Starting July 15, 1982, the minimum fine for violation of the burning laws is \$100. As chairman of the Safety Committee. Asher has to drill new employees on the safety procedures of the hospital. 



Woman's enduring appreciation of beauty coupled with the stamina and determination to produce beauty and pleasant surroundings are qualities that deserve focusing on.

Never let it be thought that mountain woman, elthouse the longing for beauty or failed to recognize the value of it even in circumstances which seemed hostile to what one generally considers lovely.

Yet, in that intense struggle, woman was able to project some of her inate artistic abilities in the quilts she made, clother she created, flowers and gardense and for the home she made and kept clean.

This story is a simple retelling by an 82-year-old

We lived in a remote section of Rockeastle County when I was born in 1900 in a four room. I shaped house which consisted or mouse and double-boxed rooms, added later.

Beauty was a clean house for my mother and most of her "spare" time was spent keeping our house spotless or making something to make it look better.

We used homemade lye soap or Big Deal soap (a large cake of strong soap) and sand. Some people left the sand on the floor, to be eventually swept out, but not my mother, she rinsed her floors until all remains of the sand were gone and the planks were white.


