

Some, asy the pools linger especially for the fish and the fisherman, who park along the banks at their favorite fishing holes, one such at the "big bend" northeast of Livingston that old timers say has no bottom.

Residents who -have lived along the river, claim it is the purest in the world. You can safely

drink the water. Others doubt the "purest-in-the-world" title, but agree it has the best of river water: "I wouldn't want to drink it unless I was mighty thirsty." said a former resident who lived along the river. "But I think most of the time you could drink the water cause it runs over a whole lot of bebbles and sand. That purifies it."



Within the federal act, rivers are designated wild, seems and/or excreational, any of which would place restrictions of one sort or concerning the section of the section

'It will take quite awhile to "I'r will take quite awhile to get a determination on what is best for the section," said John Yancy, district forester at London. ''After a study to see if the river meets, the criteria for a federal designation, a second study must be made on feasibility. These studies take some time.' People who are familiar with the river believe when the final study is completed, the section will be designated "recreational."



Even though the weather outside is hot and sticky, you can keep cool inside by making quick delicious dishes with bell peppers. Most of the peppers you will indi are the sweet green peppers. They are available on the market year round although more prevalent May through October.

Although usually sold while still green, bell peppers will turn bright red if allowed to mature fully. Look for, well-shaped, firm, unblemished wegetables that have a bright color. The kinds most used are four to five inches long, are three or four-lobed and taper only slightly toward the blossom end.

Store in the refrigerator crisper, but plan to use within a few days. Bell peppers also are rich in both vitamins A and C.
