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



Floyd Wayne Owens shot Dale Kelly Cope in self defense, contended defense attorney Jerry Cox in his opening remarks Tuesday in Rock-castle Circuit Court.

"What's for dinner?" This familiar "What's for dinner?" This familiar question froquently goes unanswerd until just before serving time, To help make the decision easier, preme meals that are just about complete in noe dish or on a single plate or platter. Incorporating the meat, vegetable and starch portions of the meal in one recipe, reduces dishes and simplifies both preparation and serving, just add a salad or relishes and a dessert, if you wish. 





A total of \$1,777,650 went to vet-cans in Rockcastle County during the 1990 fiscal year, according to figures from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Of that amount, \$1,697,718 went for compensation and pensions; \$15,517 went for readjustment and vocational rehabilitation, and \$64,415

for insurance and indemnities.

"Of the more than \$495 million distributed in Kentucky last year, more than \$79 percent, or \$286,7 million, went directly to veterans as compensation and pension for disabling injuries or diseases incurred while in the armed forces, "according to John W. Hagan Ir. director of the VA Regional office in Louisville. He added that VA spent \$10.2 million for readjustment and voca-itional rehabilistion benefits, \$20.7 million for insurance and indemnity paymens, \$5.38 million for facility construction and \$373.5 million for medical services and administrative medical services and administrative


