

My country its of thee, sweet land of cookies!
Our country is a land of cookie monsters. Americans crunch more
than two billion pounds of cookie monsters. Americans crunch more
than two billion pounds of cookies annually. That averages to more than 300
cookies a year for every man, woman and child.
Although there are many varieties, most cookies are based on the
same three ingredients: sugar, flour and fat in the form of shortening.
The difference is in the ratios of these three ingredients and the
amount of other additives, such as chocolate chips and creme fillings.
That's what accounts for the fact that one half-ounce cookie has as
many as 90 calories while another kind of cookie of the same weight has just
65 calories.

In most cases, the information on the package is little help becuase it doesn't provide the number of calories per cookie and the percentage calories that come from fat.

There may be no difference in calories between several kinds of cookies, but with some brands, more of those calories come from fat. Outdoor burning!!!

Outdoor burning is an idea that can spread like wildfire. A little prepara-tion can make a safe difference.

Check with your local fire authori-ties before you burn any size materi-als. If burning is allowed, make sure your fire is properly contained and mervised

Never leave the fire unattended Never leave the fire unattended. Never burn on a windy day. Use a metal barrel in good condition. Add a hinged and weighted mesh screen to prevent debris from escaping from the barrel. Punch air holes about one inch in diameter near the bottom of the barrel to ensure more thorough burning. Clear a recommended safe area around the barrel. Three feet on all sides should be sufficient.



"When policy makers decide what federal projects are needed to bolster local economies, they may find that the rural unemployment rate is so low that they don't need to act," Skees said.
