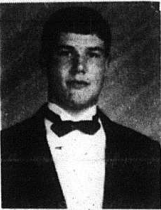
Commencement ceremonies for the twenty-fourth graduating class at Rockcastle County High School will be held Sunday at 2 p.m. in the high school gymnasium.

County budget to exceed \$2.3 million

A \$2,364,017 County budget for 1996-7 had a first reading by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a special meeting May 31.

The new budget compares to last year's budget of \$2,024,165 or about \$349,902 more.

Several changes in the budget for the coming year were noted, causing the increase. The Court last year estimated the real property tax at \$150,000. This year the amount was increased to \$160,000.

Last year's general fund was estimated at \$551,000. This year it is estimated at \$617,000.

Last year's Road Fund was estimated at \$967,950. This year the estimate is \$875,802 or \$92,148 less.

Last year's jail bond was estimated at \$339,000. This year it is estimated at \$333,000.

The local government economic assistance fund was estimated last year at \$86,665. This year it's estimated at \$58,661.

The Economic Development fund is up this year at \$42,875 compared to last year's estimate at \$36,225.

Forestry Fund last year was \$6,400. The estimate this year is \$6,200.

Berea man found dead at Flat Gap

A Berea man, known to family and friends as Odie Crowe, missing since April 28, was found buried in a deserted field in Madison County Tuesday.

Lloyd Dale Holt, 36, was found buried by Madison County authorities off U.S. 25 near Berea. Embury Curry, Madison Co. Coroner, said he was killed by a single bullet wound through his head and neck.

Police have charged Cecil McHone of Berea with murder. Holt was reportedly a "casual" friend of McHone who is known as "Whitley."

Holt, or Crowe, was known in Rockcastle. He was in jail in Mt. Vernon on December 28, 1995, charged with burglary in the first degree. Bond was set at \$25,000 property and Holt posted it on February 1, 1996 and "stayed around Conway," afterwards it was reported.

He was sentenced in Madison Circuit Court of reckless homicide in 1993 and was released from Lee Adjustment Center in Beatyville in December, 1994.

Holt had been reported missing by his mother on April 28. His former wife, Carol, knew something was wrong when Holt didn't call their daughter, Bridgette, 8, to make sure she was all right after the April tornado in Berea.

The Council voted unanimously to approve the first reading of the retirement ordinance. The Council also had a first reading of the city's 1996-97 budget, but produced no figures.

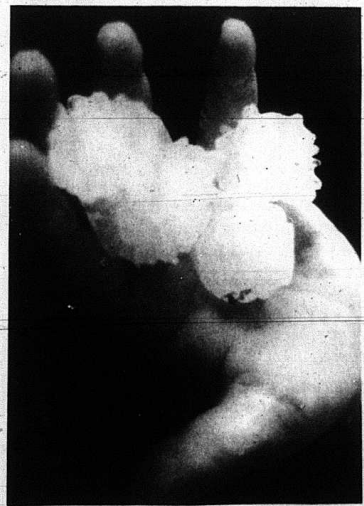
Mayor Cromer told those present the budget is "about the same as last year with few minor changes, some up, some down."

The Council approved unanimously the first reading of the budget ordinance. Mayor Cromer said the budget is based on "projections on this year's revenue." He said "if no major changes are made it will be adopted at the July meeting."

Hail storm hits county

When it rains, it pours, and sometimes it hails.

Such was the case Monday night when golf ball size hail pounded the city of Mt. Vernon possibly damaging cars and roofs.

The hail elsewhere in the county was marble size, not unusual for the area, according to figures at Cox Funeral Home which keeps records.

The golf size hail lasted only about 5 minutes in Mt. Vernon but it was long enough to scare residents. Most people contacted said they couldn't believe it.

On June 2 there was .61 of an inch of rain and .20 on June 3. The high so far in June was 79 on June 1 and the low was 55 degrees on June 4.

And now May — 7.16 inches of rain fell during the month. The most, 2.43 inches on May 27.

On May 5 at 4:00 p.m. a funnel cloud was sighted northwest of town (Renfro Valley). It didn't touch ground.

The high temperature for May was 87 on May 19. The low was 33 on May 14 with frost.

Due to the number of cars damaged by the hail storm Monday night, Farm Bureau Insurance customers can bring their vehicles to the Farm Bureau office Thursday beginning at 8 a.m. for a hail clinic. Call for more information.

Word has it that the fundamentalists will arrive en masse by male train the night before. And I'm told a horde of Flat Earth Society adherents will also put in an appearance.

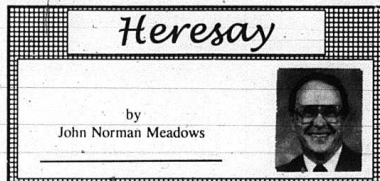



TAKING A STAND FOR CHILDREN

Author James Agee once wrote that "in every child who is born, under no matter what circumstances, and of no matter what parents, the potentiality of the human race is born again."

Yet, every day in this country we see that potential squandered. Consider that each day, 15 children are killed by gunfire; 2,660 babies are born into poverty; 2833 students drop out of school, 352 children are arrested for violent crime; 100,000 children are homeless; and 8,493 children are reported abused or neglected.

Each day, America fails to stand up for thousands of her children.

Clearly, all of us can do better. That's why individuals and organizations from across the country will come to Washington, D.C. on June 1st for a national day of commitment to children.

On National Stand for Children Day, Americans from every race, region, income, age, and faith will put their differences aside and affirm what unites us... "a desire to raise moral, healthy, and educated children, and a belief that in the richest and most powerful nation on earth, no child should be left behind."

More than 3,000 national, state and local organizations are sponsoring this completely nonpartisan event. So instead of the usual political speeches, ordinary Americans from all walks of life will speak to the needs of children and equally important, to the triumphs of children.

Organizers of the march hope to show people that providing for our children is a community effort. Whether it's one-on-one mentoring or passing laws that keep children's interests in mind, each one of us needs to become an advocate for our children.

The head of the Children's Defense Fund, Marian Wright Edelman put it this way: "When your children are grown and they ask, 'What did you do to build a better future?' 'What will you tell them?'"

There is no better time than now to take a public stand on behalf of children. That's because this year marks the last national election in the 20th century. Decisions we make today will not only shape our nation's future but define who we are as a nation. The priorities we lay out today will either be the barriers or the open doors our children will face tomorrow.

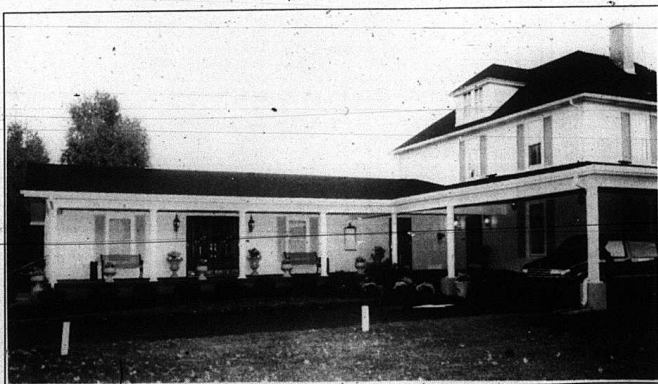
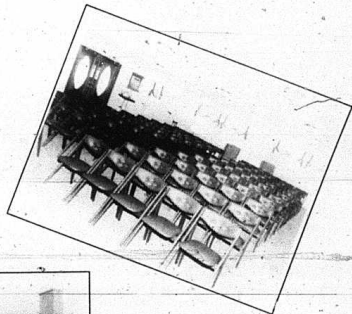
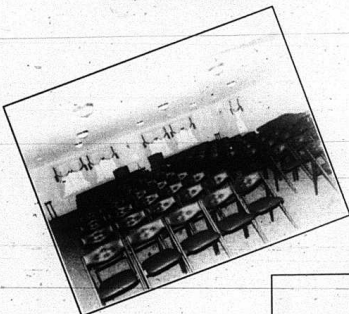

Educational cooperative at EKU addresses local needs

Working alone, the Rockcastle County School District would be hard-pressed to offer its teachers all the professional development programs they need, especially given the rapid pace of school reform in Kentucky.

The District would also find it difficult to efficiently purchase various types of school supplies, equipment and services.

Thanks, however, to the District's membership in the SouthEast/South-Central Educational Cooperative headquartered at Eastern Kentucky University, its teachers and administrators can choose this summer from among 50 different workshops at various sites around the area, and the school system can save precious tax dollars by buying in greater bulk.

Eighteen Kentucky school districts participate in the regional Cooperative, which uses University facilities and resources to provide not only innovative professional development activities for teachers and administrators but also an expanded array of cost-effective bidding and purchasing services. The 18 participating superintendents comprise the Cooperative's Board of Directors, along with an EKU representative.

The Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA) identified professional development as a primary need in improving the commonwealth's public schools. And KERA is the engine behind the Cooperative's professional development activities, the teachers and administrators are the drivers.

"Our schedule is driven by needs assessment surveys," said Dr. Billy Thames, Cooperative director and director of field services and professional development for EKU's College of Education. "We're trying to respond to individual school's needs

as they focus on the elements of school reform."

The presenters at the 70-plus workshops this summer are EKU faculty and teachers from schools throughout the region. Some of the workshop topics are: Computers in the Classroom, Assessment, Team Building, Classroom Management, Use of Community Resources, Making Real Connections with Parents, Grant Writing, Tech-Prep, Applied Biology/Chemistry, Developing Policies to Handle Crisis Situation in Schools, Effective School Management, Principle-Centered Leadership, and Curriculum Integration.

In addition to the summer workshops, the Cooperative will sponsor a Principals' Academy Summer Retreat in Lexington.

The bidding and purchasing services offered through the Cooperative were expanded this year to include fleet and property insurance, and the savings were remarkable—an average of about \$14,000 for each of the 10 participating districts. Other bidding/purchasing areas are: student accident insurance, fleet fuel, bus repair/parts, lunchroom supplies, copier maintenance/repair, library books, computer maintenance/repair, drug/alcohol testing, custodial/maintenance supplies, duplicating/copier paper, athletic supplies and instructional office supplies.

On average, the 18 Cooperative member districts are saving 20-25 percent annually, according to Bill Alexander, bid administrator.

The Cooperative is just one of many KERA-related activities coordinated by EKU's College of Education, which prepares more classroom teachers and school administrators than any other institution in the commonwealth.

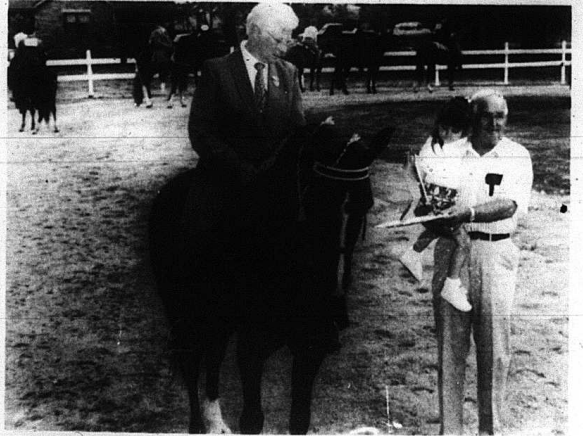

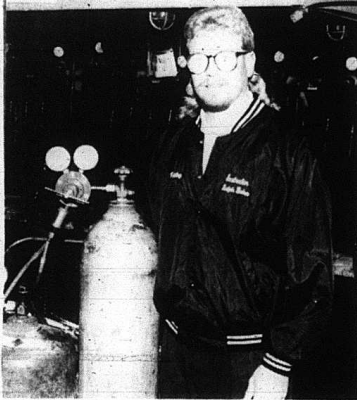
The entry process included nomination at the local level by a VICA member, documentation of local, state, national, and international involvement in VICA and endorsement by students and school administration.



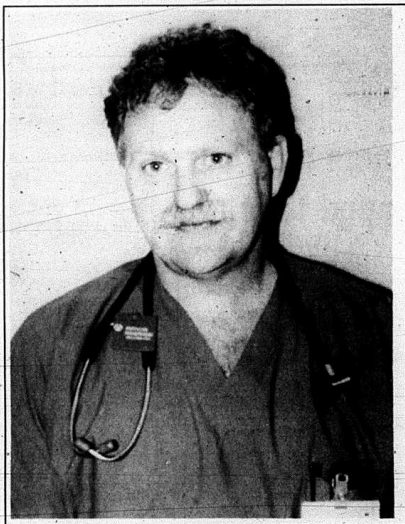

Stress testing is a very important step in evaluating cardiac function. The patient has lead wires hooked to electrodes placed at various spots on the chest. He/she will then be asked to walk on a treadmill while the technician and physician carefully monitor the function of the heart during the "stress" of walking.

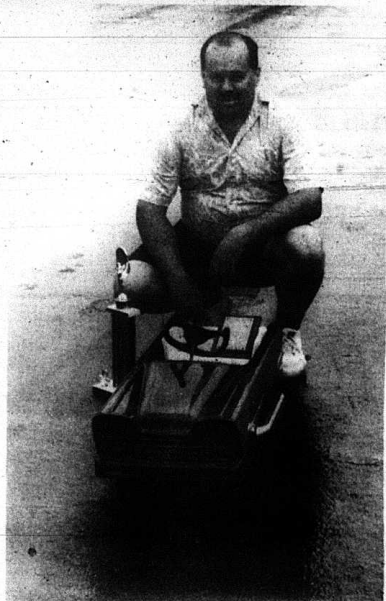

How to Avoid Foodborne Illness

Warmer weather during spring and summer months is the perfect condition for the growth of foodborne toxins and bacteria. Symptoms of some foodborne illnesses are similar to the symptoms of the flu. Here are some tips to help guard your family against foodborne illness this summer.

Buying. Don't buy any food in a container that is outdated, broken, bent, leaky or bulging. Many foods now carry freshness dates. Check these dates and purchase the freshest product for good quality and safety.

Avoid dent cans, especially if the seams are dented. Report broken, leaky or bulging cans to the store manager so that the product can be taken off the shelf.

When buying prepared foods, such as in a delicatessen or cafeteria, select carefully. Avoid "problem" foods if they appear to be "improperly" held. Hot foods

should be held above 140 degrees F and cold foods below 40 degrees F. Food may not be safe to eat if held for more than two hours at temperatures between 60 and 125 degrees F -- the zone where bacteria grow rapidly.

Buy eggs from refrigerated cases. Avoid cracked or dirty eggs as they may be contaminated with Salmonella. Also avoid milk that is not pasteurized.

Home Gardening. Animal and human wastes harbor illness-causing bacteria. Untreated animal wastes used as fertilizer on gardens are hazardous. Likewise, overflow from septic systems can contaminate home-grown produce.

Storing and Holding. Store perishable foods in the refrigerator, or in the freezer for longer storage. When food is cooked the day before or early in the day it is to be eaten, cool it rapidly and place it in the refrigerator so that the food reaches 40 degrees F within 2

hours. When ready to use, reheat the foods thoroughly so that the internal temperature reaches 165 degrees F or higher for at least 15 minutes. Bring broths and gravies to a rolling boil for several minutes.

Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator, not out on the counter at room temperature.

Preparation. To prevent contamination of food with harmful bacteria during preparation, follow these sanitation rules: * Use hot soapy water to clean cutting board, knives and equipment after they have been used to prepare raw foods. * Always work with clean hands, washing them with soap after going to the toilet. * Don't use cooking utensils to taste food

while cooking or serving. Don't lick your fingers or eat while preparing food. * Keep hands away from mouth, nose and hair. Cover your coughs and sneezes with tissue. * Keep pets away from food, utensils and work surfaces. They are carriers of harmful bacteria.

Cooking. Inadequately cooked meat, poultry and eggs can harbor illness-causing bacteria. Do not eat any raw foods of animal or marine origin. People who already have an underlying health problem are at much greater risk from raw food consumption. This includes milk, meat, eggs, fish and seafood. Lower plant populations are answer to tobacco transplant shortages

Tobacco producers facing transplant shortages in 1996 should consider lower plant populations as a way to stretch limited transplant supplies and increase net returns in the bargain. Using 6500 plants per acre instead of 8-9000 will allow more acres to be transplanted with the same number of transplants.

Ten years of university research and several years of farmer experience have also shown that lower populations will reduce production costs dramatically... as much as twelve cents per pound.

Wider spaced plants yield more per plant, offsetting almost all of the yield reduction associated with fewer plants. Research results suggest that a 25% reduction in plant population will result in less than a 10% decline in yield per acre. Farmers who have moved to wider plant spacings report that the yield reduction is hardly noticeable. This is probably due to the fact that yields vary more than 10% from year to year or even from field to field within the same year.

The economic benefits result from producing the same amount of quota using fewer plants. This results in cost savings in plant

production costs, barn costs, and most important, labor. The following table illustrates where and how costs are reduced with lower plant populations.

| 10,000 LB. OF QUOTA | | |

| Plant Spacing | 16x40 | 24x40 |
| plants per acre | 9801 | 6534 |
| yield per acre | 2580 lb | 2481 lb |
| yield per plant | 0.26 lb | 0.38 lb |
| land requirement | 3.88 ac | 4.03 ac |
| labor requirement | 912 hr | 697 hr |
| total no. plants | 38200 | 26300 |
| barn lbs required | 424 | 292 |

In this example, nearly 12,000 fewer plants can be used to produce the same quota on 0.15 ac more land. Labor requirements are reduced by more than 200 hours, or about 50 hours per acre. Barn space, which may be limited if we produce our quota increase and carryover quota, is also lowered... by more than 125 rails.

There may also be some disease management advantages to opening up the plant spacings and allowing better air circulation through the crop.

Our current plant shortages may be an excellent opportunity to capture the proven benefits of lower plant populations for burley tobacco.

Inspection Period For the Property Tax Assessment Roll
The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from 8:30 A.M. through 4:30 P.M. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll. This is the January 1, 1996 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1996 will be due about September 15, 1996. The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period. Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals. The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property. The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period. Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals. Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 133.110. The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator. (1) He must list under protest (or certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property. (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Taxation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment. (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 133.110.
