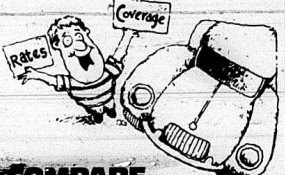

## STATE TAX RATE SET

Secretary Gary W. Gillis of the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet today announced that the 1984 state real estate property tax rate has been set at 22.0¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation. The state real estate rate must be adjusted each year as needed to ensure that no more than a 4 percent cumulative increase in revenues is realized over the previous years.

The 1984 rate of 22.0¢ represents a decline of slightly more than 0.45 percent from the 1983 rate of 22.45¢. Since the beginning of these annual adjustments in 1979, the state has experienced yearly declines. Kentucky real estate property owners will have to pay about \$46 million less in 1984 state taxes alone if this rollback in the rate had not occurred. This represents a substantial savings.

With the establishment of the 1984 real estate tax rate in a timely manner, local taxing districts statewide can be assured of being able to have tax bills prepared and collected as soon as the local tax rolls have been certified by revenue and local tax assessors have properly established.

## Court balks on payment to Sheriff

Although the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court voted last month to pay Sheriff William Taylor \$1,000 a month to put another man on the county roads at night, he has never received any of the money.

County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper said Tuesday that he was told by Al Howell, a representative of the Finance and Administration Cabinet in Frankfort, that it would be illegal for the county to pay the sheriff.

Judge Jasper then referred further questions to his secretary, Anne Rose Mullins who said that she had been told by the state that the county would have to hire a new deputy and they (the fiscal court) would have jurisdiction over him. She said that Magistrate Donald Rowe's motion was not made correctly and therefore, the county could not legally pay Taylor the money.

Mrs. Mullins then referred questions to Drexell Davis, Jr., an employee of the state Finance and Administration Cabinet.

Davis, who was in the courthouse Tuesday, helped the county set up their

\$900,000 plus budget for fiscal year 1984-85.

Davis said that while the county could not legally give Taylor the money, with the motion they made, he did say that there was a way the court could do it legally at the next meeting. "All the county would have to do is set-up an account labeled Sheriff's Deputy Hire and another account for his gasoline," Davis said. "They certainly do not hire his men for him and they don't have jurisdiction over him either."

Davis said the court could also put a limit, such as \$1,000, on the amount the Sheriff could spend. "Whether they choose to do it or not is up to them," Davis added, "but there is certainly a legal way it can be done."

"That bunch in the judge's office is just looking for some reason not to help me out any," Sheriff William Taylor said. "It's not the first time that they have not done what they said."

Taylor, who has not received a paycheck since February of this year because of a lack of money in his office, recalled another instance when the court was obligated to pay

for his gasoline and didn't.

"The first year I took office, the Fiscal Court voted to pay me \$500 a month for gasoline and they did not even do that for the entire year," Taylor said.

A check of the records showed that the county paid Taylor's gas bill for only 8 out of the 12 months, even though he had voted to pay it all twelve months.

"I ended up having to pay off those places I charged gasoline, because the county wouldn't do it," Taylor said. "They said I would get reimbursed but I never have and I seriously doubt if I ever will."

headed.

"If a taxpayer lives on a blacktop road in Rockcastle County, they get nothing for their county tax dollar but law enforcement," Taylor said, "and with the financial shape we're in, it's hard to provide adequate protection."

Taylor disclosed records which show that he and his deputy, Clarence Hasty, made \$8,361 each in 1982. The records also showed Taylor earning \$8,500 in 1983 and Hasty getting \$7,000 that year.

So far this year, Taylor has made only \$1,400 while Hasty has gotten \$1,500. The

## Three local water systems cited by state

Three local water suppliers were among sixty-five systems cited across the state of Kentucky for being persistent violators of minimum standards for clean water, during the first half of the current federal fiscal year, according to a recent state report.

The persistent violators cited in the period from October 1, 1983 through March 31 of this year, included Brothead Water Works, Livingston Municipal Water and Western Rockcastle Water Association.

Livingston was cited 12 times; Brothead 6 times and Western, 5.

Most of the other water suppliers in the state that were cited were also based in small communities or rural areas, according to officials of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet.

Several questions have been raised about whether the drinking water in the 65 systems is safe.

However, according to state officials, most of the violators involved failure to submit an adequate number of samples for bacteriological analysis or failure to submit required monthly operating reports.

Brothead Mayor Ronnie Cash said Tuesday that the water in Brothead was as pure as it has ever been.

"We have had problems with Frankfort for years," Cash said. "One person tells us one thing and another person tells us something else."

"When Governor Brown was in office, we finally convinced the state that we do not treat our water, we buy it from Mt. Vernon and they treat it up there," Cash explained. So, he said, the state told them to quit sending reports and not to worry about getting samples either. However, Cash said that all getting with the administration of Governor Mar-

the Layne Collins.

"We were cited because we did not turn our reports in," he said, "but our water is very safe, we test it frequently."

The same is apparently true of the other two systems as well.

Former Mayor Bobby Wilson, who is also the water superintendent for Livingston, said Tuesday that problems

with the former superintendent caused Livingston's violations.

"The man that was running our water department before would not make out reports and take water samples," Wilson said. "Ever since I took over, we have not had any problems with the state over our water."

Wilson said the water in Livingston is as pure as it can

be.

Ralph Isaacs, water superintendent of Western Water, a supplier in the county that also buys their water from Mt. Vernon, said Tuesday that the reason they were cited six times was because he failed to submit paperwork.

"I always did the repor-

It is rare indeed that a county the size of Rockcastle has the opportunity to view a play of the calibre of "Once Upon a Mattress." However, we do have this opportunity and it is one that should not be missed.

All in all, it is not something you should even take a chance on missing. So, if you have plans to do anything Thursday (tonight) or Friday night, be sure they include "Once Upon a Mattress." If you miss this production, it will certainly be your loss.

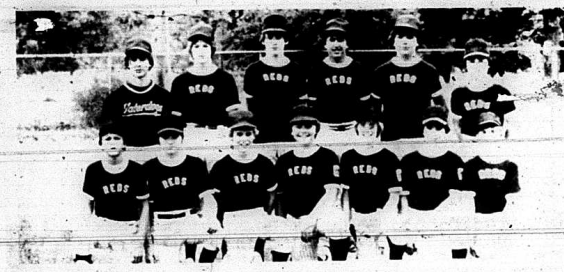

princess and the pea. The first three performances were given last Thursday and Friday evenings and Sunday afternoon at the Red Barn in Renfro Valley. Two more shows are scheduled for Thursday (tonight) and Friday at 7:30 p.m. each night.

"When I asked Patti if she was nervous about being on-stage, she replied, 'I don't think I'll be too nervous after the first song on the first night. I want to enjoy it; I love an audience.'

"Miss Towery was right. If she was nervous opening night, it wasn't apparent as she swept across the stage in her medieval gown, saddle oxfords and blond braids.

"The director of the play, Allan Pensol, said Miss Towery exceeded the expectations he had for her performance. 'Patti has passed anything, anything, I could have expected. She takes the Number One spot as far as I'm concerned. I just can't say enough nice

things.' In turn, Miss Towery has admired Pensol's abilities as a director, having given her the chance to decide how to play the role of the imperinent, likeable, mischievous Winnifred. 'Allen has put in a lot of work, more than anybody. The costumes are pretty simple and he made and designed most of them himself.'

Pensol, a 23-year-old veteran of the theatre, has come back home to Mt. Vernon to take an extended sabbatical after working in close to 60 plays in Kentucky and other states. Pensol is the son of Harvey and Emily Pensol.

Although his leading lady had a year of drama at the Rockcastle County High School, it was Miss Towery's major role as Nancy in the Art Council's production of "By Hex" last summer that got her hooked on theatre. This year, she couldn't resist auditioning again.

"The people who are involved in something like this are the brightest and the best, and they care about what happens in the

county. That's the spirit I like to be around.

"I don't think I'm a ham by nature because I love an audience. I guess I'm overly imaginative and I'm the most transparent person I know. Every thought that comes into my head shows on my face. I'd make a lousy poker player, but it's good for something like this."

"I've had a hard time leaving Princess Winnifred on stage. 'I can't leave the role here or at the station (where rehearsals were held). I don't consciously do that. It's just that I can't get it out of my mind.'

"That's understandable. For most of the 32-member cast of all ages, being in the play has meant practicing sometimes five nights a week for a couple of hours since the first of June.

Miss Towery dreads the play being over. "All my energies have been devoted to this and all of a sudden there will be nothing to do."

But she would do it again. "When the bug bites you," she said, "you don't want to stop." She prefers acting over directing. She got a taste of directing last Christmas when she led cast at the Wilde Christian Church in the play "A Certain Star." "I wouldn't have the forceful personality to tell people what to do," she explained.

"But acting is just fun! It's a legitimate reason to stand up there and act like a fool!"

Miss Towery was especially complimentary of the Arts Council which is the sponsor of the production. Norma Eversole has served as stage manager, Martha Cox as producer, Lisa Clontz as publicist, Vicki Cox as set constructor, Jack Lewis as musical director and Marsha Parsons as accompanist. Miss Towery stressed that everyone had worked hard and made a contribution to the play.

The leading lady isn't the only cast member who has enjoyed being in "Once Upon a Mattress." Donald Jones, 20, of Livingston, also comes to this play after getting experience in last summer's "By Hex." He plays the part of Sir Studley who "floats around with an entourage of females." Rightly enough, he enjoys the role.

His 12-year-old sister is also in the cast. Heather Jones is Lady Mabelle, a French lass who knows only a few words of English. "Yes," she said she's had a lot of fun with the play and that opening nights don't really bother her.

Kenny Johnson, 21, of Mt. Vernon, is the Knight. He auditioned for the play after several of his friends told him about it and he thought it would be a good opportunity to meet people. He would definitely consider acting in another production.

This time, she has two daughters acting with her: Becky, 10, and Bobbi Jo, 11. She relishes her role as Queen Aggravain, Prince Dauntless' mean mother. Why did she decide to get into acting?

"Because I enjoy being with others and I usually stay home in the summer and go crazy! Off-stage, she plays multiple roles

as housewife, girl scout leader and vice-president of the Brodhead P.T.A.

"I talked to Allen Pensol after the first three shows to get the director's opinion of the county's response. 'I feel the cast has done very good jobs,' he said confidently. 'I couldn't have asked for more. It's just a shame the county isn't supporting it. Our biggest audiences are coming from out of the county. But I do realize that a lot of the week end people are here to see the Burdette anyway.'

He partially accounts for the small crowd because this year there are five performances to choose from, instead of the two scheduled last year. "But I really can't see that barn filled up this next week end," he said with regret. "When the show closes, I'd have anybody to complain that there's nothing to do in Rockcastle County! Particularly this summer with the fair and camps and the plays. As far as good family entertainment, there's certainly enough going on in Rockcastle County."

Pensol's disappointment in the size of the crowd hasn't dampened his spirits, however. "I'm still satisfied because those who are coming to see it are those who want to and aren't pressured to. And so much interest has been shown that the Rockcastle Council for the Arts is talking about a fall production. I would hope to direct that."

Pensol is also pleased that the cast has members representing every community and town in the county.

Pensol went on to say he appreciated Gary Smith being so understanding about renting the Red Barn for the performances. He also complimented Jack Lewis in his role as Jester and as music director. "And of course my appreciation to Marsha Parsons, the accompanist, and to the entire cast. The cast has trusted me and believed me. I hope exactly what I've asked for and it shows."

Pensol concluded, "If there was a disappointing factor in the entire production, it would be the apathy of the residents of Rockcastle County. But I realize people have two more performances to go. If you missed the first three shows, you can still make it to the last two this Thursday and Friday at 7:30 p.m., in the Red Barn at Renfro Valley."

deputy sheriff has not been paid since the first week in March.

The sheriff's secretary, his daughter Michelle Robinson, has not been paid since sometime in May either.

A check with three other county governments, Jackson, Laurel and Lincoln, revealed that all three Fiscal Courts help the sheriff to some extent. Sheriff John Sims in Lincoln County said that the Fiscal Court there gives him \$1,000 a month for gasoline.

County Judge Bill Smith in Jackson Co. said Tuesday that he was not sure how much the fiscal court there allots Sheriff Fred Hays but he was sure it was in the thousands of dollars annually.

County Judge/Executive Johnny Lewis in Laurel County said much the same thing. "We help our sheriff out but to what extent, I don't know for sure."

"It is a shame when Magistrates in the county make as much as the Sheriff does," Taylor said, referring to the fact that Magistrates in Rockcastle County make over \$7,000 a year.

**Harlan man found guilty of underreporting income**

The United States Attorneys' offices for the Western District of Virginia and the Eastern District of Kentucky announced today that Roy Dan Jackson has pled guilty to a

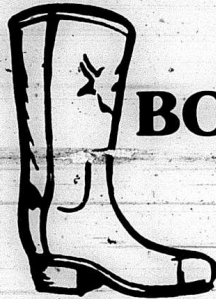
one count information charging him with willfully underreporting his income by approximately \$350,000.00 for the tax year 1978, after which the Chief Judge, James C. Turk, imposed sentences.

Jackson, a 37-year-old Harlan County coal operator, was ordered to pay a \$5,000.00 fine and to serve a prison sentence of two years and 6 months. Jackson received the "maximum fine provided for under the statute involved and received only six months less than the three-year maximum sentence provided by the same statute 26 U.S.C. Section 7206(1).

Pursuant to the defendant's request, Judge Turk delayed Jackson's reporting date until October 29, 1984, so that he can make necessary business and personal arrangements prior to beginning his prison term.

This case was investigated and handled by agents of the Internal Revenue Service, Louisville, Kentucky.

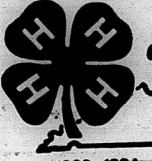

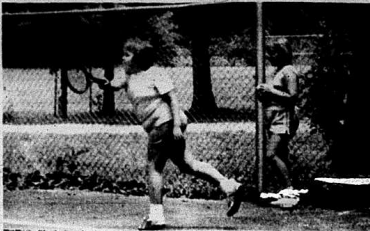

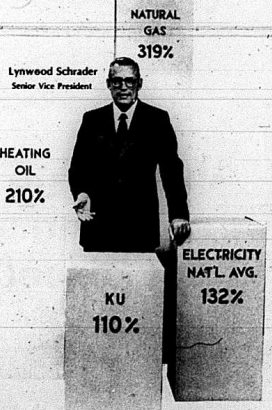

Whitaker, Route 4, Mt. Vernon, joined nine other Kentucky tobacco producers in Louisville July 18th for a recognition luncheon and tour of the Philip Morris Louisville Manufacturing plant.

One of the 10 semi-finalists will be chosen state-winner for Kentucky. Semi-finalist each receive awards of \$100 and the state-winner will receive a \$1,000 award and a trip in October to Richmond, Virginia where winners from 11

tobacco growing states will be honored.

The awards program, co-sponsored by Philip Morris U.S.A. and the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, recognizes tobacco producers under age 35 whose practices have been judged to constitute outstanding tobacco production techniques. Producers also are judged on their overall farming operation and their leadership within their agricultural and social communities.

Whitaker, 30, raised eight acres of tobacco last year and averaged 2,500 pounds per acre. His '81 and '82 yields averaged 2,800 pounds per acre.

In addition to his tobacco, Whitaker and his wife, Mary, farm 50 acres of hay, 15 acres of wheat and have half interest in 65 acres of corn. They also raise 40 head of beef cattle.

Whitaker has no plans to

expand his tobacco operation in the immediate future.

While in school, Whitaker was active in Future Farmers of America and won several awards for tobacco and beef production. He is currently a member of the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau and Youth Chairman of the Rockcastle County Republican Party.

warmer. You've heard the rule, keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold.

If you pack a lunch to take to work, it may stand at room temperature for several hours. To take care of your packed lunch, freeze the sandwiches ahead of time, then by lunchtime they will be ready to eat but still cool.

Freezing water in a covered plastic container and putting it in your lunch will help it stay cool without a refrigerator. Be sure not to fill the container to the top since water expands when it freezes.

To help keep food safe, have everything clean before you start preparing meals. Be sure to clean counters, cutting boards and knives. If you use these or other utensils with raw meats, fish, eggs or poultry, clean your tools thoroughly before using them with other food. This will prevent the spreading of bacteria.

**Consumer Tips** - Honey News - Honey, a form of sugar, with just a trace of B vitamins, is broken down in the body into the same components as regular sugar.

**Getting Vitamin A** - For vitamin A, include dark green and deep yellow vegetables such as spinach and carrots. Or serve cantaloupes, yellow peaches and apricots.

**Spice is Nice** - Use spices and herbs in season foods. Instead of sauces and butter. Each tablespoon of butter adds 100 calories.
