

Waking Pickles

I've been getting lots of questions lately about pickles. Let's take a look at how they should turn out, then mention some of the common problems and what causes them. The should be time to be the should be time to be the should be translucent and have a uniform color throughout.

Relishes should have a crisp texture and have the color of the original fruit or vegetables.

Mixed pickles should be firm, crisp and have a bright color.

Why Are Pickles Soft?

This could be for one of several reasons: You used too weak a brine; you didn't keep the cucumbers covered with brine; you overprocessed them; the seal was not airtight; you used moldy agrile and spices used moldy garlic and spices.

Why Are They Shriveled? Because you overcooked them, or overprocessed them, or put cucumbers in too strong a put cucumbers in too strong a solution of brine, vinegar or sugar.

Why Are They Hellor or Pale?

If they are hollow, it is

because you used poorly-developed cucumbers; or you let them stand more than 24 hours before brining; or you used too strong or too .weak a brine during fermentation.

Pale, whitish pickles are due to improper brining.

Rules For Success
I can't say the following often enough: Use only frish, good quality fruits and vegetables for pickling follow your recipe to the letter, using the right ingredients and measuring them accurately, use a good standard vinegar, free from sediment; use only coarse salt and soft water for brining; use whole fresh spices and never leave them in the jars of pickles and relishes in a bolling-water bath canner for the time given in an entire the spice of the




