

# Fiscal court approves 1985 county tax rate

A 1985 tax rate of 8.4 cents per \$100 assessed real estate value was set by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a meeting Tuesday. The court set the personal property tax rate at 8.2 cents per \$100 assessment.






