



Brodhead asks citizens to take care of walks

Hoping to keep the city's new sidewalks in good shape, the Brodhead City Council has asked residents to help protect them in the years to come.

At its meeting Monday night, the council first discussed passing an ordinance prohibiting burning leaves on the sidewalks and in ditch lines, and spreading salt on sidewalks in snowy weather. The council then decided residents would probably comply without an ordinance.

"I think people will understand we spent quite a bit of money to repair and replace our sidewalks and will want to keep them in good shape, without passing an ordinance," Councilman D. A. Robbins said.

Over \$13,000 was spent on replacing and repairing sidewalks along U.S. 150 in the downtown area, also along West Street, and to replace the handrails in front of the former city jail.

"The walks are in very good shape, and we're very proud of them," Mayor Ronnie Cash said. "Salt and burning leaves on them causes them to flake and crack. We also hope residents will not clog ditches with leaves and will bag them and take them away."

In other action, the council decided to confer again with city policeman Bill Lawrence about complaints on his arrest methods.

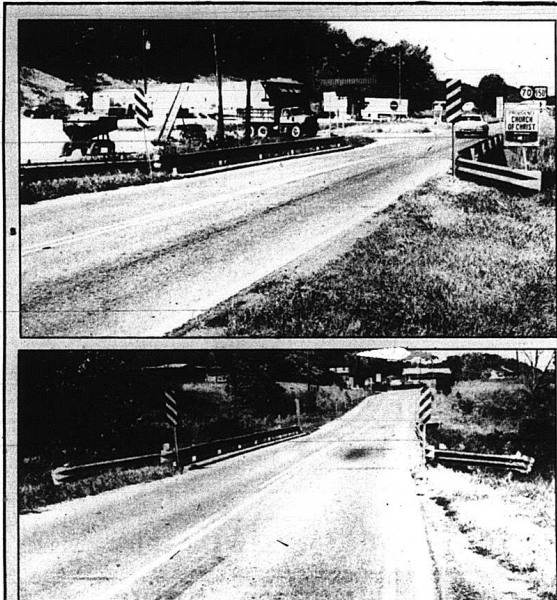
Lasses Festival at Renfro Valley

New bridges on the way

Work is expected to begin "any day" replacing two bridges that have been a traffic hazard in the county for years. A contract for \$690,953 has been awarded by the Kentucky Department of Transportation to Rankin and Gaffney Contracting of Lancaster to replace two bridges over Negro Creek on U.S. 150 near Brodhead. One bridge is near the intersection of Ky. 70 (top picture) and the other about a half-mile west of Ky. 70. A Highway official said detours, will be constructed around the work areas to accommodate traffic and prevent delays. He said the bridges will be widened to about 36 feet and will be in the same location. It is expected to be late summer or early fall of 1986 before the work is completed. The two bridges were reportedly built in the 1930s.

Indictments including the sale of narcotic 'PCP' returned by Grand Jury

The most recent session of the Rockcastle County Grand Jury has returned 11 indictments for crimes ranging from theft to the selling of the narcotic 'PCP'.

Seven of the indictments have been released by local Circuit Court Clerk Denver Miller's office

and include charges against a former candidate for the office of Rockcastle County Sheriff.

Leroy Malicote of Mt. Vernon, who ran for the Republican nomination for Sheriff in the May Primary, has been charged with cultivating marijuana for the purpose of sale. He is presently free on \$10,000 property bond.

According to court records, the charges stem from a July 25 incident, at which time police found 74 marijuana plants growing in a corn field off Red Hill Road. The land had been leased to Malicote, and the corn was reportedly being grown by him.

Other drug related indictments reported include charges of

selling 'PCP' by a convicted felon.

Ellis 'Booty' Hines, 23, of Brodhead, was indicted after he sold \$40 worth of 'PCP', a Schedule I Narcotic to undercover narcotic agent Everett Selvidre on July 15 in Rockcastle County, according to court records.

Hines was also indicted for

possession of a handgun by a convicted felon. That charge stemmed from an Aug. 25 incident when he was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Jim Durham. At the time of his arrest, Hines was carrying a .38 caliber Smith & Wesson handgun.

Hines, who is free on \$30,000 bond, was convicted of third degree burglary last May and was placed on two years probation. The conviction was the result of a break-in at the Brodhead Dari Delite, according to court records.

Two other indictments were returned for possession of over eight ounces of marijuana for the purpose of sale.

Monty Lee Roberts, 34, of Berea, was charged after two Richmond State Police officers searched his car on the Flat Gap Road in Rockcastle County and found approximately four pounds of marijuana in his trunk. Roberts is presently free after posting \$2,500 property bond.

Doug Estes, 20, of Mt. Vernon, was also indicted on the same charge as Roberts after police found more than eight ounces of marijuana in his apartment.

According to court records, state police executed a search warrant on Estes' apartment, which is part of the Valley View Apartment complex, and found the marijuana in an upstairs room where it was being dried and bagged. Estes is presently free on \$5,000 property bond awaiting arraignment.

A Manchester man was also indicted for theft by unlawful taking over \$100 and first degree

No additional medical funds for jail inmates

There is no chance that additional state funds will be available to help the county offset rising medical costs for county jail inmates, a state official said this week.

Sheryl Roberts, program manager for Jail Services for the Correction Cabinet, said all counties have similar medical cost problems as Rockcastle, but little can be done since under current law the county fiscal courts "has the responsibility of running the jail."

She said a resolution asking the state to take over the jail is "not possible under current law."

"Several counties have passed resolutions asking the governor to take over the jails, but until the legislature votes to change the law, it is up to the courts to maintain the jail," she stated.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court discussed a resolution turning the jail over to the state at its most recent meeting, if for no other reason than to let the legislature know that small counties are in need of help.

"The governor will acknowledge the resolution," Ms. Roberts said, "but she will remind the court that the law must be changed before the state can assume control. I would think if the legislature voted to change the law and have the state maintain the jails, it would call for a hefty tax increase, perhaps even more than for education."

Currently, the state allocates each county an annual medical allotment to help pay for inmate medical costs. The county received \$5,100 last year and will receive the same amount again this year (1985-86).

She said the amount is based on a formula that includes the number of prisoners, whether the county is considered rich or poor, and on the number of persons in an age group who are considered most likely to break the law. The state will pay the county all over \$2,500 that an inmate incurs. It also pays all costs of a prisoner awaiting transfer to the state prison.

"We have \$900,000 available to allocate to the counties and when that is distributed each year, that is all we will have for that year," Ms.

Roberts added.

To date, the county owes \$8,133.53 in medical bills for inmates during the past 60 days, far over the amount that state will allocate for the entire year.

In the 1984-85 fiscal year, bills totaled \$5,712.30, or \$612.30 over the \$5,100 allocated by the state. Ms. Roberts reported the "cheapest way" for a county to handle the problem is, if possible, to get a nurse or a doctor to hold "sick call" at the jail on a regular basis, and to send only those patients who are very ill to the hospital.

Sending every inmate who says he is sick to the hospital emergency room seems to be a waste of money," she continued. "But if a doctor won't come out when called, and some won't, then the only other alternative is to use the emergency room. Of course, the nurse and jailer must be sure the person who is complaining is not seriously ill and in need of emergency treatment."

She suggested the county try to work out a contract with a doctor or nurse to treat indigent patients at a reasonable cost. Also, to make sure the inmate does not have his

own medical insurance in effect. She said Medicaid will not pay inmate medical bills.

"We've already tried that route," she revealed.

She also noted that a security guard has to be provided for an inmate if the hospital requests it.

"It has to do with liability, and there is no way around it," she said. "Money for security is not refunded by the state." At the last meeting of the Rockcastle court, Magistrate Joe Clark said the mounting costs for medical care for inmates could break the county.

"We can't continue to pay these bills for hangers," he stated.

It was pointed out during that meeting that bills for one patient totals \$4,081. His bill for security was \$1,089.19.

There are no losers in 4-H. Every young person 9-19... rural, small town or city dweller, can win with 4-H. And because of 4-H our families and communities are strengthened.

4-H is the largest youth organization in the world. Last year in Rockcastle County alone, 2,086 youth participated in organized 4-H clubs, camps, activities, and school enrichment projects. This means that 71% of the Rockcastle County youth age 9-19 participated in the 4-H program.

HOW DOES 4-H WORK?
Young people "learn by doing" in 4-H. By joining a 4-H club, they learn to serve as a club officer or committee member. The club is the center of activity where members learn about and prepare for 4-H activities at the community and county level—or onto the area, state or even national level.

Members choose projects in which they are interested. Resource material and detailed information are available from each County Extension Office. Members may work on individual projects or group projects or both.

WHAT ARE SOME 4-H ACTIVITIES?

Fashion Revue: 4-Hers model the garments they have made in, the clothing project.

Judging Teams: 4-Hers learn to select the best quality dairy or beef animals or horses. Or they may judge vegetables or participate in land judging.

Demo. Tables & Public Speaking: 4-Hers develop public speaking skills by preparing and presenting a talk or demonstration on a subject of interest to them.

Exhibits: 4-Hers exhibit what they have made in their projects at county fairs and the state fair.

Variety Shows: 4-Hers individually or in groups present an act they have planned and practiced for.

Camp: 4-Hers attend J. M. Farris 4-H Camp in London.

Trips: 4-Hers have many opportunities to travel with other members. They may go to the state fair, 4-H camp, variety shows, project tours, judging team workouts and other state and national events.

WHAT CAN PARENTS DO?

Parents can help in many ways:

- Start by helping your child choose an appropriate project. Then see that the 4-H'er completes the project. But don't do it for him/her. Finishing what is started is one of the valuable lessons that 4-H'ers learn.

- Encourage your child in success, but also offer encouragement when the child's results are not as great as hoped for. Help your 4-H'er to see that progress is success.

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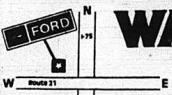

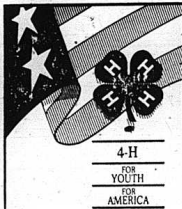
BANQUET RECOGNIZES OUTSTANDING 4-H MEMBERS AND LEADERS

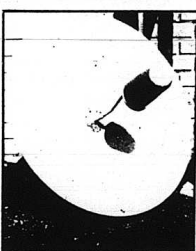

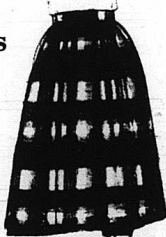

**COVER CROPS PREVENT
SOIL EROSION**

Soil Conservation Service

During this time of year cover crops are being sown throughout Rockcastle County. A cover crop such as wheat or rye provides excellent cover to an otherwise bare soil throughout the winter following harvest. These cover crops control erosion during periods when major crops do not furnish adequate cover, but also did organic matter to the soil and improve infiltration, aeration and soil tilth.

In some farming operations these cover crops are plowed under in the spring before crops are planted to increase the organic matter in the soil, particularly helpful when using the land for tobacco production. However, on some farms these cover crops can be harvested in the spring following fall plowing to a feed crop or hay crop. The stubble left after these cover crops are harvested makes an excellent seedbed for a No-Till system of corn or soybean production. Several area farmers in Rockcastle County are using a rotation of wheat followed by no-till corn and soybeans for an excellent double crop system while also controlling soil erosion.

Cover crops have been a traditional soil conservation practice for many years throughout Rockcastle County and Kentucky. Soils vary in erosion hazards and a good system of cover crop management combined with other soil conservation practices will insure against serious soil erosion while also maintaining the productivity of the land. Putting an end to our federal deficits

All too often in recent years, the federal deficit has been like the weather: everybody complains about it, but nobody ever does anything about it. But that soon may change if a new approach to reducing our deficit can be enacted.

This week, I joined numerous other House co-sponsors in introducing the "Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act." This bill, if passed, would not merely pay lip service to reducing

our federal deficit, but would automatically and fairly reduce federal spending each year, until we achieved a balanced budget by 1991.

As most of you know, I have long championed the cause for a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced budget. But despite our best efforts, those of us who favor this idea have been frustrated by free-spending liberals here in Congress.

Now, a new approach has been developed which I support. Under our "Balanced Budget" bill, maximum deficit limits would be set for each year through 1991, starting at the \$180 billion projected for this year. Each year, another \$26 billion or so would be lopped off that deficit maximum, until we reached zero by the end of 1991. In six years, we could have a totally balanced budget!

Under this plan, the President and Congress would each come up with a budget each year. If it looks like spending would exceed the limit set for that year, automatic cuts would take place across the board, affecting every single government program and agency, except Social Security. Unless some alternative plan for cuts is negotiated between the President and Congress, this automatic reduction in spending would force our deficits lower and lower until they reach the magic number... ZERO!

This approach is also the fairest possible way to cut spending—everyone (except Social Security recipients) shares the pain equally.

This approach should also work for several reasons. First, it requires a smaller deficit each year. It guarantees that we will have a balanced budget by 1991. And it will give our financial markets and all Americans assurances that the deficit problem is being solved. This should help bring interest rates down further, bringing down the value of the dollar and helping our trade picture.

Unless we can put some teeth into our current budget process, we face more deficits and higher deficits for the foreseeable future.

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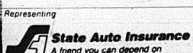

keeping the baby smelling nice, and preventing and treating diaper rashes.

To powder or not to powder, that is the question.

A recent study of parents indicates over two thirds routinely powder their infants' bottoms when changing diapers. Most use talc powder while some use cornstarch. Reasons for powdering include keeping the area dry,

This widespread practice does not meet with much medical approval. The powder can be inhaled by the baby and produce aspiration pneumonia, or even death from breathing in too much powder. Powder, especially talcum powder, which is very fine

rock dust, can get into the lungs and produce lots of problems. If the parent insists on using powder, it should be sprinkled on his hands and then applied to the baby, rather than coming from the container in a big cloud. The container must be kept well away from the baby so that she cannot knock it over and ingest or inhale even more.

It is better to avoid powder altogether and to rely on fairly frequent diaper changes, and vaseline or over-the-counter ointments to protect baby's skin.

HOW TO HANDLE FOOD PRODUCT COMPLAINTS

What do you do when you have a complaint about a food product?

Do you return the product to the store for a refund?

Do you let the food company know about the problem?

Or do you just throw the item away in frustration, and then go on bellyaching to your friends and neighbors about what a dirty deal you had?

Most people who have complaints that are serious enough to justify contacting the store or

company will tell friends about their unhappy experiences. But they don't tell the people who are most anxious to know—the store or the company involved.

In fact, 96 percent of consumers don't take time to complain to the right people when they are dissatisfied with a product. A consumer has both a right and a responsibility to let a company know when he is not satisfied. If a complaint is filed with the right people in the right way, retailers and processors have a chance to make amends to unhappy customers and to find out where improvements are needed.

If you have a complaint about a food product, you should save the container and any uneaten portion of the food until the complaint is resolved. Cover or wrap it and then refrigerate or freeze. Be sure to mark it clearly so no one will mistakenly eat it.

Next, determine if the problem occurred at the processing or retail level. If the problem is freshness or spoilage, return the product and container to the store.

Be sure to take your purchase receipt, and ask to see the manager or supervisor where you purchased the product. This will allow the manager not only to replace the product or refund the money, it also will alert him to any changes that might be needed to

If the problem occurred during processing, you should contact by letter the company that produced the product. Your letter should be addressed to the consumer affairs department. It should include a clear description of the purchase including the name of the company and the brand name of the product along with the size purchased and any code marks from the container. You should also include the date and place of purchase, a specific accurate statement of the problem

and exactly how you expect the company to resolve the problem.

Be sure to include your name, address, phone number and any supporting documents such as labels, proof of purchase or copies of cash register receipts.

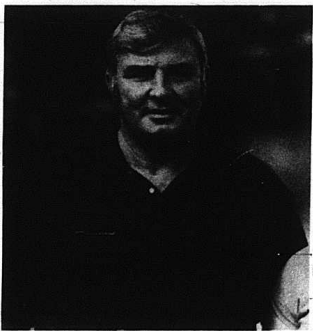

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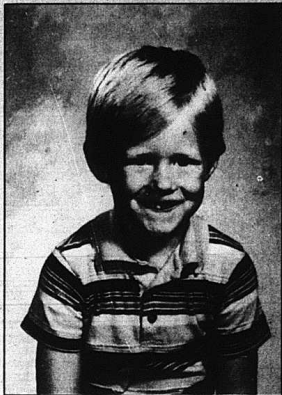

Tobacco support-price program still alive in Congress

The tobacco price-support program was still alive Tuesday after the House defeated an attempt to kill it.

By a 230-195 vote, the House defeated an effort by Rep. Thomas Perri, R-Wis., to attach an amend-

ment to a farm bill that would have wiped out the tobacco program with its price supports, allotments and marketing quotas.

Rep. Harold Rogers, R-Somerset, said: "This battle today was purely defensive. We were trying

to keep the program from being abolished, which would have been disastrous. We stayed off disaster. Now we've got to repair the leaks in the ship."

Booming imports and rising costs to farmers of supporting the tobacco program have threatened the profits of thousands of growers. The House and Senate are considering different, and in many

ways conflicting, bills to tackle the problem. The bills may produce even more spirited opposition than Perri could muster yesterday.

"If you vote for the tobacco program," he told his colleagues, "you're voting for waste, foreign jobs, cancer and bondage."

But Rep. Larry Hopkins,

Lincoln land auction

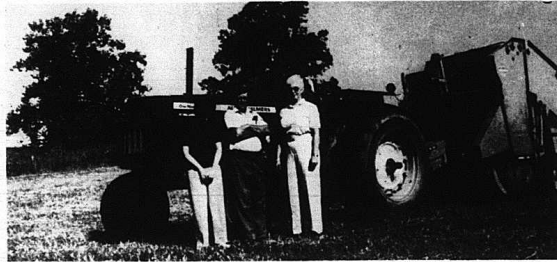
Al Wyler's widow, Clara, has lived on the farm since 1942, but

has decided to move into Crab Orchard to be closer to her business since her husband's death last year. She owns and operates Wyler's Kentucky Food Store.

Fred Wyler finds the selling of the farm "sort of sad" after having it in the family for so long. His wife, Judy, said "I think it's sad in a way, but in a way I'm looking forward to it." She laughed. "Maybe I'll get to sleep a little later in the mornings—I won't have so many dirty clothes to wash."

R-Lexington, warned that the toughest fights to help the nation's troubled tobacco farmers were still ahead. Some of that fighting apparently will be carried on even within the ranks of tobacco supporters.

Hopkins said the vote "indicates that Congress recognizes that we need a tobacco program."

"This indicates to me that our state motto still has a lot of strength," he said. "I'm glad we stand divided. We all could very well be applied to the coalition on the farm bill."

Petri said the government should not support a crop that was a health hazard, and he especially protested the allotments that tobacco growers must obtain before they can sell tobacco under the program.

But despite the relatively close vote, Petri had to make his case almost single-handedly on the House floor. Tobacco forces, on the other hand, produced a parade of representatives to defend the program. Led by Rep. Charlie Rose, D-N.C., tobacco supporters said the program and the health issue were separate, since people would smoke even if no tobacco were grown in the United States.

Cameron and Hurst to compete at International Livestock Exposition

When the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) opens its doors to competitors this year, livestock breeders from across the nation will participate. According to Harold Workman, manager of the North American International, the exposition has become the largest, all-breed, purebred livestock show on earth and is expected to attract more than 13,000 entries this year.

Events in 1985 will span a 14-day period, from November 9 and continuing until November 22. Six livestock types will be featured, including beef cattle, quarter horses, dairy cattle, swine, draft horses and sheep. According to Manager Workman, virtually every livestock breed will be represented in each of the six livestock categories, bringing total shows and livestock sales during the two week run of events to nearly 100.

Barry Hurst of Broodhead and Charlie Cameron of Mt. Vernon

will be at the 1985 North American International Livestock Exposition to compete in the dairy division. According to a spokesperson for the NAILE, Barry has entered two head of dairy and Charlie has entered one head of dairy in the well-known competition. As official entrants, Barry and Charlie will compete for a share of more than \$300,000 in premiums and awards which will be offered at the NAILE this year.

Jack Ragsdale, chairman of the NAILE's Executive Committee, has also confirmed that the big exposition will feature an expanded group of activities for both livestock breeders and general visitors this year. Ragsdale said the North American will again feature Championship Rocky Ferals which are PRCA sanctioned, a barnyard featuring baby animals, many junior livestock events; a variety of sales, including a draft horse sale; the Agri-Product Show will return this year on an

expanded basis to feature everything from livestock trailers to jewelry, and a Draft Horse Pull will take place for the second year. Workman said, "The North American International has grown tremendously during recent years, and as we enter our 12th year of service to the livestock industry, the overall expo will grow even more to offer something of interest to everyone." Both Workman and Ragsdale emphasized that, in addition to the NAILE's prominence as a showcase for fine livestock, the exposition offers a variety of entertainment for both rural and urban people.

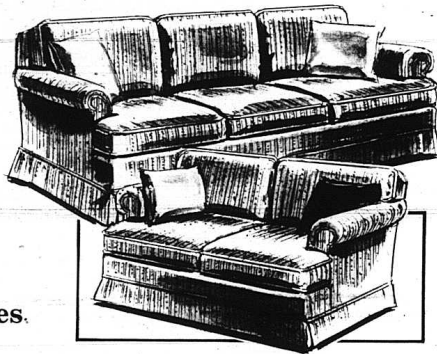

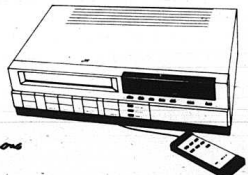

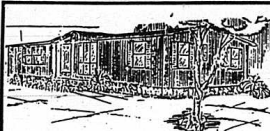
At 7 p.m. Sept. 15 we arrived in Lexington after this 4,500 mile (Cont. to B10)
