HOLIDAYS ARE HIGH RISK ON ROADWAYS

The holiday season now upon us is supposed to be one of joy and celebration

ceieoration.

But it turns instead to tragedy for hundreds of families whose loved ones are killed in this period on the nation's highways. About half of motor vehicle fatalities — during the holiday season or any other — are a result of alcohol-related traffic accidents, according to the National Safety Council. And alcohol is also a factor in 40 percent of pedestriand deaths.

Traffic deaths increase over this period because there is a lot of holiday travel, and because of drinking associated with Christmas and New Year's celebrations. It is a high risk period. Last year 168 Americans were killed over the Christmas holiday, and 202 during New Year's. In Kentucky there were 10 fatallities, with five over each holiday period. Kentucky State Police say that - as is the national trend -- about half of these were alcohol related.

It was good news recently when Governor Martha Layne Collins announced the third consecutive "D-Day on Trafficways," an intensified effort to crack down on drunken drivers and improve highway safety. State officials are urging motorists to be cautious during the holiday season, and telling them to designate a sober driver if they know they will be drinking.

The KSP highway crackdown begins at 4 p.m. Dec. 12 and continues through 5 a.m. Dec. 13. They say the goal is not to arrest large numbers of drunk drivers, but to heighten awareness of the perils of drinking and driving. The wegkend, in which many Christmas parties are held, is seen as the beginning of the holiday driving season.

The KSP crackdown is also a prelude to the National Drunk and Drung Augrates Week which begins Dec. 14. In the past four gears this special week, designated by Congress, has proven very successful in increasing public awareness of the dangers of driving while impaired by drugs or alcohol. Activities during this week have included introduction of new drunk driving legislation in various states tread-blocks and other increased enforcement efforts; candeleight vigils; and subnutzers (Efforts to provide rides from holiday narties. blocks and other increased enforcement efforts; candlelight vigils; and

We must continue to warn of the hazards of drinking and driving.
Too often people think an accident simply will not happen to them, but to someone else. Only by heightening awareness of the risks can we attack our problem.

Let's all try to keep the holidays festive -- but in a responsible manner with safety in mind.

Lap belts in back seat still considered safe

With the holiday travel sea son just ahead, many parents may still be confused about the value of lap safety belts for children in the

lap safety belts for children in the back spats of cars.

A National Transportation Safety Board study a few months ago reported that rear lap belts in head-on collisions actually may do more harm than good. Since then, many parents have wondered about how to safely buckle-up their children.

Dr. Diller, Groff, director of pediatrics at the University of Louisville department of surgery, recommends that a shoulder harness, if available, should be the parent's first preference.

"However, lap belts in the back seat are still a good alternative and are much better than no restraint at all." he said. "That safety study examined a small number of severe accidents, such accordance occlisions at 50 miles an hour. A child in that kind of accident may very likely be killed without any kind of seat belt protection."

For normal driving around town at 35 in 40 miles per hour, parents should feel comfortable

The intent of the study, he noted, was to encourage U.S. car manufacturers to install rear sho-ulder harnesses in future cars, not to discourage parents from using rear lap belts for their children.








CREOSOTE IN CHIMNEY CREATES FIRE HAZARD Cheryl Witt Agent ty Extension Agent Iome Economics

Chimney fires are a possibi-lify for art/one heating a room with a wood-burning stove. If you haven't already inspected your chimney for the creesote that causes such fires. Larry Piercy, Extension energy and safety speci-Extension energy and safety speci-alist with the UK College of Agriculture, recommends you do it

Creosote is a by-product of Treasure is a by product of the Incomplete combustion of wood. Some creosote is always mixed with the smoke and flue agases produced by a wood-burning stowe or furplace. If these gases of the produced by a wood-burning stowe or furplace. If these gases will condense on the chimney wall and build up over time. Treosote will condense on the farm is highly. Inamable—according to Pierry. Accumulations of 1'3 or more in the chimney of stove pipe are dangerous, he said.

Once ganied, the crosote can burn at temperatures of over 2000 degrees. The strong upward draft caused by the fire can life burning crososie out of the chimney and

creosote out of the chimney and onto the roof. The intense heat also can crack tile linings, deter-iorate masonry and cause metal chimneys, to warp. A fire started by burning creosote may spread to the framework of the house_:

Piercy said chimneys should be inspected for creosote at least

Piercy Said chimneys should be inspected for cresoste at least once a year and every two months if the stove is used regularly. Signs of heavy build-up are backfarfuing, smoking and a dull thus when the stove pipe is tapped with a metal object. If you see cresoste deposits of 14° or more, the chimney should 83 be cleaned. The most effective method is to use a steel-wire flue brush of the proper size and shape for the chimney. "Chimney-cleaning is a messy and" sometimes dangerous job if you are inexperienced, if might be better to hire a chimney sweep who will clean and also give your chimney a safety inspection. "Said the safety specialist.

Proper operation of the stove

Proper operation of the stoye will reduce creosote build up in the future, Piercy said. After the chimney has been cleaned, avoid chimmey has been cleaned, avoid burning unseasoned wood and smokey, smoldering fires. Burning a hot, flaming fire once a day will supply the more complete combus-tion necessary for minimal creo-sole accumulation.

High efficiency airtight stoves re often a problem in this regard, ccording to Piercy, because of



CHECK HEAT TAPES AROUND PIPES TO AVOID HOME FIRE THIS WINTER

If you use electric heat tapes to protect exposed pipes from freezing, government safety experts ask you to check the tapes now for possible fire hazards.

Cling some 500 house, fires believed to have been caused by heat tapes over a six-year period, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission said tapes should be carefully inspacted annually for cracked, baked out, deteriorated insulation or bare wires that could cause a fire. Defective tapes should be replaced immediately. Always unplug the heat lape prior to inspection to avoid a shock hazard.

Heat tages are coutinely used in crawl spaces and in the substructure of beach homes.

substructure of 860ch homes; mountain cabins, cottages, mobile homes and similar dwellings to prevent exposed water and drain pipes from freezing. Some heat tapes are left in place the vear-round and are activated by a thermostat when the temperature approaches 32 degrees. In other cases, homeowners plug in the tapes at the start of the heating season and unplug them in the spring.

Lower interest rates available to farmers soon

Some of the lowest interest rates available in six years will be fored to farmers in Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio and Tennessee beginning January 1, 1987 when The Federal Land Bank of Louis-Wille (FLB) and its Federal Land Bank Associations (FLBAs) implement a new pricing program. The program known as the Individual Loan Pricing Program, is based on an incremental approach to pricing market conditions and an individual borrower's financial strength. The program became possible when the Farm Credit Act Amendments of 1986 were passed by Congress in October. Steven J. Montgomery, president and CEO of the Farm Credit Banks of Louisville, said that under the new program. 
