# Family Resource and routh Services Center 

The Rockcaste County Youth Services Center is now open and operating in the Rockcastle School district for all youth and their families.

The Youth Services Center was created as part of the Kentucky Education Reform Aet of 1990. The primary intent of the center is to enhance student's abilities to succeed in school by assisting youth and their families in meeting some of their basic needs. This will be done by providing community services at the center or by linking families to agencies in our community.

Although the center has been effective for only two months, there is notable progress and positive response from students and families. Up to the present time, the primary focus has been on working with individual youth and their families, meeting their needs. As a referral service, there has been concentration on finding which service agencies will benefit an individual or family and ensuring that procedures are followed in order to receive the service. Transportation is provided as necessary.

Some of the areas that the Youth Services Center will focus on include:
-Employment counseling, training, and placement for youth

- Substance abuse services, counseling, or referral to substance abuse services
-Health services or referral to health services
-Information, education, and/or counseling on teen pregnancy, suicide and substance abuse
-After school programs, activities and projects for youth and families
The Youth Services Center is sponsoring new organization at the Rockcastic County High School called Teen Leadership Council (TLC). Ten studenis and iwo parents attended a Regional Teen Leadership confererce at Annville Institute (sponsored by "Champions Against Drugs") on October 11 h\& 12 th . These sludents will provide the foundation for the club and encourage other students to join. The students themselves will establish the by-laws and make their own goals and objectives. The golden ruie that must always be honored is that any stucent in the club must be drug-free in and out of school. This organization goes along with new school reform by giving students the opportunity to make decisions concerning issues they feel are important and need to address.

The Center is located across from the Rockcastle Board of Education in the old bus garage. The counselor and coordinator will also be school-based at the Rockcastle County High School where students will have access to services everyday.

## ROCKCASTLE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER

The Kentucky Education and Reform Act (KERA) of 1990 mandated that Family Resource Centers be developed to promote partnerships among parents, schoois and communities to faciitate school success for our children.

The Rockcastle County Famiiy Resource Center recognizes that parents are key parners in the education of their children. We are a family support system in the process or developing activities and programs in collaboration with existing community systems which will enable families to participate in the leaming processes of their children. Our mission is based on the following known facts and benefits of the family-school partnership as stated by Kunesh and Bakker (1990):

1. The family provides the primary educational environment.
2. Involving parents in their children's formal education improves stucent achievement.
3. Parent involvement is most effective when it is comprehensive, long-lasting; well-planned and culturally appropriate.
4. The benefits are not confined to eariy childhood or the elementary level; there are strong effects from involving parents continuously throughout high school.
5. Involving parents in their own children's education at home is not enough. To ensure the quality of schools as institutions serving the community, parents must be involved at all levels in the school.
6. Children from low-income and minority families have the most to gain when schools involve parents. Parents do not have to be well-educated to help.
7. We cannot look at the school and the home in isolation from one another, we must see how they interconnect with each other and with the world at large (Henderson, 1987).
Most families would like to provide healthy environments for their children to grow and develop. Unfortunately,
there are many barriers. A major deterrent to building successful family relationships and environments is stress.
Research has documented that economic stress, lack of social support and other protective factors, a fragile or immature parent, and sometimes a difficult infant can combine, in the absence of outside help, to create an environment so bad that it interferes with the normal development of the child.

Families along the economic continuum from poor to affluent are subject to stresses. An expert has stated, "unless you have the external supports, the internal systems don't work."

The Rockcastle Family Resource Center (FRC) staff is prepared to work with families of children ages 10 to 12 , to relieve some of the stresses and to help remove some of the barriers to successful family relationships and environments. The goal is to enable families to provide their children with those positive experiences, on which successfurlives are built.

## Why Should I Get Involved with PTA/PTO?

Once there was a PTA/PTO looking for leaders and volunteers to work for the welfare of children and youth in the community during the school year. Some parents and teachers said, "I don't want to leave the comfort of my home: I'm tired after working all day and I enjoy resting and watching television." (But, the local drug pusher said, "Nothing will keep me from working with your children: not even the threat of being arrested.")

Some parents and teachers said, "We have to be out-of-town too often on the weekends and we are usually busy almost every evening of the week." (But the pomography dealers said, "We'll gladly spend our weekends and evenings to oblige your children.")

Some parents and teachers said, "I know nothing about PTA/PTO; I'm not qualified to work in such a responsible role. Let someone else do it." (But the movie producer said, "We'll review, analyze and expend millions of dollars to produce whatever turns youth on.")

Some parents and teachers said, "I don't have the time to go to committee meetings, PTA/PTO meetings and PTA/PTO functions." (But the pushers, the pomographers and the movie producers said, "We'll remain open as many hours as necessary, every day of the week, in order to win the minds of the kids.")

So, the parents and teachers stayed in the comfort of their homes, went out-of-town frequently on weekends, and maintained their busy schedules instead of working for the welfare of the children and youth in their community."

What do you suppose happened to the children? Can't you hear the same things being said today? Research has proven that one of the keys to quality education is PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT. "All other things being equal, students achieve better in schools that have Parent-Teacher Groups."

## KERA Goals Being Implemented

Instruction in Rockcastle County is in the process of changing as Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA) is more fully implemented.

KERA requires that students become active, life-long learners who can gather information and use it to solve problems and enhance quality of life. Rockcastle County School System is now very busy working to change its curriculum and instructional practices to accommodate the worthy goals of KERA.

If a person visits the schools of Rockcastle County now, he or she might see some very interesting and actively engaged learning techniques taking place.

Last year at Roundstone Elementary School, our system piloted a new science program called Activity Centered Elementary Science (ACES). This whole program is built around the philosophy that if students are going to learn science, they need to be doing things that pertain to science. This year, we have expanded this program to all four of our elementary schools. Our teachers are working very hard to learn the program and helping students conduct experiments and learn the scientific processes that will enable them to process information and make good decisions.

Our elementary schools have worked very hard to change our methods of teaching reading and the necessary materials for reading, Our teachers realized that in order for children to become good readers, they need to enjoy what they read. Due to that fact, we have bought many new and interesting books for our students. Teachers are very effectively using these good books and reading materials to teach the skills that must be taught in order for our students to continue learning.

I also think it is very interesting that many of our math teachers now teach by using high-tech calculators. A few years ago, calculator use in the classroom was not permitted. We have learned if a student masters the basic skills, they can then use calculators in order to achieve higher levels of mathematical knowledge.

Along the very same line is the use of computers and othertechnological devices. Students in grades K-12 now spend part of their school day doing assignments with a computer. Computers are very creatively and effectively being used in all our schools along with textbooks, paper, pencil, reference materials, etc. in order to teach our students what they need to know.

Rockcastle County High School has worked very hard this year in the area of writing. They believe and know that it is essential that students be able to communicate through clear writing expression. In years past, it was accepted that writing would be taught by English or language teachers, but at

I also feel that the changes brought about by KERA and the wonderful things that were already in place by the fine hardworking teachers in Rockcastle County will insure a quality education for our children.

Three years ago, The Rockcastle County School System began integrating the Basic Arts into its Education Curriculum. Since that time, Rockcastle County Schools have witnessed a gradual development of art, music, drama and creative. movement into the daily classroom routines. With the support of teachers, parents and the administrative personnel, the Basic Arts have evolved from simple seasonal color sheets into a broad creative program, presented as à logical extension of the general school curriculum.

The Arts in education are critical components of any well-rounded curriculum purporting to prepare leamers for leadership in the Twenty-First Century. The arts are foundational to establishing order and meaning in the individual's life. On the simplest level, the arts involve imitating life in order to understand life. On a more sophisticated level, the arts involve the creation of metaphor for society.

Arts education may be viewed as a process of social, intellectual, and creative exploration. It develops from the human need to communicate and is one of many processes by which humans learn about themselves and their world. Through the language of art, music, drama and creátive movement, individuals interact with each other, sharing thoughts, feelings and experiences.

As children develop communication skills, they explore their immediate environment and leam to interact with persons in it. As such, they will naturally and spontaneously explore the arts as a means of communication. Children enter school alreadyusing the arts to make discoveries, order their universe and test ideas. With proper nurturing, their interest, involvement and skill in the arts will continue to expand and deveiop both within and outside the school environment. Because children grow and de-velop-at differing rates, each leamer's interest is heightened, and success in the development of expression is enhanced, when a flexible and positive learning environment is established-an environment where both student and teacher respenses are. sought and respected, where leaming builds on prior knowledge and where active leamer involvement is constantly evident.

As students engage in the arts, both expressively and receptively, they will not only leam about the arts but they will also leam through the arts. Each child's social, emotional and intellectual success will be significantly affected by an ability to communicate effectively. The arts, as an important form of communication, must be infused with the curriculum to empower children to achieve an optimum level in all areas of develop1 .

## TECHNOLOGY IN OUR SCHOOLS

WHY? The Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA) created a nine-person Council for Education Technology. KERA directs the Council to develop a five-year plan for the equitable and efficient use of instructional and administrative technology in Kentucky schools. KERA states the plan shall outline the use of technology to: "1) Improve learning and teaching and the ability to meet individual student's needs to increase student achievement; 2) Improve curriculum delivery to help meet the needs for educational equity across the state; 3) Improve delivery of professional development; 4) Improve the efficiency and productivity of administrators; and 5) encourage development by the private sector and local school district acquisition of technologies and applications appropriate for education."
Rockcastle County recognizes the importance of technology as a motivational tool, to improve instruction, and to provide students with skills which they will encounter in life.
WHEN2 The Rockcastle County School System did not wait for KERA to provide for technology in the schools. Although KERA mandated a five-year plan for using technology in all schools and allocated funds to assist schools, Rockcastle County recognized this might be "too little too late." They realized the need to begin early implementing a base of technology in all the schools. This base provides the foundation for continued implemetation of technology funded through state and local funds. Fundng from the state is expected no sooner than April of 1992.
WHAT? When we hear about technology in our schools, we generally visualize students working with a keyboard, a monitor and some type of computer software. While this form of tuchnology is probably the most common and widely used in schools, there are many, many more types and uses available.
Each school in the county has in place the Novell Local Area Network. The network consists of computer workstations connected to a file server, which stores software. These workstations are distributed throughout the building and/or placed in a lab. All workstations can access the sofware in the file server. This eliminates purchasing a software program fore each individual workstation. The students and staff simply $\log$ on (connect) to the network and choose from the available programs


Patty Renner's 2nd grade students at Roundstone benefit from a mini-lab in their room. on the file server. Rockcastle High has a CD Rom Player attached to its file server, which allows an entire electronic encyclopedia to be accessed from a workstation.
A network will eventually be used to connect the classroom to the office for administrtative applicatigns such as student management, attendance, grading and schedulihg. In turn each school office can be linked with the Board of Education.

Brodhead Elementary and Mt. Vernon Elementary have laid the groundwork for a library management program which uses bar codes for circulation of books. When complete, this system allows the card catalogue to be viewed on a computer monitor. Teachers and students will be able to access the library's card catalogue from their classroom to search for book titles and materials.

Three of the elementary schools, Livingston, Mt. Vemon and Roundstone are using an approach called Teaching and Learning with Computers (TLC). This program consistsof $3-5$ computers and aprinter in each classroom. These mini labs are currently being used in either 2nd, 3rd, or 4th grade classes. This allows the teacher and students access to computers throughout the day.
The math and science departments at the high school are awaiting the arrival of a Chisolm Looking Glass. This is used in conjunction with an overhead projector so a whole classroom can view instruction or a presentation from one computer. A computer workstation can also be interfaced with a television monitor and used as a projection device.
The Kentucky Education Television Star Channel program allows students to take courses they would not otherwise be able to take. The students view the instructor on a television screen. Communication takes place through the use of a computef keypad response system and electronic mail. Brodhead Elementary is utilizing the Star Channel to offer Latin and German to a group of 7 7h and 8th graders. Rockcastle High has two students enrolled in a higher mathematics course that would not otherwise be offered.

Calculators are another form of technology which supplement math instruction. Many classrooms now have several calculators which were purchased with federal dollars. The T181 Graphing Calculators are


Senior Robert Didelot demonstrates the use of calculators at RCHS. targeted in grades 6-8 with some use in the higher level math classes at the high school. T112 Explorers, used in grades 3-6 and also some higher level math classes at RCHS, are the only calculators currently able to show fractions.
The task of today's schools is to prepare students to meet the challenges of an ever-changing society. Our schools must accommodate an increase in information as well as the varied technologies used in hamessing that information.

Rockcastle County's Early Childhood Programs have undergone tremendous growth over the past three years and this year has been no exception. Vernon and Livingston children, on the Roundstone Elementary campus for the Roundstone area children and on the Brodhead Elementary campus for those children. We have also been able to serve many four-year-olds who do not meet the "at-risk" criteria duie to the support of our Superintendent and School Board We also provide services to handicapped children, ages three to five, on an itinerant basis in the home, at a preschool center, or in a hospital setting. Rockcastle is also very fortunate to have aPACE program where parents can work on their GED while their three-or-four-year-olds attend a developmental preschool program. ## Fires hurt more than beauty of trees

Fires do more than damage the beauty of the 12 million acres of hardwood umber in Kentucky. The blazes also cause economic damag

that is not immediatcly evident, ac cording to a forestry management
specialist at the University of Kcnspecialis
tucky.
"Afire doessn'kill treesrightaway
so people don't sec the
so people don't see the extent o damage," said Doug McLaren, ex
tension specialist with the UK Col lege of Agriculture. "The real damage is to the quality of the remaining
trees. And this damage has a trementrees. And this damage has a tremen42 million board fect of hardwood sawlogs sold annually
The danger of forest fires is greatst now through mid-December, ccording to McLaren.
"We have all the ingredients fo potential forest firest" "he said. "Dry
leaf litter provides a fuel source and slight to brisk winds help carry the fire. In addition, yard and fieldcleanups often involve burning leaves or field debris."
McLaren said the extent of firc damage is not evident immediately
because trees are still standing and spring buds open to provide another year's growth of leaves.
"What people don't see is the hidden damage," he explained. "A fire moving through a hardwood stand Offecting the lower part of the tree affecting the lower part of the tree
which is the most valuable. The first 16 feet of a tree is the highest quality because it has the fewest defects. except when burned. As the fire surrounds the base of a tee, it raises the internal temperature of the trunk, bium layer.
It usually takes a year or so for the bark to drop off. But by this time
insects and discases have already entered the trunk and begun the process of lowering the potential quality of the trec. Continued fires increaso
the process."
