4-H'ers compete in state horse judging

Eight 4-H'ers and three leaders from Rockcastle County attended the recent State 4-H Horse judging contest held at the Kentucky Horse Park.

For the first time, Rockcastle County had both a junior and senior team compete at the contest. On the senior team were Scott Goforth, Wanda Howard, Darrell Collins and John Fain. On the junior team were Eddie Mosley, Bobby Mosley, Frank Fain and Mitchell Durham. Four of the 4-H'ers had competed in this contest in previous years, for the others it was their first time to compete in a judging contest.

We competed in the English division, which included judging two Saddlebred classes, a morgan and arabian halter classes. 4-H'ers also were required to judge a morgan pleasure class, and an American Saddlebred class.

Senior members are also required to give oral reasons (without any notes) on three classes: two halter and one performance.

This year, our senior team placed 5th high in the state! Our junior team placed 11th. Congratulations to all of these 4-H'ers!

A special thank you to Ralph and Kathy Mosley, who helped Patty Himes, horse leader, chaperone and transport 4-H'ers

to the contest. Another thank you to Bobby and Diane Fain, Todd and Dorothy Chastain for allowing us to use their barn and horses-in-training for the contest. The horse judging contest is only one of many activities offered in the 4-H horse program. The 4-H horse program is one of the largest and fastest growing 4-H programs in Kentucky and the nation. MAKING YOUR OWN JAMS, JELLIES AND PRESERVES

A free copy of a new jams and jellies publication is waiting for you to claim at your local county Extension office. It's 16-pages are crammed full of recipes for all kinds of jellies, jams, preserves, fruit butters, and marmalades you can make at home.

Uncooked jams that you store in your refrigerator or freezer are probably the easiest to make, and they're so fresh tasting.

To help you become an expert at making jelly, there are six pages of special directions and recipes. The booklet also has recipes for fruit butters, preserves and marmalades. The jellies can be sealed with paraffin, but all the rest should be processed in your boiling-water-bath canner for the recommended period of time. There's just no other way of making certain they won't get moldy and spoil after all your hard work.

Once they're moldy, food specialists say you should throw the whole jar of jam, jelly or marmalade away. It's not enough just to skim off the mold, because the rest of the jar is probably contaminated, too.

Peach Preserves

Here is a good recipe right now for peach preserves, which calls for "2 quarts of sliced ripe peaches, 4 cups of hot water, and 4 cups of sugar."

Dip peaches in boiling water until their skins loosen, then slip skins off and slice peaches. Make a sirup from the hot water and sugar. Cook peaches in this sirup until they are clear. Remove peaches from the sirup and boil sirup 5 to 10 minutes longer. Place peaches in a shallow pan, pour the sirup over them and let them stand for a few hours or overnight. This lets the peaches absorb the sirup and plump up.

Remove the peaches from the remaining sirup, boil sirup until thick, and pour over the peaches. Fill clean, hot jars, seal, and process in boiling-water-bath canner for 20 minutes.

Uncooked Peach Jam

A quicker recipe that's also delicious is the one for uncooked peach jam. This calls for 3 cups of crushed or pureed ripe peaches (about 2-1/2 pounds), 5 cups of sugar, 1 package of powdered pectin, and 1 cup of water.

Add sugar to the peaches, mix well, and let stand for 20 minutes. Dissolve pectin in the water, bring to a boil for 1 minute, and add to fruit-and-sugar mixture. Stir for 2 minutes, then ladle jam into jelly glasses or freezer containers, leaving 1/2-inch headspace at top. Cover containers and let stand for 12 to 48 hours - as long as it takes for the jam to set. Cover jam to be stored in refrigerator with a thin layer of hot paraffin. Put top on freezer container. Freezer or refrigerator.

This makes about 7 half-pint jars or 9 six-ounce glasses of peach jam. It will keep a few months in your refrigerator and up to a year in your freezer.

SUMMER HAZARDS

Summer is a time when parents need to watch for burn dangers to their children. A warning to children and their parents may help prevent injuries.

The following is a list of potential hazards. They are causes of burns seen in the Burn Unit at Kosair Children's Hospital during past summers according to Diane Denton, Burn Prevention Educator.

-Fireworks - particularly unsupervised use of fireworks

-Gasoline - children cutting grass or playing with gasoline

-Grills and charcoal - children standing too close as parents use grills and charcoal or walking on charcoal dumped out of the grill as well as other contact burns.

-Trash fires - (allowed in some counties outside Jefferson).

-Muffer burns - contact with lawn mowers, mini-bikes, motorcycles, etc.

-Some burns happen year-round, but parents need year-round reminders.

-Scalds - pots and pans on a stove, fryers and slow cookers, coffee pots

-Scalds - water too hot in tub or sink

-Cooking burns - fires from grease

-Play with matches or lighters

-Irons - (Take three minutes to heat and 20 to cool, temperatures vary from 170° to 370°F)

In 1986, Louisville area hospitals treated 27 people with burns during the July 4 holiday. Education and safety precautions can reduce that number to zero.

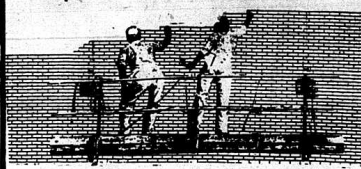

Health Department closes beach at lake

The Lake Linville beach was closed to swimming this week by the Rockcastle County Health Department.

In an order, Steve Midkiff, health departmentist for the health department, said the beach was to remain off limits to swimmers "until compliance with requirements are certified," meaning until he lifts the order.

Jimmy Hale, who leases the boat dock and beach, said it likely will be a long time before all the beach requirements and regulations are met, if ever.

The order did not come as a surprise. Midkiff had informed the city council verbally and through Councilman Larry Burdette, that compliance must be met within 10 days or the beach closed.

Visitors can still use the beach for sunbathing but not for wading. The order does not affect boating, water skiing or fishing, yet. However, the council has discussed, but not passed, an ordinance prohibiting wading anywhere around the lake, all water skiing and limiting motor size for boats.

Closing the beach will not put Hale out of business. "I will lose some business in soft drinks, candies and the like from the beach visitors, but not a large amount," Hale said.

"There will be some loss from campers who want to use the beach and will now go elsewhere."

Several weeks ago Midkiff presented a list of problems at the beach to the city but the city, in turn, passed them along to Hale who still questions that decision. One of the major problems

with the beach has been the washout of sand and gravel. The headwaters of Renfro Creek runs through the swimming area and takes the gravel and sand away.

Hale believes that it is the city's responsibility of maintaining the sand and gravel, or move the beach to another location.

He said Midkiff told him he could probably find a location "that suits him," meaning Midkiff.

The underwater condition of the beach is not the only problems enumerated by Midkiff.

He wants the beach fenced, a lifeguard on duty, elevated lifeguard chair, free telephone on the beach, safety equipment, rescue boat, paddle board.

Midkiff gave the beach a 48 percent rating, possibly one of the lowest anywhere.

Hale said if the beach is to have sand and gravel replacement, the lake would have to be partially drained.

On the other items mentioned by Midkiff, Hale said it will be impossible for him to comply with such a small operation.

"I think some people just want this to be a fishing lake and nothing else, and others want to fence it all and keep people out," Hale said. "The beach and swimming area was made restrictive by the city council, and I think the council should be responsible for its restrictions."

He said this season started out better than previous years, but the beach was made restrictive in June in May, because of so "many regulations."

He said if water skiing, for example, is no longer allowed, along with swimming, wading and boating with motor size limited, there will be even less business.

Cash appointed high school principal

Baker to be assistant

Ronnie Cash, assistant principal at the Rockcastle County High School since 1973, was the unanimous choice of the Rockcastle County School Board Tuesday night to replace Cleston Saylor as principal. Saylor retired June 30. Superintendent Bige Towery, recommended to the board that they hire Cash as principal and Charles "Tuck" Baker as full-time assistant principal. Baker has been half-time principal since 1980.

Towery said that most likely he would not recommend anyone to fill the half-time principal's position and half-time teacher.

He said the high school has the exact amount of full-time teachers it needs and the State Department of Education recommended that the school system not hire another full-time assistant at the school. The school system is somewhat overstaffed now.

"I've talked to both men about this recommendation and both these individuals have assured me that they will fully cooperate with each other and that their primary goal will be the promotion of a quality educational program at RCHS," Towery said.

"Having worked in the RCHS for many years, Mr. Cash and Mr. Baker are acutely aware of the magnitude of responsibilities and the awesome demands that go with these jobs, and both have indicated to me

that they are capable and ready to assume these leadership roles," he said. In my opinion, since their qualifications appear equal to those of other applicants, it seems appropriate that we afford them a promotional opportunity."

Cash is a native of Brodhead and Baker a native of Mt. Vernon. Both men have had extensive classroom experience as well as experience at the administrative level.

Nine applications were received for the job and Towery conducted five interviews. Those applying in addition to Baker and Cash were: C.K. Cornelius, former Laurel County superintendent and now a teacher at Mt. Vernon Elementary School, Marshall Norton, a former physical education teacher at Mt. Vernon and now assistant principal at Garrard County High School; Herman Sparks, principal at Jackson County High School; Robert Beck, a teacher in the Madison County school system; Steve Butler, vice principal in Casey County; Kenneth Murray, a teacher from Palm Beach, Fla., and John Westfield, elementary principal in Glasgow.

Although Towery had his recommendation ready for the board, board member Dr. Billy George Griffith recommended an executive session before the hiring.

After the 15 minute closed session the board endorsed with the unanimous vote.

No plans to improve road highway department says

Speculation that a new four lane U.S. 25 will be extended from the Ky. 461 intersection near Red Top Restaurant to the I-75 interchange at Renfro Valley apparently is a little premature.

D.J. Garland, state highway district engineer at Somerset, said Wednesday a recommendation has been made by the Kentucky Department of Transportation for a new section of highway, in that area, but that it is only a recommendation to the Federal Bureau of Highways.

The bureau has had the recommendation for a considerable time, Garland said, and would furnish the money for the new section of highway, estimated at several million dollars due to the amount of fill work that would have to be done.

The recommendation is for the road to be routed east of the present road behind Druther's Restaurant.

It was learned that U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers had planned to contact the federal bureau about the road, but no report on a meeting has come from the representative's office. Apparently it did not take place.

Best guess now is that any additional road building in that area is far into the future, as much as five to 10 years.

Garland said the highway department would be happy if the road was built, but that the new section would be U.S. 25 and under federal guidelines. Ky. 461 ends at its junction with U.S. 25.

The EPA is unhappy with the amount of effluent that drains from the sewer plant into the Dix River.

Cass said the EPA estimates it will take perhaps as much as \$250,000 to bring the plant into compliance, or about \$100,000 if the remainder could be obtained through a grant. Cass added that he did not think there would be a grant available at this time.

Cass said the plant is in compliance for eight or nine months a year.

Adna L. Martin, 46, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon held police at bay, taking shots at officers who surrounded her mobile home about 5 p.m.

Martin is presently free on a \$25,000 cash unsecured bond. She is due back in court July 20 for arraignment. She has been charged with criminal attempt to commit murder.

Police said that the episode began when troopers Jimmy Silvers and Gary Lane arrived at Mrs. Martin's trailer on May Apple road. Police at the London Police station told they had been in contact that Mrs. Martin might have taken an overdose of pills.

Brodhead council approves budget

A budget of \$42,310 to run the City of Brodhead for the 1987-88 fiscal year was approved by the Brodhead City Council at a meeting Monday night.

Income available for the new general fund budget is \$61,215, leaving the city with an \$18,905 balance at the end of the year.

The new budget is \$970 less than last year's \$43,285 budget.

Missing from the new budget will be Revenue Sharing funds that totaled \$12,500 last year.

In the Brodhead Water Works Revenue Account, the city has \$152,002 available for appropriation, but will use only \$118,210, leaving the fund with \$33,792 at the end of the year.

A breakdown of that fund shows \$95,000 will go into the water works operations account; \$21,600 in the water works bond and interest account, and \$1,610 to the Citizens Bank for interest on the Profit property.

Largest item in the operations account is an estimated \$30,000 earmarked for the purchase of water from the City of Mt. Vernon.

In the Brodhead municipal aid fund, resources available for the year total \$14,794 and \$14,500 appropriated, leaving that fund with \$294 at the end of the year.

The complete budget will be found on another page in this issue of the Signal.

The manager told the old jail was sold at auction for \$3,000 and was purchased by Ray Mack Lunsford of Brodhead.

The council was also told that the jail building contains the valve-regulating-oleck that controls the city water supply from Mt. Vernon and will have to be moved. Mayor Billy Bussell estimated the cost at \$400, or more, leading Councilman D.A. Robbins to comment: "Why did we sell it?"

James Cass, consultant for the city, told the council it can expect a lawsuit in the future from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) because the city sewer plant is not in compliance with federal sewer plant effluent regulations.

Cass said the EPA has given the city until July 8 (yesterday) to comply or face a possible \$10,000 a day fine.

Grading problems solved

After meetings between all parties involved chorus teacher at RCHS, Margie Wilcox, will up the grades of two streets involved in a controversy over grading.

During the June school board meeting Bobby and Vicki DeBorle complained to the board that their daughters Bridgett and Brandi had received low grades because of conduct. They contended that this was illegal under Kentucky law.

Court upholds broad form deed

A decision on the validity of the 1984 broad farm deed law was decided last Thursday by the Kentucky Supreme Court that left some property owners unhappy, but coal operators generally pleased.

The 37-page opinion set aside part of a 1956 state supreme court decision by saying some owners of land that is strip mined under a broad form deed are entitled to compensation from the coal company.

But that would apply only when the mineral rights were transferred before 1956. Most mineral rights leased under the old broad form deed have been transferred, often several times, since 1956.

The main opinion was written by Chief Justice Robert Stephens. Justices William Gant and Charles Leibson signed Stephens' opinion.

Three other justices - Joseph Lambert, James Stephenson and Donald Whiteshimer dissented. They said landowners should receive damages for all mining under broad-form deeds.

"We didn't have a clear ruling from the court as to whether the law is unconstitutional," said Joy Childers, Lexington attorney who represents several eastern Kentucky landowners who are trying to prevent their land from being strip mined.

Childers said only three justices found the law unconstitutional, and that there were four

separate opinions.

"We're certainly going to go back and seek a re-hearing," Childers said.

In one of two cases considered by the supreme court in issuing Thursday's ruling, Elizabeth Wooten and other Perry Countians had won their suit in Perry Circuit Court when Judge Calvin Manis upheld the 1984 broad form deed law, but coal companies appealed his decision. That suit will now be returned to Manis's court.

In the other case, a group of Floyd County landowners had sued the State Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet in U.S. District Court to prevent Falcon Coal Co. from stripping their land. A federal court referred the case to the Kentucky Supreme Court.

Only three justices indicated in their opinions that the 1984 law was unconstitutional, Childers said. Three others upheld the legislation.

Justice Roy Vance, the swing vote, said nothing about the constitutionality of the law in his opi-

nion, Childers noted.

Childers said he will argue that the broad form deed law is still in effect, because only three judges ruled it unconstitutional in Mt. Vernon. Lake Cumberland traffic rolled in and out on the by-pass with very few problems. Just be careful when traveling the new road and be sure and watch out for the Ohio Navy.

Childers, who also represents the Kentucky Fair Tax Coalition, said one effect of Thursday's ruling on the Kentucky law is that "what mineral rights not leased now that can be leased, will be." Coal operators were generally pleased with the ruling, although Richard Ward, a Lexington attorney for some of the coal companies in the case, is quoted in the Courier-Journal as saying the key language in the ruling is ambiguous. Ward said his clients may seek clarification.

LET'S INCLUDE TOBACCO IN EXPORT PROMOTIONS

With exports becoming increasingly important to Kentucky's tobacco growers, it has seemed only a matter of time before tobacco's opponents would begin shifting their attacks to the international trade front.

By the time you read this, one such attack might already be in the news. And I want to give you some background on our efforts to turn back this new threat to our farming communities.

As has been widely reported, the Senate has been debating a trade bill aimed in part at promoting U.S. exports to countries engaging in unfair trade practices against the United States. Anti-tobacco forces out of the expanded promotions envisioned in this bill.

I strongly support our trade bill, and I plan to be very active in a bipartisan effort to block this highly damaging and unjustified tobacco amendment.

Our federal export programs — known as export enhancement and targeted export assistance — already are contributing to a promising upturn in farm exports. Expanded programs could do even more to end a devastating farm recession.

But tobacco has been left out of these programs because of a technically arising from the unique structure of the federal tobacco program. In their amendment to the trade bill, our opponents are attempting to strike language that would remedy this unfortunate omission.

For all practical purposes, tobacco farmers are left out of export promotions because they agreed a few years ago to start paying for their own price-support program. This situation clearly defies common sense. But let me explain how it came about and how it might readily be corrected.

As most of you know, we use government loans to pay support prices to farmers whose leaf doesn't command such prices at annual auctions. This leaf is pooled by grower associations and later sold to repay the loans. If pool sales fail to satisfy the loans, we are required to use money collected from farmers and tobacco companies to make up the losses, leaving no net cost to the government.

Our problem lies in the current interpretation of our no-net-cost law. That interpretation is that growers must pay for loan losses even if those losses come from selling tobacco at reduced prices in export promotions. We can't expect our tobacco associations to take part in such promotions with the idea of billing growers for losses incurred in foreign sales.

With other commodities, such losses are treated as part of the federal cost of export promotion. That's obviously the way it should be with tobacco. And that's why the trade bill has language making it clear that export promotion costs won't be treated as losses on tobacco loans.

The amendment to strike this language is ill conceived and unfair to our tobacco growers and tobacco-growing communities. No matter what happens in the current battle, we will continue to push for fair treatment of tobacco in world markets.

We should not invite other countries to say that fair trade doesn't extend to U.S. tobacco. Our trade programs should apply equally to all commodities that can benefit from them. By ignoring one aspect of the farm economy, we can only weaken the whole and undermine efforts to achieve a more favorable balance of trade for our entire nation.

State announces road projects

A total of \$28.6 million has been earmarked for highway work in Rockcastle County, according to an announcement Wednesday by the Transportation Cabinet.

The highway department will spend \$9.4 million for construction of the remaining section of Ky. 461 between the end of the new pavement south of Mt. Vernon (WABD) and the Pulaski County line where it will be continued to the end of the pavement north of Ky. 80 at an additional cost of \$7.2 million. The money is allocated for 1988.

The highway department will spend \$10 million for resurfacing sections of I-75 in Rockcastle County. Some of the work will be between the Renfro Valley interchange and the Rockcastle River bridge.

The third project estimated at \$9.2 million, will be spent between now and 1994 improving Ky. 421. The section is less than half-a-mile but is mountainous. None of the money is scheduled for further work on Ky. 461/U.S. 25 at Mt. Vernon.

Also in Pulaski County, the plan calls for \$15.6 million for a Somerset bypass by 1994.

461 Bypass - From Front it was reported the public did not have input into the Ky. 461 bypass. That was an error. A public hearing was held by the highway department at Rockcastle County High School before the route of the road was finalized. Only 11 persons attended and no one locally made a suggestion as to the route. A Signal representative attended the meeting.

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
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Rockcastle schools get grants totaling \$22,003

Grants to the Rockcastle school systems for three projects have been announced by the State Board of Education.

The three grants total \$22,003. The system will receive \$14,000 for its project "Writing Across the Disciplines".

Teachers of any subject in grades seven through 10 with creative methods of getting students to write in class demonstrated a keen understanding of the writing process were eligible for funding.

The 86 projects now in operation involving 52,000 students and 59 school districts are making a difference, according to Superintendent of Public Instruction Alice McDonald.

"We will be evaluating these programs using students' writing samples. We're going to be seeing great curriculum guides and instructional materials evolving from these writing projects that can be shared around the state," McDonald said.

A \$5,000 teacher grant through the Educational Innovation Incentive Fund, continue the school's, "Community Based Education for Trainable Mentally Handicapped Students".

The Educational Innovation Incentive Fund, created by the Legislature in 1985, encourages teachers and school administrators to try new approaches to educational problems. It provides \$2.5 million a year for projects to improve instruction or school management, ideas that have not been tried in the particular district before.

County schools will receive \$3,000 for "Improving KEST scores through computer services," through the Educational Excellence Improvement Fund.

Dr. Donald Martin, Jessamine County superintendent and a member of the committee that oversees the Educational Excellence Improvement Fund, told the State Board of Education Wednesday that the fund is accomplishing its aim: encouraging local districts to involve their communities in improving students' academic achievement.

Farmers beware Blue Mold found in Tennessee

Kentucky tobacco farmers are being warned that the fungus blue mold, has been found on a farm in Tennessee.

The mold has caused considerable damage to about a third of the field where it was found, a field where no preventive control was used.

Some of the lesions were two weeks old when found and spores were abundant in the field.

A blue mold alert has been issued for northeastern Tennessee and a blue mold watch is in effect in east and southeast Kentucky.

University of Kentucky tobacco specialists say the watch has been in effect since July 1 and weather conditions are favorable for the outbreak of disease.

The plants are growing rapidly at this time and are particularly susceptible to the fungus.

Farmers spotting the dreaded disease in their crops should report such findings to the University of Kentucky immediately.

Plant bed blue mold first appears as a yellowing, stunting or scalding of young leaves.

Presence of a bluish downy mildew growth is the best diagnostic feature.

Systemic blue mold, where the disease invades the vascular system of the plant, is characterized by brown discoloration beneath the bark.

Blue mold is caused by the fungus *Perozonospora tabacina*. The fungus lives only on living tissue.

Blue mold control is centered on prevention, though Ridomil may be useful as control of the disease after it is spotted in the field.

Ridomil only is effective if it is placed on the leaf before the blue mold spores get on the leaf.

Notice Food Stamp Customers

Rockcastle Countians who receive federal food stamps are now benefiting from Kentucky's new computerized food stamp system (KAMES) recently made operational in the Rockcastle County office of the Kentucky Department for Social Insurance.

The Kentucky Automated Management and Eligibility System (KAMES) was developed to enable the department's caseworkers to handle the entire food stamp eligibility process, from application to issuance of coupons, with greater speed and efficiency.

Brenda Hayes, manager of the Social Insurance office in Mt. Vernon, said the KAMES computers store information when the client first applies, then make that information readily available later on.

"The beauty of the system is that many time consuming jobs that previously had to be done case by case -- jobs such as updating cases when eligibility guidelines or client income changes -- are now done automatically when the new information is fed into the terminal at the worker's desk," said Hayes.

"The system also makes almost immediate client eligibility and benefit determinations," she said, "allowing the caseworker to tell applicants on the spot if they can receive food stamps and how many they get monthly."

In addition to a quicker issuance time of days instead of weeks, the KAMES system is also designed to reduce much

repetitive paperwork and cut into the costly problems of over-issuance due to error and criminal fraud.

Hayes said KAMES is expected to be in use statewide by the end of the year. By that time, all of Rockcastle County's newly approved food stamp cases should be completely transferred onto the \$20 million system, which was funded jointly by the state of Kentucky and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

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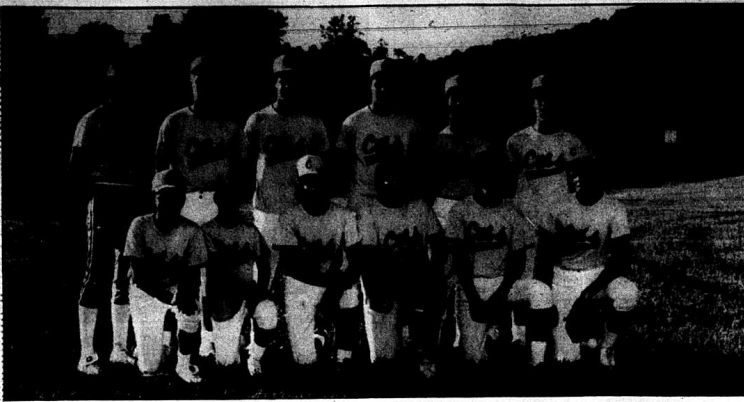

Fishing activity over the July 4-5 weekend was reported light to moderate across the state as unstable weather conditions and periods of rain hampered anglers. Bass and bluegill were the species caught most consistently. The lake-by-lake rundown, as reported by conservation officers or creel clerks at each lake: Kentucky: Creel Clerk Buddy Boyd reports that white bass were hitting spinners and spoons in the jumps and deep running crank baits 12-15 feet deep; black bass were hitting crank baits and jigs off rocky ledges 10-12 feet deep; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 82 degrees.

Barkley: Creel Clerk Norman Brantley reports that white bass were hitting slab spoons in the jumps and crank baits trolled over old river channels and the

mouths of tributaries 7-15 feet deep; bluegill were hitting flies near willow fly hatches and crickets in the backs of coves; clear, stable at summer pool and 84 degrees.

Barren River: Creel Clerk Ralph Shipley reports that bluegill were hitting crickets and red worms off gravel banks 3-10 feet deep; black bass were taking plastic worms in submerged cover 15-20 feet deep; in the tailwaters, small crappie were hitting minnows and trout were taking red worms and corn; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 85 degrees.

Nolin: Conservation Officer James Shipp reports that bluegill were hitting crickets and red worms off rocky banks 1-4 feet deep; crappie were hitting minnows over cover 10-15 feet deep;

clear to murky falling, two feet below summer pool and 84 degrees.

offs in 2-6 feet of water; white bass were active on minnows off steep points 10-15 feet deep; clear, stable at five feet below summer pool and 83 degrees.

Dale Hollow: Conservation Officer Marvin Edwards reports that black bass were hitting plastic worms and jigs at night off steep banks and over weed beds in 5-25 feet of water; bluegill were hitting worms and crickets off deep banks 5-15 feet deep; clear to murky, stable at two feet above summer pool and 84 degrees.

Vacation time is here again! In all the excitement, one item is easily forgotten -- sunscreen.

Sunscreens are available as creams, gels, oils and lotions. The creams and gels usually provide more protection than oils and lotions. They must be reapplied after swimming or heavy sweating.

Most products today are marked with an SPF (sun protection factor) number. It represents the ratio of time for sunburning protected skin as opposed to unprotected skin. For example, if you usually burn in one hour of sun exposure, theoretically you can remain in the sun for 6 hours before you will burn if you use a product with an SPF of 6. Keep in mind that this is theoretical. Some products vary in the accuracy of their SPF numbers. These numbers run on a scale of 2 to 33. It's best to be cautious and choose a higher SPF than needed instead of a lower SPF than needed.

If you have any questions about sunscreens, check with your doctor or pharmacist. Sunscreens are too important to be forgotten.
