In Ch. 13, we have the more excellent way, it is the way of Love. Love is essential to being right with God, vs. 1-3. Love is described in vs. 4-8a, it's nota a mushy" type that stands for gifts are temporal and would end, thus the reason why the Corinthians had a wrong attitude about spiritual gifts. in verse 8, we read "Charity never failech but whether there be proppecies, hey shall fail: whecher there be tongues, they shall cease; whether there be knowledge it shall vanish away" Doessn't this sound like the spiritual gifts were going to stop? For vs. 10 points out that "when that which is perfect is come, then that which is in part shall be done away," Jm. $1: 25$ tells us about the
