

Crops feeling drought; lake water plentiful

Things could get worse before they get better, Weather Service and agriculture officials agree when they talk about the hot, dry days that con-tinue to linger across Kentucky. In Rockeastle County, crops are beginning to feel the effects of the drought conditions.

Harold Ballinger, ASCS director in Rockeastle, said this week the county is now "beginning in get quite a bit of retarded growth in crops." However, Ballinger noted that the county is 'still a little better off than other counties." Some areas of Rockeastle have had over an inch of rain in the past several days that has helped. At the least it settled the dust. To date this year, a total of 16.50 inches of rain has fallen in the county. The normal through June is 25.82 inches, meaning a deficiency in the area of 9.32 inches. Those figures vary some since only 21 days of June are figured in this year's rainfall. are figured in this year's rainfall.

To point up the problem, the Central Kentucky area is 70.12 inches

short on rain during the 1980s, or nearly two full years short of annual rainfall.

Locally, Mt. Vernon's water sup-ly is in "great shape right now," ccording to Matt Powell Jr., water uperintendent.

according to Matt Powell Jr., water superintendent.

"Lake Linville is still high." Powel lsaid. "We've got worlds of vater even though we're using an average of 1,250,000 gallons à day."

Laurel has an expected growth rate of 1-9.5 percent ranking fourth; Jackson with 15.6 percent; Pulaski with 8.8 percent; Lincoln with 9 percent and Madison with 4.5 percent, the lówest of the

with 4.5 percent, the lowest of the group. It should be noted that smaller populated counties with just an increase of about 1,000 persons could bring a high percentage rate. Rock-castle, for example, with a population now of 14,495 will grow to 16,201 in the period or by only 1,706 persons. Jackson would only go from 12,505 present population to 14,455 on 1,950 persons.

in the state in projected growth, would only see 2,937 more people

during the period.

Making Pickled Cauliflower

By: Cheryl Witt County Extension Agent for Home Economics

Pickles and relishes have a tart, spicy flavor which adds zest and variety to the meal. Cauliflower is one of the many vegetables you can

Here are instructions:

Break two large heads of cauliflower into small flowerets and cook in unsalted boiling water for 5 min-utes. Then drain them. Combine 2 1/ utuses. Then drain them. Combine 2 1/ 2 cups of distilled white vinegar, 1 1/ 2 cups water, 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar, 3 ablespoons pickling salt, 1 tablespoon mustard seed, 1 tablespoon mustard seed, 1 tablespoon ground curmeric (optional) in a succepa and heat to boiling. (The tumeric will add a spicy flavor and give a yellow product). Add the catifilower and let sim-mer for 2 minutes. Continue simmer-ing while quickly packing one clean hot, jar at a time. Fill to within 1/2 inch of top, making sare vinegar solution covers the mixture. Cap each jar at once. Process 5 minutes in obiling-water-bath canner. This

each jar at once. Process 5 minutes in boiling-water-bath canner. This makes 5-6 pints. How To Make Glass-Jar Sauerkraut

You don't need a big wooden tub or crock to make sauerkraut. You can put up a small batch in quart jars.

This is a good way to do it if you have just a few sauerkraut lovers in the family. It calls for 5 pounds of

the family. It calls for 5 pounds of shredded cabbage.
Here is a recipe for 3 quarts or 6 pints of sauerkrata:
Select firm, mature heads of cabbage. Remove outer leaves. Cut into halves or quarters and remove the core. Wash and drain cabbage. Use a shredder or sharp knife to cut the cabbage into thin shreds. Well shredded cabbage and thoroughly mix 5 pounds with 3 tablespooned of pickling salt. Let the salted cabbage stand to with Pack solidly in clean stand to wilt. Pack solidly in clean glass canning jars to within 1/2 inch
