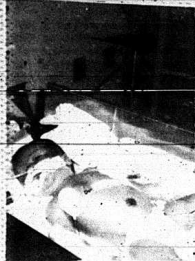

**Legislative Report**

By Rep. Harold DeMarcus

The 1982 General Assembly will be faced with the issue of enacting a statewide automobile title law.

Kentucky is the only state without a title bill, and state police officials contend that lack of such a law has made the Commonwealth a dumping ground for stolen vehicles and parts.

Current Kentucky law stipulates that an owner receive a certificate of both title and registration when he annually registers his vehicle in the county clerk's office. The certificate is immediately negotiable if he wants to sell the vehicle.

Under a title law proposed during the 1980 General Assembly, the owner would still get a certificate of registration from the county clerk. However, the

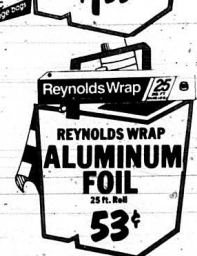

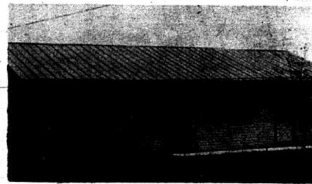

Today, the ice cream cone continues to be one of America's favorite treats.

Ice cream has been enjoyed in one form or another since Roman times. Emperor Nero kept his slaves busy running snow for confections from the nearest white capped mountains of Rome. Once, when a royal shipment of snow arrived in a state of slush on a blistering summer day, Nero peevishly executed the general in charge.

Some three centuries ago, Charles I of England introduced a dessert made of frozen milk and cream at state banquets. It was so successful that the king commanded his French chef to keep the recipe a royal secret and gave him a handsome yearly pension. But by the time Charles was beheaded by political opponents in 1649, his secret was out, and every nobleman was serving ice cream.

History records that it was Jacob Fussell of Baltimore who started the first American ice cream factory more than a century ago. Even before that, George Washington had an ice cream freezer at Mt. Vernon and Dolly Madison delighted guests at the White House with ice cream when her husband was president. But Fussell was the first to make ice cream commercially in a factory. In doing so, he was able to cut the price by

more than half and we've been a nation of ice cream eater ever since.

Ice cream is only one of the many dairy products which the U.S. Department of Agriculture says are plentiful in May and June. USDA marketing specialists explain this is the time of year when dairy cows are giving milk with greatest enthusiasm. This is because the combination of warm weather and lush pasture grasses stimulate milk production.

Almost everyone enjoys the different taste of homemade ice cream. The popular recipe for vanilla should win a host of compliments. For one gallon you need:

- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
  - 5 eggs, separated
  - 2 cups whole milk
  - 2 teaspoons flavoring
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 1 large can evaporated milk
  - 1 pint half-and-half
- Enough additional whole milk to fill the freezer insert

To make, beat the egg yolks in a mixing bowl, until thick. Then, mix 1 1/2 cups of the sugar and the cornstarch together and add to the egg yolks. Continue beating the mixture and add evaporated milk and 2 cups whole milk. Place in top of double boiler and cook over

boiling water until mixture starts to thicken. Remove and cool.

Then, beat the egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Beat in half-and-half and enough whole milk to complete filling the insert and freeze. For variation add crushed strawberries, blackberries, peaches, bananas or any other fruit before adding milk to freezer.

Whether homemade or ready-made, you'll find ice cream an economical and delicious way to combat hot weather.

Strawberry-Buttermilk Sherbert

- 1 pint fresh strawberries
- 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin
- 1 1/4 cups buttermilk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- dash lemon juice

Wash fresh strawberries, slice into a bowl, sprinkle with sugar and marinate one hour at room temperature.

Brush and drain the berries reserving the liquid. Add water to the juice, if needed, to yield about one cup. Soften unflavored gelatin in one third cup of the strawberry juice. Dissolve over hot water and pour into buttermilk. Add a half cup more of berry juice, a half cup of sugar

title needed to sell the vehicle would be issued by the state Transportation Department's Bureau of Vehicle Regulation in Frankfort. Advocates of the proposal claim that this would allow a centralized check against state and national reports of stolen vehicles.

The Department of Transportation would be charged with the responsibility for de-

velopment and installation of the automated motor vehicle and trailer registration and titling system throughout Kentucky's 120 counties.

An automated title system is now operating in 19 counties under a program ordered by the 1976 General Assembly. Department of Transportation officials have indicated that it cost the state \$800,000 to purchase and install the 19 computer terminals in the county clerk's offices and link them to a central computer in Frankfort.

Also, transportation officials estimate that it will cost the state \$1.6 million to purchase the computer hardware necessary to implement the system in the remaining 101 counties. Basically, there are two major opponents to the title law.

First, county clerks, who have successfully opposed attempts to enact a title law in the past seven legislative sessions, because they feel it would remove some power and fees from their offices. Second, some legislators feel that the title law is a good cause, but behind every good cause is a tax increase.

Advocates of the title law believe it would be very beneficial to the consumer, by reducing the registration and transfer of stolen motor vehicles and trailers in Kentucky and by making it easier to detect and recover stolen vehicles.

Advocates also believe that an automated motor vehicle and trailer registration and titling system will pay for itself in the long run by improving efficiency in the collecting of the motor vehicle usage tax, license fee and personal property taxes.

## Spring of '81 Was one of Worst for Forest Fires

The Spring of 1981 will be remembered by Kentucky Division of Forestry personnel in Eastern Kentucky as one of the worst forest fire seasons on record. According to District Forester H.F. Whitaker, the ten-county Southeastern District, which includes Rockcastle County, suffered a total of 741 fires this spring which burned 37,833 acres. This is the most fires ever recorded for one fire season. All but 45 of these fires were the direct result of man's use of fire and could therefore have been prevented. The major fire causes in the District were debris burning, which caused 289 fires, and arson, which resulted in 223 fires. Other causes included 88 fires due to smoking, 52 fires set by children and 38 fires from hunters smoking out game.

Rockcastle County had 68 fires which burned 3,839 acres, according to Rockcastle County Ranger Steve Bullen. Over 73% of these fires were due to arson and debris burning.

"With the extreme burning conditions and as many as 75 fires per day requiring control action, the District could not have begun to cope without a lot of help," commented District Forester Whitaker. "It is not practical to list each individual, but our special thanks go to McKinney Reunion

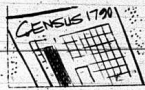
