- 1) Essential Skills Mastery Applicable beginning with 1985 Performance Report. In the spring of 1985 all students in grades K-12 will be tested for Essential Skills Mastery in the areas of reading and mathematics. Essential Skills have been identified in those areas and approved by the State Board of Education. Results of the Essential Skills testing program are to be utilized in promotion/retention decisions and for planning appropriate remediation programs. Essential Skills testing results will be recorded and reported by grade, school and district levels.
- 2) Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills Results Spring of 1984
- a) Test results are to be reported by district and individual school levels for grades 3,5,7 and 10.
- b) Administrative regulation requires CTBS information be printed in NCE form. NCE (Normal Curve Equivalent) scores divide the scale beneath the normal distribution into 99 equal segments, units or scores. Scores range from 1-99, with a mean/median of 50. The 50th NCE is the national
- average. c) Anticipated Total Battery scores are to be reported. Anticipated Total Battery NCE, scores are derived from aptitude indicators on the Test of Cognitive Skills and reflect the indicated ability level of the students. Anticipated Total Battery NCE scores are available only at the district level.

In addition, a surviving divorced wife or husband can generally get the same benefits as widow or widower if the marriage to the worker lasted 10 years or more.

warrange to the worker lasted IU years or more. A lump-sum payment of \$255 can be made to the worker's eligible widow or widower, or, in the last worker's child entitled executive.

It is important for survivors to apply for benefits as soon as possible after the worker's death. This is especially important for widows and widowers under 65 because benefits cannot generally be paid before the month of application.

When applying, survivors should have their own and the worker's Social Security cards or a record of the numbers, birth certificates for an eligible child-ren, marriage certificate, proof of the worker's death, proof of age

Homemade Applesauce

Canned or frozen applesauce is great to have on hand all year long. Some gf. the tart. crisp varieties of apples in the markets now are especially good for applesauce. To prevent darkening during preparation of the apples, drop pieces of solution of 2 tablespoons each of salt and vinegar per, gallon of water. Drain or lift from

solution. Don't let the fruit soak for more than 20 minutes, because nutrients will be lost. For a further anti-darkening treatment, you could add ascorbic acid mixtures available at drug store or add one of the acporbic acid mixtures available at drug store or food stôre. Use according to the directions. If you like a smooth consistency, core the apples and leave the skins of. Add about 1/3 cup of water per quart of apple sides, cook until tender, and strain. Sweeten to taste, if desired. If you like applesauce coarseteutured or lumpy, beet the apples and simmer the peelings in a little water until tender. Then strain and add to the cooked applesauce for extra pink color.

Canned Applesauce

Heat applesauce to simmer-ing and stir to keep it from sticking. Pack into jars, allowing 1/4 inch headspace. Process in boiling-water-bath can-ner. Allow 10 minutes processing time for either pints or quarts.

As soon as you remove jars from canner, complete seals if necessary. When jars have cooled, test for a tight seal before storing in a cool dark place.

Frozen Applesauce

Set pan of cooked applesauce in a container or sink of cold water to cool it down before packing nto moisture-vapor proof freezer con-tainers. When the applesauce temperature is cool, pack into

containers, leaving about 1/2 Inch headspace to allow for expansion during freezing, Seal, label, and freeze immediately.

Use only approved freezing containers for freezer storage of applessauce or other foods. Revaluar glass jars crack much too easily, allowing for the danger of glass silvers getting -into the food. Instead, use a rigid plastic container or wide-mouth food-preservation iar.

Roundstone students scored better last year on the comprehensive test of basic skills, given to each student in the third, fifth, seventh and tenth grades. Each class at Roundstone scored much better than the national average and much higher than was anticipated by local school officials.



and 10th grade. 41.7 with the national average being 50., according to the report.

Brodhead Elementary School Students also tested hisher than the national average in each grade, with the third grade doing better than the other two grades with a score of 66. The fifth grade scored 57. and the seventh grade scored 57 and the seventh grade scored 50.

Livingston Elementary School students in the third grade scored higher than any other third grade in the county with a 78 but the fifth grade, with a score of 41, and the seventh grade class, which also scored 41, did not fare so well.

Mt. Vernon Elementary, which had the most students tested of any of the grade schools, did not break the established trend as third graders at the school as third graders at the school

did not break the established trend as third graders at the school scored higher than their peers in the two higher grades. Third graders at MVES had a score of 59, fifth graders scored 49 and seventh graders 47.

In keeping with traditions of the past, the Rockcastle County High School students scored lower on the test than any of the grade schools in the county, except for

the fifth grade and seventh grade class at Livingston. High school students scored 41.7, according to the report which showed a trend of decilining test score as students get older, "This is a national trend and not just in our school system," said Rockeastle County curriculum director Bige Towery, "As the students get older, they achieve less, it is a known fact." Seniors at RCHS who took the students get older, they achieve less, it is a known fact. Seniors at RCHS who took the ACT test in 1983 scored lower than the national average of 17.4, with an average of 15.71, according to the report which showed that 30.21% of the graduating class at RCHS took the test. The test must be taken before any student can enter college.

More students were held back in the first grade than any other grade in the district in 1983 but, according to Towery, this is also commonplace across the nation. 'Most educators feel that the first grade is the most important grade for children and if a student has not accomplished what teachers feel they should have to go on, they are held back,' Towery said. Of the 179 students held back in

the Rockcastle County school system, 48 of them were fire graders, according to the report. Mt. Vernon Elementan

Mit. Vernon Elementary. School held back a bioager percentage of their first graders with 25 retentions out of 101 students enrolled. Brochead had 13 first graders, out of 78, held back while Livingston retained 7 of 30. Roundstone had the lowest retention rate, holding back only to students out of a total of 51 enrolled

students out of a total of 51 enrolled.

Roundstone had the fewest number of retentions per school in the county and Towery was asked if the fact that Roundstone were less crowded than any other school, except for Livingston, and the fact that they had fewer students held back had anything to do with the better test scores in the school. "I' would not want to say anything about that right now," Towery said. "I have only been working with curriculum a short time and would rather wait until I have more information about these scores to say what might have caused the better ow worse scores in the schools."

At the Rockcastle County High School last year, a total of 74 students quit school, with the bulk coming in the two middle grades where 47 students quit school, with the bulk coming in the two middle grades where 47 students quit.

Only 65% of all students entering the 9th grade last year at RCHS will graduate, according to the report which based the figure on the last five years at the high school. While this figure seems alarming, it is right in line with the state average of 65%. In 1984, only 192 students graduated from a class of over 300 when they began as freshmen.

As students get older, they don't want to go to school as much either. Average daily attendance records for last year were also included, in the report which showed that Livingston Elementary has the highest attendance record and RCHS the lowest. Over \$5.5% of all the students at Livingston attended school on daily basis last year while only 91.62% showed for class at the high school. District-wides sut overage attendance of \$6.17%. Mr. Vernon 94.18% and 94.77% of the students went to school regularly at Roundstone last year.

According to the report.

regularly at Roundstone last year. According to the report, 24,06% of the graduating class at RCHS attended college in 1983, a figure down from over 40% in 1982. The state average for students going to college from high school is over 41%. 9,71% of the students in the local school system were enrolled in the Special Education program in 1983, with a total of 30% students in the program. The state average for students in special education is 10.4%, according to the report which showed that more students were enrolled in special education in 1983 than had been in the pags-several years.

The Merit System Protection Board, chartered in 1978,
was intended to help evil servants in attempts to root out
wrongdoings in the bureaucracy. However, the chief dilemmaternatining for whistleblowers is that their case remains
in the administrative arena.
Whistleblowers are often harassed or threatened by
employers, causing them to fear retaliation if they testify
or refuse to withdraw a complaint. The problem is best illustrated by the case of George Spanton. Spanton was a
Department of Defense auditor who went public with information about excessive labor rates and waste of government money by a contractor.

Spanton later alleged that he was harassed by his
superiors at the audit agency, and was forcibly transferred
as punishment for his disclosure. He took this allegation to
the Merit Systems Protection Board. Despite thorough
documentation and strong evidence, Spanton's disciplinary
action against three top officials was dismissed in August.

The dismissal of Spanton's case was seen by many as
another example of the federal system retallating against,
rather than rewarding, a conscientious civil servant. As a

WHEREAS, it is essential to have rules and regulations in a single written document delineating all aspects of em-ployment with the city and available to each of the employees affected by said rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Kentucky Revised Statutes requires that the compensation of city employees be in accordance with a personnel and pay classification plan which shall be adopted

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council and the City of Mt. Ver non of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

Section One: That the attached personnel policies and procedures, classification plan and compensation plan, as well as an applicable state or federal law, shall be the system of per-sonnel administration for the city.
