ed for this year. Each year. another $\$ 36$ billion or so would be
lopped off that deficit maximum lopped off that deficit maximum, until we reached zero by the end of
1991. In six years, we could have a totally balanced budget! Under this law, the President and Congress would each come up with a budget each year. If it looks
like spending would exceed the limit set for that year, automatic board. affecting every single government program and agency, except Social Security. Unless
some alternative plan for cuts is some alternative plan for cuts is
negotiated between the President negotiated between the President
and Congress, this automatic and Congress. Uis aution in spending would force our deficits lower and lower until
