Babbage explains "Motor-Voter"

Citizens of Rockcaste County will be able to register to vote when they cense, according to Secretary of State Bob Babbage. The federal law requires states to implement the provisions of the
National Voter Regisration Act by January 1, 1995. Babtage said he hoped the expanded registration programs would be in place during 1994. "The increased opportunity for voterregisuraion wild definitely help
remocracy in Kentucky expect about 50,000 more registered voters to be-added each year when motnr-voter is in operation," Babbage said.
Since Babbage took office in 1991 and implemented several programs
to increase voter registration Kentucky has scitworccords for increased registration. Today moreKentuckians are registered to vote than ever be-
The bill, sponsored by Kentucky U.S. Senator Wendell Ford, was May 20 and allows slates to desig. nate voter registration in other offices in addition to the county clerk's office where registration is presenuly

The federallaw makes voter registration possible in the circuit clerk's office where driver's licenses are issued. Statesare required to name all offices which provide public assis.
tance and administer state funded programs that provide services to the disabled as voter registration sites. Each state is to designate other government offices to offer voter registration. The legislation suggests public libraries, schools, city and
countyclerk'soffices, unemployment offices, federal and nongoyernmental offices.
Mail-in voter registration cards, which Kentutky started to use in 1991, are required by the federal law to be available at each registration site.
registration and will accept the completed forms to forward to the proper election official, Babbatge saiu. Since taking office in 1991, Babbage has put several new programs
into place to increase voter registration. In the year between the 1991 and 1992 general elections a record was set for new voter registration In 1993 iregiscred to voic. 2160,192 people were regisiered A general trend in Kentucky has been for voter registration to decline after apresidential election. Between the 1988 presidential elections and the 1989 primary registration fell by $89,229$. This year the wend has been reversed, Babbage said. Between the
1992 presidential election and the May primary registraiton has increased by 83,929 .
Babbage also implemented several other programs including voter registraion at he workplace and, with tions, developed the nation's firstollfree voter registration request line. Noting that in 1991 nearly 900,000 Kentuckians were eligible but unreg. istered, and of the 1.8 million registered only about half those voted was practicing democracy by a third rather than by the majority. "Our goal was to open the do democracy in Kenucky and to invits the citizens to return to their rightfu place in guiding the governmen which serves them. Voung is (he wa) makes it possible." Babbage said.

The second step is to remember that your vote only counts if you use he added.
Babbage also requested in 1991
and was denied the opportunity to put voter registration cards in ǐcntucky tax forms and said he planned to present the idea to the 1994 Gencral Assembly for their action.
"Taxpayers should be inviled to be voters. If they pay they should have a say," Babbage said. Several of the registration programs have received national recognition and now serve as models for increased voter registration in other states.

Kentucky counties
Gov. Brereton Jones today requested approval by Secretary Mike Espy of the U.S. Department of Agriculture for emergency loan as sistance for Kentucky farmers in 30 counties of the slate.
The request came as the result of a severe weather system that struck on age to farm lands, fencing, buildings and equipment estimated to exceed 427 million. The governor said more than 7.700 farm buildings and strucures were affected.
Affected were the following:
Adair, Ballard, Boone, Buter Crittenden, Daviess, Garrard Otayson, Hardin, Hart, Henderson, Jackson, Kenton, LaRue and Laurel Counties. Also included were Lincoln, Livingston, Marion, Mason, McCracken, McLean, Nelson, Ohio, Union, Washington and Waylor, Counties.
"In view of these severe conditions. I strongly encourage you to: approve the request and provide all ${ }^{*}$ ossibledisastr assistanceforwhich he farmers may qualify," Governor Jones' request said.
The low-interest farm loans come through the USDA Farmers Home Administration, which administers the loan program. The Lexingion office of the Farmers Home Administration has also recommended approval of the loan program, based

There are an estimated 9.8 million :

wide who may be delinquent in filing one or more tax returns, according to the IRS. They beliéve 75,000 of these nonfilers live in Kentucky. Dillman said the RIS recognizes that nonfiling is a serious problem and could account for as much as wide for 1992 alone. The IRS in Kentucky has offered several outreach sessions throughout the state since the beginning of this program last October. As a result of these outreach efforts 877 taxpayers have come forward in the last nine owed by taxpayers while the IRS owed refunds to taxpayers of nearly \$200,000,
