

The main drawback Mr.
Ballinger sees to the program is that farmers are very restricted on how they dispose of their excess dairy cows in order to cut back population 5 to 30 percent. "Cows must be sold for all their companies of their companies of the program of the program

"That's a loss of about \$900 per cow and most dairy producers have already culled their herd and don't wanner." Ballinger said that farmers established their base with the dairies late in the year and that when the program goes out in March of 1985, producers would be held to this base or have to take a læss price per pound for milk produced over their established base.

Under the terms of the program, which will run for a 15-month period from Jan 1, 1984, farmers will be paid a \$10 per hundredweight subsidy to reduce their milk production from 5 to 30 per-cent.

Milk producers who wish to participate in the program will be required to establish a base production quota, based on past production, to determine hether they actually meduce produce it.
