

#### Babbage discusses election law changes

Changes in laws made by the 1992 General Assembly regarding write-in votes and the use of absentee balin voices and the use of absentee bal-lots potentially affect voters in Rock-castle County, according to Secre-tary of State Bob Babbage. Babbage said a new law directs

Babbage said a new law directs write-in candidates to file a declaration of intent to be a write-in candidate with either the Secretary of State or the County Clerk, depending upon the office, at least 10 days before the

Candidates for municipal office in cities of the fifth or sixth class are exempt from the new law and all write-in votes cast in these races are

The county clerk is to provide recinct election officers with certiprecinct election officers with certi-fied lists of all write-in candidates who have filed the declaration of

Under the new law votes will be provisions for an emergency absentee ballot were made by the last

General Assembly, Babbage ex-plained, primarily for the use of per-sons who are unexpectedly called out of town on election day.

"The General Assembly recognized that in our mobile society, persons are often called out of town on short notice, "Babbage said.

"Existing law required application and completion of absentee ballots seven days before an election. Many persons found that they were given less than seven days notice that their work or personal business would cause them to be absent from their county on election day. The emer-gency absentee ballot gives such voters the ability to still vote and take care of business," Babbage explained.

The absentee ballot is for the use of persons who find within the last seven days prior to an election that they will be unexpectedly absent from the county on election day to apply for and to vote by means of an absentee ballot up to the day before the election.

Voters using the emergency ab-sentee ballot must sign an afridavit stating they had no prior knowledge of a need to be absent. The ballot must be executed in the office of the county clerk during normal business hours.

The law requires the county clerk to submit all emergency absentee ballot affidavits to the grand jury.

Absence ballots can also be used by the disabled, for medical emer-gencies and for other reasons speci-fied by law.

The misuse of an absentee ballot or an emergency absentee ballot is a Class D felony.





on February 22.
Ronald Smith of London was Bowing's first vicini. He died at Doris Jones Chevron Station on Ky. 80, also early in the morning.
At the time of the shooting at Smith's station in Burr, Smith was carrying a gun and fired back at Bowling. He apparently struck Bowling with one shot in the upper body, and Smith was uninjured in the altercation, althoughBowling fired at him several times.
The jury deliberated for 10 hours Wednesday and Thursday of last week in delivering the verdict.

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

I use a fertilizer devel-oped for African Violets by Peters Professional Fertilizer Company. Ifs available at Wa-Mart for around \$2 per container. The NKP rating on this stuff is 12-18-12 and one teaspoon full makes a gallon of spray. One s a gallon of spray. One

container will make at least fifty gallon of spray. Please note that NKP is chemical lings for Nitrogen, Potassium as Phosphorus.




