) Essential Skills Mastery - Applicable beginning with 1985 Perfermance Report. In the spring of 1985 all students in grades $\mathrm{k}-12$ will be tested for Essential Skills Mastery in the areas of reading and mathematics. Essential

- Skills have been identified in those areas and approved by the State Board of Edueation. Results of the Essential Skills testing program are to be utilized in promotion/retention decisions and for planning appropriate remediation programs. Essential skills testing results will be recorded and reported by grade, school and district levels.

2) Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills Resuits - Spring of 1984 a) Test results are to be reported by district and individual school levels for grades $3,5,7$ and 10 .
b) Administrative regulation requires CTBS information be printed in SCE form. NCE (Normal Curve Equivalent) scores divide the scale beneath the normal distribution into 99 equal segments, units or scores. Scores range from 1-99, with a mean/median of 50 . The 50th NCE is the national average.
c) Anticipdted Total Battery scores are to be reported. Anticîpated Total Battery NCE, scores are derived ffom aptitude indicators on the Test of Cognitive Skills and reflect the indicated ability level of the students. BILI. WOULD PROTECT WHISTLEBLOWERS
Much has been written about corruption, waste and infficiency in the federal government. So far, no end is in ight. Perhaps that is because no legal protection now exThe Merit System Protection Board, chartered in 1978, wrongdoings in the bureaucracy. Howeyer, the chief dilemma remaining for whistleblowers is that their case remain in the administrative arena.
Whistleblowers are often harassed or threatened by employers, causing them to fear retaliation if they testify
or refuse to withdraw a complaint. The problem is best ilustrated by the case of George Spanton. Spanton was a Department of Defense auditor who went public with inormation about excessive labor rates and waste of govern ment money by a contractor.
Spanton later alleged that he was harassed by his
uperiors at the audit agency, and was forcibly transferred aperiors at the audit agency, and was forcibly transferred as punishment for his disclosure. He took this allegation to
the Merit Systems Protection Board. Despite thorough documentation and strong evidence, Spanton's disciplinary action against three top officials was dismissed in August The dismissal of Spanton's case was seen by many a another example of the federal system reatiating against rather than rewarding, a conscientious civil servant. As a
result, bipartisan support is gathering for a new Senate bill result, bipartisan support is gathering for a new senare bould allow whistleblowers like Spanton, as a las resort, to take their complaints to the federal court system The bill would enhance the authority of the special counsel of the Merit System Protection Board. The special counsel, an attorney who presents the whistleblowers' case would be able to seek enforcement of subpoenas; enforceions against agency interference in investigations: Most im portantly, the special counsel would be able to appeal fina Merit System Protection Board orders in the federal cour system.

Courageous federal employees who report the waste o taxpayer dollars should be protected from intimidation and retaliation. I intend to support this legissation in the hoplater against corruption in our government.
