## Council Adopts Ordinance Limiting Swimming to Lake's Beach Area

An ordinance against swimming anywhere in Lake Louisville other than the beach area was the main item on the agenda for Tuesday night's called meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council.

The ordinance, to be published in next week's Signal, was approved by the council in an effort to keep the public from swimming in other areas of the lake which might prove dangerous and particularly from swimming from the valve stand near the dam. Water Superintendent Matt Powell, Jr. told the council that the stand had been bent by people swimming off it and that he felt there was the possibility that the 12-inch pipe in the stand had now been broken.

The fine for violating the ordinance was set at a sum not to exceed \$50 and the ordinance will be effective upon publication in the Mt. Vernon Signal.

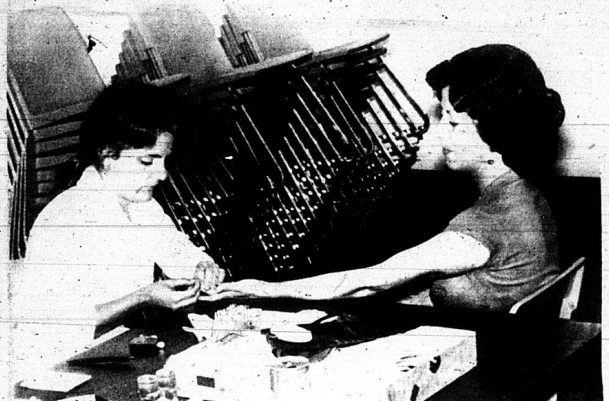
In other business, the council heard a request for a 10% pay increase for city and water department employees. Most of the men employed now are paid \$4 per hour and a 10% increase would bring their hourly wage to \$4.40.

The council decided to go over the budget, which provides for a 5.5% increase (or 22 cents per hour) and see if they might trim some other allocations in order to provide the requested increase. The matter will be taken up again at the regular

August meeting and, whatever decision is reached as to the percentage, the increase will be retroactive to July 1.

The council did take action on a request to allow three weeks vacation for city and water department employees after 10 years.

The council then discussed, for some time, a proposed rate increase with representatives of Northern Water District, Western Water Association and the City of Brodhead. The upshot of this discussion was that these representatives were asked to seek approval by their boards or councils as to the appointment of one individual to represent all three users in a meeting with a representative of the city and engineer Jack Crawford. At this meeting, if the format is approved by the three users, the cost of producing water per thousand gallons will be determined and the user's rate will be increased to this amount plus some small percentage factor of profit for the city. This is all contingent, of course, on the three users obtaining permission from their boards and council for this method being used and for an agreement then being reached as to the cost per thousand gallons.

## Accidents on County Roads

State policeman Jimmie Silvers investigated a 4.9 vehicle accident on Ky. 461, 4.9 miles south of Mt. Vernon, Monday about 12:45 p.m.

According to Silvers, the driver of one of the vehicles, Michael Cable, of Route 1, Mt. Vernon, told him that he was trying to get a bee out of the cab of the truck when he came across into the opposite lane hitting the vehicle driven by Ralph Glen Floyd of Jabez.

The truck driven by Cable, then struck the ditch and overturned. Cable received facial injuries.

Floyd was arrested on the scene and charged with transporting alcoholic beverages in a local option territory for the purpose of resale, following the discovery of 14 cases of beer in the trunk of his car.

An accident on the Purrgigsby Road 2.6 miles north of Mt. Vernon near the Junction of 1326 Sunday, sent two men to the Rockcastle County Hospital with class 3 injuries.

According to State Trooper Jimmie Silvers, Ricky Harris, 27, of Brodhead, was traveling south and as he came around a curve in the road, he came out into the left lane and sideswiped the oncoming vehicle driven by Roy Croucher, 45, of Berea.

A three car pile-up resulted from a stopped vehicle on the inside southbound lane of I-75 about 9:00 p.m. Friday night.

According to state police investigator, Jack Lewis, Adriana Suzanna Demirdjian, 37, of Rockcastle, Michigan ob-

## Governor Returns More Mineral Tax Severance Monies to Counties

Governor John Y. Brown, Jr. has distributed the first of some \$22.7 million that will be returned to counties this year under the Brown Administration's new minerals tax revenue sharing program.

Projects indicate that over \$700 million will be returned to coal producing, coal mining and mineral producing cities and counties during the first 10 years of the new program.

The counties would have received only \$5 million under the old program compared to the \$22.7 million total for this year under the new Brown Administration program.

Brown presented the first checks as part of an initial return to county judges and mayors of recipient local governments under the program known as the Local Govern-

ment Economics Assistance Fund. City and county governments in 106 of Kentucky's 120 counties will participate in this program.

The funds are the first to be returned under Governor Brown's new revenue sharing program for the severance of coal and other minerals. The program, resulting from legislation proposed by Governor Brown during the 1980 General Assembly, is designed to return a portion of the taxes collected from the severance of coal and other minerals back to the counties that produced the mineral. Funds also go to counties that are directly impacted by the production and transportation of the minerals.

Brown frequently has cited the Local Government Eco-

nomics Assistance program as the best example of his effort to return not just the responsibility of governing to the local level, but also to provide the funds to support that responsibility.

"Throughout this Administration one of our main priorities has been to return programs to units of government closest to the people, that is to our counties and cities," Brown said.

Under the new program, starting July 1, 1982, 50 percent of all coal severance tax collected above a base of \$177.6 million will be returned to counties and cities which produce or are impacted by the production of coal.

Also under the program, 50

## County receives road allocation

The state Department of Transportation has announced a \$284,703 allocation to Rockcastle County for rural secondary road maintenance and improvements in fiscal year 1981-82.

The funds will provide

maintenance along 74.7 miles of rural secondary roads in Rockcastle County, Transportation Secretary Frank Meeks said.

Improvement projects include construction of a bridge on Ky. 1249, Mt. Vernon-Sand Springs Road.

The Rural secondary road program was established in 1948 to help maintain and improve the farm-to-market and other essential rural roads. It is financed with 22 percent of the motor fuels taxes collected in Kentucky.

## Sunday Afternoon Excitement

If you were curious enough to investigate a noise which sounded like a twin engine plane or perhaps a helicopter about 1:30 Sunday afternoon, you probably got a glimpse of "the blimp." One of the largest of a new fleet of four Good Year blimps, that is.

The craft was so low that it looked like it might be getting ready to land near here and needless to say caused lots of excitement.

The aircraft, named the "Enterprise" was destined for Cincinnati to spend the night before traveling to Akron to its home; however, the threat of bad weather caused it to set down at Bluegrass Field in Lexington. The craft did not leave Bluegrass Field until Tuesday morning about 10:30.

Reportedly, the blimp has a crew of about 16, most of whom travel on the ground. There is room for only 6 passengers and a pilot to travel aloft.

The blimp has the capacity to travel about 80 mph, but usually cruises at about 35 mph.

According to one of the crew members, the new blimp is equipped with a panel of electrical lights which are used for illuminating when the craft is at night.

## Shooting at Livingston

A scuffle about 1:00 a.m. Saturday morning on the Sand Hill Road near Livingston resulted in a shooting, according to the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office.

Sheriff Henry Lee Abney said that Livingston City Policeman, Lewis Mink, 25, told him that two men whom he suspected of being "drunk and smoked up" followed him home when he went off duty late Friday night causing a disturbance and telling Mink that he couldn't arrest them. When they sped off, Mink pursued them

and in a confrontation and scuffle that followed, Mink shot one of the subjects, Gary Griffin, 19, of Livingston. According to Abney, the other suspect, identified by Mink as Jerry Thomas, escaped and has not been arrested as yet.

Mink brought Griffin, who was wounded in the abdomen, to the Rockcastle County Hospital for treatment. He was later transferred to U.K. Medical Center in Lexington. His condition of the patient was withheld at the request of the patient.

## Double Drownings

Two Laurel County youths drowned in the Rockcastle River 11 miles southwest of Livingston Sunday about 5:30 p.m., according to the London Post of the Kentucky State Police.

Sebastian Southward and Cecil Whitaker, both 16 and both of Route 2, London apparently were swimming in

the river when one of the boys got into trouble. The other youth attempted to rescue his friend but also drowned according to State trooper Conley Allen, who investigated the accident.

The bodies were recovered by the Laurel County Rescue Squad at 10:30 p.m. Sunday.

## NOTE TO VETERAN ENTERING SCHOOL

If you're a veteran planning to enroll in or return to school this fall under the GI Bill, the Veterans Administration has a useful check list to help keep those VA education benefits coming regularly.

- Double check your choice of courses to be certain they will count toward your educational objective.

- Register early. VA and your school need time to process your registration so that GI Bill checks can be started your way promptly.

- Avoid dropping classes after registration.

- If you're a GI Bill beneficiary as early as possible. If you have to interrupt your education, notify VA promptly and advise the date your expect to return to classes.

- If you change addresses, notify VA promptly. Of course, you'll want to notify the school and the post office, also.

- Submit transcripts to the college admissions and records office immediately after application is made. This will speed up the school's certification to the Veterans Administration.

- If you have any questions about the GI Bill or eligibility for it, contact the nearest VA regional office, or a service officer from one of the national veterans organizations.

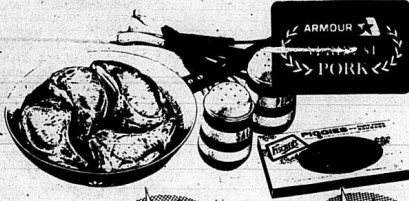

## EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

**Making Pickles**

I've been getting lots of questions lately about pickles. Let's take a look at how they should turn out, then mention some of the common problems and what causes them.

Cucumber pickles should be firm, solid and a dark-olive green color. They should be translucent and have a uniform color throughout.

Relishes should have a crisp texture and have the color of the original fruit or vegetable.

Mixed pickles should be firm, crisp and have a bright color.

**Why Are Pickles Soft?**

This could be for one of several reasons: You used too weak a brine; you didn't keep the cucumbers covered with brine; you overprocessed them; the seal was not airtight; you used moldy garlic and spices.

**Why Are They Shrivelled?**

Because you overcooked them, or overprocessed them, or put cucumbers in too strong a solution of brine, vinegar or sugar.

**Why Are They Heavier or Paler?**

If they are hollow, it is

because you used poorly-developed cucumbers, or you let them stand more than 24 hours before brining; or you used too strong or too weak a brine during fermentation.

**Pale, whitening pickles are due to improper brining.**

**Rules For Success**

I can't say the following often enough: Use only fresh, good quality fruits and vegetables for pickling, follow your recipe to the letter, use the right ingredients and measuring them accurately; use a good standard vinegar, free from sediment; use only coarse salt and soft water for brining; use wholly fresh spices and never leave them in the jars of pickles; and always process your pickles and relishes in a boiling-water bath canner for the time given in an up-to-date recipe.

People didn't use to process pickles in the old days and a batch of spoiled pickles was not too uncommon. Open-kettle canning without processing just can't guarantee a safe high-quality product with good storage life.

**What Fruits To Pickle**

You can pickle almost any fruit, but the favorites are peaches, pears, crab apples, cantaloupe and watermelon rind.

**What Vegetables To Pickle**

You can pickle almost any vegetable, but the favorites are: okra, just the small and tender ends; green

tomatoes, cauliflower, carrots and green beans.

Mixed vegetables are especially good. Here is the recipe from our pickles and relishes circular.

**Mixed Vegetable Pickles**

1 quart small cucumbers  
2 cups pickling onions  
2 cups small pieces of cauliflower  
2 cups carrots (cut in 1/4-inch slices)  
2 cups string beans  
1/2 cup coarse salt  
1 quart water  
1/2 cup white mustard seed  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
1 1/4 quarts vinegar

Cover vegetables with a brine made from the salt and water. Let stand overnight. Drain, cover vegetables with clear water, and let stand for 2 hours. Drain, cover with mixture of sugar and vinegar, and let stand overnight.

Drain off the vinegar and heat it to simmering. Then add vegetables and simmer 15 minutes. Drain, cover with mixture of sugar and vinegar, and let stand overnight.

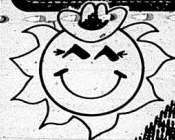

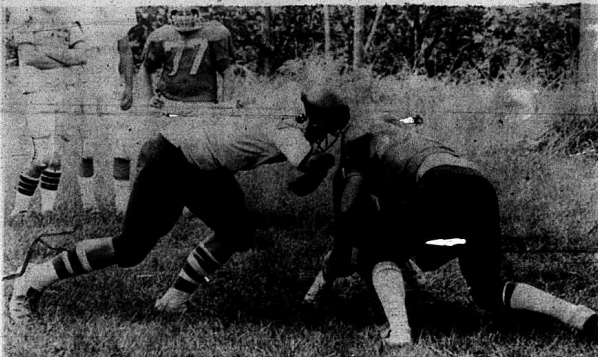

The Little League All-Stars lost in the championship game of the District, Area 1 tournament held at the fairgrounds last week. The Little League's lost to a fine London team.

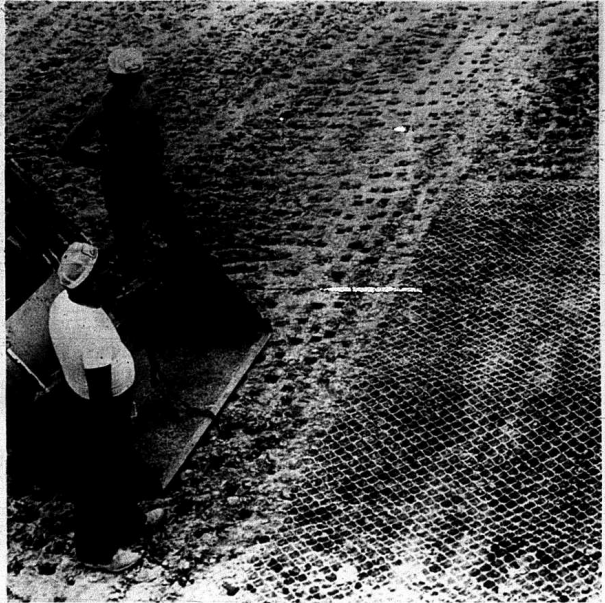
## Little League Picnic Is This Sunday At Brodhead

### COLLEGE GAME HAS THE EDGE

LEXINGTON — Collegiate basketball is the new darling of the TV networks. CBS was willing to shell out \$48 million for the rights to televise the NCAA finals for the next three years.

Meanwhile, the NBA is having a rough time on the tube. CBS has one more year to go on its contract to televise the pro games. Despite a slight increase in the ratings this year, NBA games are still a poor draw. Consequently, CBS has kept them out of prime time. The championship game was delayed until 11:30 p.m. this year.

Why is there such a difference in the popularity of the same sport at the two levels? Bobby Knight, who coached Indiana University to the college national championship this year, thinks there are several reasons. "I think the pros simply let the game get out of hand, particularly during the playoffs," says Bobby. "It becomes a wrestling match rather than a basketball game. I don't think we have that in college play."

Bobby says the pro games are too much alike. If you see one, it looks like every other game. He believes the fact the pros are forced to use only one defense (man-to-man) and the 24-second clock doesn't give the game much variety.

He thinks the main reason, though, is the long schedule. "This year when we played North Carolina in the NCAA finals, it was our 35th game," said Knight. "That's the most games I've ever coached in a year. And it felt like it, too. I don't know how you could go through 82 games, plus exhibition games and playoffs. If you do anything in the playoffs you're going to be playing 110 games. That's about 75 too many."

Another reason the TV ratings for the pro sport have been poor has been the late hour of the delayed telecasts, especially during the playoffs. That will be corrected next season.

The NBA will start its season on Oct. 30 this year, about 3 weeks later than usual. That means the championship series will start after the May ratings period, so CBS has announced the games will be televised live next season.

But don't hold your breath waiting for the NBA to catch up with the college game, in popularity. It's not going to happen any time soon.

I agree with Bobby Knight. If you've seen one pro game, you've seen them all.

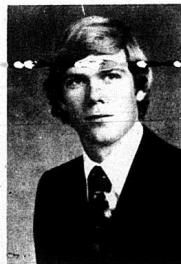

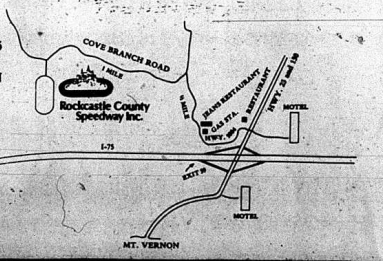

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**Accent on Youth:**

**This Young Band Plays Every Chance it Gets**

In the next several feature articles, we will attempt to focus on a few of the many positive aspects of the area's youth and help provide a ready answer to the antique and irate question, "What is this younger generation coming to?" We have chosen to do this because we believe these constructive forces in the community deserve more references and the destructive forces less attention.

If you attended one of several recent community activities, you may have had the pleasure of hearing the new Arrival band perform.

The band is composed of ten high school students from RCHS who organized about two weeks before their first performance at the Rockcastle Revue the first week in May. They played two songs at this first performance, but two weeks later, they were seen at the May Festival and their repertoire had increased to seven songs. Since then, they have played at the Family Life Center's Family-A-Fair the 4th of July and, most recently, at the hospital sponsored fish fry.

The jazz-rock band was a dream come true for seventeen-year-old Jack Lewis who will be a senior at RCHS this fall. After failing to get anyone interested in helping organize the group this spring, Jack said that he was telling his chemistry teacher about his desire one day and the teacher said, "Do it yourself." It was not that Jack had never thought of this idea before. In grade school, Jack made several futile attempts to round up his buddies (who were not as musically serious as he) and bring them to his house to

practice and be in his "band." His main problem then was discipline, but now he says he has no such problem. In fact, he feels that members "lay back" and don't express their opinions enough.

Arrival has no adult supervision or sponsorship in the area of its music. Every accomplishment has been organized and carried out by these teenagers. However, they are all quick to point out that without their parents' support and help they could not have done it.

Jack arranges the music, note by note, from what he calls "sketch scores" which are scores for piano with some extra parts. He then has copies made. The night before their last performance, he stayed up all night arranging the music for guest vocalist, Dana Clifford's "Don't Cry Out Loud."

The hand-picked group (none of whom had to be begged, according to Jack), includes fourteen-year-old Trevor Mink, the youngest member of the group. Trevor plays drums and his sixteen-year-old sister, Tracy, plays electric piano. Tracy's other interests besides her music include sewing and bowling and her brother was honorable mention on the all-star senior league team this year. Trevor and Tracy's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Don Mink.

Playing tenor saxophone for the band is 16-year-old Mark Lovell, son of Mrs. Dorothy Lovell. Mark's favorite pastime is reading (especially "Mad" Magazine). The other saxophone player is Donald Jones, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Jones, Sr. of Livingston. Donald plays tenor and alto sax and says he probably enjoys art and music more than anything but has a

slight "everything." Mickie Pruitt, 15, and Jennifer Hayes, 17, play trumpet for the group. Mickie, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Freddie Pruitt of Brodhead, also enjoys skating and softball. Jennifer lives on a farm, enjoys chorus and piano and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hayes.

Seventeen-year-old Scott Henderson plays the group's only trombone. Scott, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Henderson, says he also likes to play softball.

Elizabeth Proctor plays flute and sings with the band. She is the 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Proctor of Brodhead. Elizabeth enjoys chorus and does some babysitting in her free time.

Bobby Bailey, the other lead singer for the group, is the sixteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bailey. One of Bobby's other interests is art.

Jack Lewis, leader of the group, is the son of Betty Lewis and Dr. Jack Lewis. He plays bass guitar and piano and, in the high school band, he is field director and plays trombone. When Jack is not busy with his music and other interests, he holds down a part-time job at the local car wash.

Others have had input into the group. For instance, Anthony Machal thought of the name for the band. All members of the group liked the name immediately upon hearing it. Mark McFerron designed the new blue and orange tee shirts which bear the name Arrival done artistically on the front, the band member's name on the back and the name of the instrument on the sleeve.

The type music the band plays is "easy listening" or "dinner music," not dance mu-

sic. They like to compare their style to the group "Chicago," a musical group of a few years ago. When asked if they play "country music," they say they copy country music type harmony in some of their songs.

The band has exciting and fun times, both at their engagements and on the outings they take as a group. They often go out to eat together, attend a movie, go on picnics or just go to someone's home and play Monopoly.

They giggle about the fact that a lady who sings gospel-rock called to audition to sing with the group.

For "shock value," they took a paper mache camel bearing the sign "Happy 4th - Eat Chicken" to share the stage with them at their 4th of July engagement. The camel belonged to Julie, Jack's sister, and the sign was copied from a Colonel Sander's sign. The camel (not as enduring as its reputation) had a leg to give way during the debut and by the end of the day required extensive rehabilitation.

Jack says its very hard to

get everyone together at the same time and the same place there are so many other activities which interfere. They would like to play as much as possible both in practice sessions and on stage. Usually, they practice once or twice a week at some band member's house. All members seem optimistic about the band's future and expect it to continue and become more professional as time goes on.

"Keep both feet on the floor, shut both eyes and go for it." That is the catch phrase coined by leader Jack Lewis, intended to psyche the band up while on stage. To which member Scott Henderson adds, "You can't fall off the floor."

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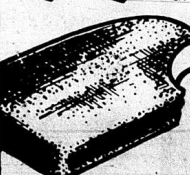



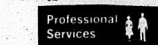
