

WAR MEMORIAL FEE PLAN IS STOPPED

In the frenzy of federal budge cutting, wrong-headed idea soften surface. A prime example is a National Park Service proposal brought to my, attention-recently-by a Kentucky native.

This Kentuckian, a veteral who surviced the bombing at Pearl Harbor, now works as a sofuniteer at the Arizona Memorial in Honolulu, Hawaii. He altered me to Park Service plans to begin charging an entrance fee at the memorial, where visitors pay homage to those who died in that 1941 attack.

As a member of the Senate Energy Committee, which oversees the Park Service, I was afready aware that infereased park user fees were an exp priority. The nation's parks experienced a 20 percent hise in visitation this year, and it is reasonable to propose that fees be hiked to help the parks cope with the higher volume. The fees have been frozen since 1979.

Just as this veteran forewarned, when Administration officials

Just as this veteran forewarned, when Administration officials came before the Energy Committee with their fee proposal, it was not limited to parts. They added some historic size to their fix of properties where fees would be charged. Indeed, among those was the Arizona Memorial, which is located in Pearl Harbor, above where the U.S.S. Arizona and her lost crewmen still lie.

The veteran who wrote me is one of 10 Pearl Harbor survivors who volunteers his services at the mehiorial, providing visitors a first-hand account of the vents of historic December 7, 1941, Only 4,500 visitors can be accommodated there each day, he wrote; and people often among the accommodated there each day, he wrote; and people often among a first properties of the provided of the



Stop Mildew Damage to House And Furnishings

If your house has taken on a musty odor, chances are mildew is right now doing damage to your walls, carpeting and other furnish-

Your best protection against mildew is to keep things clean, get rid of dampness, and improve ventilation. But if mildew already has its foot in your door, here's

has its foot in your user, what to do.

First step is to stop mold growth. When you find mildew on any kind of fabric, brush it off outdoors. If you brush indoors, you could spread the mold spores throughout the house. Sun the fabrics, air them thoroughly, then wash or dry clean. If stains remain on washable fabrics, wash them again, using a laundry bleach this

Most man-made fabrics are resistant to mildew, unless they're dirty-soil gives mold food for growth. After brushing upholster-

If mildewed wallpaper is washable, wipe it with a cloth wrung out of thick soapsuds? then with clean water. Don't wet the

Wash tiled floors and walls with a dilute solution of chlorine bleach. If mildew has discolored the grouting in between tiles in your bathroom, you can make a thick nature. the grouting in between tiles in your bathroom, you can make a thick paste about the consistency of toothpaste with household bleach and baking soda. Apply the paste and scrub it with a tooth-brush. Rinse with clean water and

paste and scrub it with a tooth-brush. Rinse with clean water and wipe dry.
You can buy other products that will help you route out mildew. Ammonia cleaners will sanitize, and fungicides and special aerosol sprays will stop the mold growth.

If you have a cellar with a dirt floor, sprinkle chloride of lime on it, wait till the mustiness is gone, then sweep up the lime.

Protecting damp and mustly books from further damage is a real problem. They should be aired thoroughly and dried out as soon as possible. If they re very damp, sprinkle cornstarch or alcum powder between the pages, to take up the molesture. I eave it



Nothing beats a walk, or a drive past the witch hazel. The mountains or hills rise above it, and the little 'beveners' can the

Pistol Creek and all the branches of water which meet, and after their meeting they stay together and go on out of the country into the ocean! These little creek frogs are not universal. They claim the streams in only a small spot of Appalachia. They never hush their chorus in warm weather, and at times it seems they crowd out both worries and high falutin thinking with their incessant noise! Day and night the little peepersholler!

The evidence about passive smoking and children's health is virtually as strong as the well known facts about men getting lung cancer and heart attacks from smoking. Maybe, concern for the kids can fielp some people quit who don't care enough about themselves to do so. The new nicotine chewing gum' can help a lot. Ask your doctor.


