





Jim Bussell overcomes rare kidney disease with help of "rare" family

When I called to ask Jim Bussell for an interview about his recent kidney transplant, his wife, Nancy, answered the phone. "Iim's out in the back, yard flying a kite with the kids," she said. "It's un-

The Bussells' story is not only unreal, it's also unusual. And touching.
The first half of the story involves the 33-year-old Bussell finding out that he needed a kidney transplant because of a rare, incurable kidney disease. 
