The report also demonstrates the lifesaving advantages of wearing safety belts. Ninety-five percent of those vehicle occupants killed in Kentucky traffic accidents last year were not wearing safety belts.

Pick. husk and process guickly for that fresh-from-the-garden flawf in the frozen product. Using a wegetable brush on the ear of corn, under cold running water, helps. Choose the best ears you can find, with plump tender kernels

Choose the best ears you can find, with plump tender kernels and thin sweet milk. Husk remove silk, and wash, and sort ears according to size. Heat them in boiling water: 7 minutes for small ears. 9 minutes for medium ears, and 11 minutes for large ears. Cool the ears or corn promptly and very thoroughly in ice water and then drain. 




