





# By Richard Anderkin, Three local water sup-pliers were among sixty-five systems cited across the state of Kentucky for being per-sistent violators of minimum standards for clean water, during the first half of the current federal fiscal year, ac-cording to a recent state report.

cording to a recent state report. The persistent violators cited in the period from Oc-tober 1, 1983 through March 31 of this year, included Brothead Water Works, Livingston Municpal Water and Western Rockcastle Water Association. Livingston was cited 12 times; Brodhead 6 times and Western 5

times: Brodhead 6 times and Western, 5. Most of the other water suppliers in the state that were cited were also based in small communities or rural areas, ac-cording to officials of the Natural Resources and En-vironmental, Protection Cabinet. Several questions have been raised about whether the drinking water in the 65 systems is safe. However, according to

systems is safe. However, according to state officials, most of the violators involved failure to submit an adequate number of samples for bacteriological analysis or failure to submit required monthly operating remorts.
