

Magistrates vote to keep name of Negro Creek

By a vote of four, with one absten-tion, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court agreed Tuesday to keep the name of Negro Creck Road intact. Only Magistrate Ricky Kirby, in whose district the road is located, abstained. County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker voted with the ma-iority.

In retrospect, at a previous court session, Lenny McPherson, who lives along the road, saked for a change in the name, citing it was a name that was embarrassing and an insult to the Negrorace, while admitting there are no blacks in the county. Phillip Payne, who also lives along the road, saked the county to change the road, saked the county.

New annexation plan includes industrial park

In a turnabout, the Mt. Vernon City Council has decided to include the Rockcastle Industrial Park in its annexation plans.

The change was reported by Mayor Gary R: Cromer at a meeting of the council Tuesday night. However, when only three councilmen attended the meeting it was officially adjourned until 7 p.m. Sept. 18, but an informal discussion was held. Most of the discussion in the past

months months by the council has not cluded the industrial park. Under st law, the number of property owners and registered voters in the area to be annexed must number at least half the number of employees in the park. Earlier, the city did not believe it had the number of the number

Earlier, the city did not believe it had that number. Most of the questions from the some 25 visitors who attended the meeting related to what a property owner would get if he were annexed to the

would get if he were annexed to the city. Mayor Cromer told the group they would get reduced home insurance rates (disputed by some), possible street lights, and better roads. He addrd it would raise the city tax base and the city could possibly be in a higher classification. Buthe indicated server service is a long way off. The group was told that in order to

prevent annexation a petition must be presented to the council within 60 days of the official notice of annexation. It must bear at least 50 percent of the names of property owners and registered voters in the area to be annexed asking for a vote on the annexation.

annexation. If the required 50 percent is reached the proposal would be put on the ballot at the next General Election.

the proposal would be put on the ballot at the next General Election. Then, if 55 percent of the registered voters living in the area vote against annexation the measure is killed. Otherwise, the area will automati-cally become a part of the city. It was stressed that the registered voter must actually live in the area to be annexed when the final vote is aken. Although the property owner in the area may sign the petition to bring the annexation to a vote, when the final vote istaken at the polls, he must live in the area to be annexed. This would mean a list of voters eligible to vote on annexation would have to be available at the precinct polling place. For example, some voters living in a precinct may not be within the annexation area and ther-one would not be eligible to vote.



County's marijuana count passes 10,000

The Kentucky State Police's battle against marijuana cultivation in Rockcastle County has hit a high gear since early August. A total of 10,677 plants had been

A total of 10,67/ plants had been confiscated and destroyed through September 1, according to a check with the London KSP post. Records there showed that 3,004 plants had been destroyed through August 3, and since then, another 7,673 plants had been located and desenvert

7,673 plants had been located and destroyed. KSP spokesman Gil Acciardo said of the numbers, We have had the (heil)copter here (at London) more than in previous years. We are find-ing more of it." While he couldn't say the figures represented specific increases in plant confiscation, he said it seemed to litm that the KSP had had more success in locating the plants than in some re-cent years:

But, he felt the same kind of effort vas being made this year as in past ummers.

There are several weeks left in the growing season, and a final tally of plants found in the county won't be

ready until later this month. But, KSP officers figured last month that at that time, they had found no more than half of the probable marijuana crop in one particular able marjuana crop in one part county. At that time, Rockcastle's figure was put at 3,030. Since the KSP puts an estimated price of \$1,000 per plant, Rockcastle had a \$6 million crop

Rockcastle had a \$6 million crop then. With the new figure of 10.677, the potential profits from marijuana for the county now stands at well over \$10 million. / Two weeks ago, another Signal story compared the potential profits of marijuana with tobacco for county farmers.

of marijuana with tobacco for county farmers. Growers in Rockcastle can expect a total gross of about \$4,958,000 for the 1989 crops. But, based on \$1.62 per hundred weight, only about 62 cents of that is expected to represent profit. That would put the potential profit. for county tobacco at some-thing around \$2.32 million, making marijuana worth about \$8.3 million MORE than tobacco, traditionally THE crop for county farprers.

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




