Administrator Wayne Stewart announced that a special effort has been made to accompdate persons needing outpatient surgery by cutting the fees charged for it.

Not only does the program save money, it also saves time. If the required surgery can be done on an outpatient basis it keeps the patient from having an overnight set.

Surgery is usually done in the operating room, and, if no complications arise, the patient goes home the same day, as the operation.

- The Rockcastle County
Hospital has been expanding its

list of outpatient surgery procedures for over a year under the direction of Dr. A.E.T. Thomsen, a general surgeon. He is aided by an anesthetist and an operating room nursing staff.

One of the main reasons for the increase in outpatient surgery is that insurance companies, as well as Medicate and Medicaid, have started refusing to pay for inpatient surgery that could have been done on an outpatient basis. Several of the procedures performed—at the Rockcastle County Hospital are the following: Excision of cysts, Jesons—and lumps, circumcision, minor skin grafts, male and fernale sterilizations, repairing minor fractures, toenail removal, D and C's and biopsies of the breast, cervix and muscle.

Tonsilectomies, closing lacerations and repairing "minor reputers are also done on an outpatient basis, along with several other operations.

Heat exhaustion occurs when a person's body lacks enough liquid and salt to tolerate excessive sweating. The symptoms include pale, clammy skin, nausea, dizziness and faintness. Breathing and pulse and faintness.

rate may rise, and headache and muscle cramps develop. If the heat exhaustion is not treated, heatstroke may develop.

In case of heat exhaustion, lay the person down in a cool place out of the sun and elevate their feet. Loosen the person's clothing, and if they're conscious give them water to drink with a little salt added, if possible.

Heatstroke
Prolonged exposure to intensely hot weather or the sun can cause heatstroke or sunstroke. Symptoms include a high temperature; flushed hot, dry skirs, and unconsciousness. Body temperature must be rapidly reduced. At a temperature of 107 to 108 degrees farenheit, not uncommon in heatstroke, brain damage or desth can occur.

If heatstroke occurs, move the person to a cool place.

Next, fan the person and rub their arms and legs toward their heart. Continue the fanning and rubbing until the temperature drops to 101 degrees farenheit. If the temperature starts to rise

again, repeat the cooling proceduses. And finally, get medical attention for the person as soon as possible.

#### Adult Protective

#### Service now available

When a baby or a small child in Rockcastle County is beaten or seriously neglected, authorities move to enforce child abuse laws and to protect the young victims

who are unable to protect them-

selves:

But what about abused adults who can't fend for themselves-elderly people, the adults with disabilities, the abused sopuses? These citizens also have a law and sgencies to protect them. According to Cabinet for Human Resources Secretary Al Austin, the Department for Social Services office in Rockcastle County can provide help through its Adult Protective Services workers.

"Simply put, that's their mandate," said Austin, "to investigate alleged abuse or neglect, to assist adults in Kentucky who need protection and to-tucky who need protection and to-tucky who need protection and to-tucky with the protection workers are declicated beyond resolving a single incident in the life of a person referred to our office," he said. The failure of an institution of individual to provide the proper assistance to a dependent adult constitutes caretaker neglect. The institution could be a nursing home, a family care home, a provider of in-home services or any other agency responsible for providing specific services.

Exploitation is the misuse of an individual's government benefit funds by another person or agency. This category includes misappropriation of unemployment benefits, social security checks or other government assistance funds.

Newman said the first step in all cases referred to Adult Protective Services is to set up direct contact between the staff and the affected individual. "When appropriate, we attempt to put the victim in touch with community services that can help prevent future abuse, neglect or "exploitation," he said.
Rockcastle Countians can help adults who need assistance by contacting the Department for the said. Rockcastle Countians can be adult to the said.
