#### Berea man found dead at Flat Gap

A Berea man, known to family and friends as Odie Crowe, missing since April 28, was found buried in a deserted field in Madison County Tuesday.

Lloyd Dale Holt, 36, was found buried by Madison County authorities off U.S. 25 near Berea. Emblry Curry, Madison Co. Coroner, said he was killed by a single bullet wound through his head and neck.

Police have charged Cecil McHone of Berea with murder. Holt was reportedly a "casual" friend of McHone who is known as "Whitey." Holt, or Crowe, was known in Rockeastle. He was in jail in Mt. #### TAKING A STAND FOR CHILDREN

Author James Agee once wrote that "in every child who is born, under no matter what circumstances, and of no matter what parents, the potentiality of the human race is born again."

of no matter what parents, the potentiality of the human race is born again."

Yet, every day in this country we see that potential squandered. Consider that each day. 15 children are killed by gunfire: 2,660 bables are born into poverty; 2:833 students drop out of school, 352 children are rested for violent crime: 100,000 children are homeless, and 8,493 children are reported abused or neglected. Each day. America fails to stand up for thousands of her children.

There are EEG (electroencephalograph) services for all ages. These tests allow a physicians to detect any abnormalities in the brain waves. These tests are transmitted to Lexington where they are read by a neurologist.

Pulmonary Function testing is also available. This type of test helps determine if lung function is impaired and to what degree. Another use of these tests is to determine eligibility for Black Lung Benefits. You can also see the amount of improvement achieved after using a bronchodilator.

Stress testing is a very important step in evaluating cardiac function. The patient has lead wires hooked to electrodes placed at various spots on the chest. He/she will then be asked to walk on a treadmill while the technician and physician carefully monitor the function of the heart during the "stress" of walking



Buying. Don't buy any food in a container that is outdated, broken, bent, leaky or bulging. Many foods now carry freshness dates. Cheek these dates and purchase the freshest product for good quality and safety.

Avoid dented cans, especially if the seams are dented. Report broken, leaky or bulging cans to the store manager so that the product can be taken off the shelf.

When buying prepared foods, such as in a delicatessen or cafeteria, select carefully. Avoid problem' foods if they appear to be improperty held. Hot foods

Preparation. To prevent contamination of food with harmful bacteria during preparation, follow these sanitation rules: \* Use to soapy water to clean cutting board, knives and equipment after they have been used to prepare raw foods. \* Always work with clean hands, washing them with soap after going to the toilet. \* Don't use cooking utensils to taste food

while cooking or serving. Don't lick your fingers or eat while preparing food. \*Keep hands away from mouth, nose and hair. Cover your coughs. \*Keep hands with tissue. \*Keep pers away with tissue. \*Keep pers away work of the cooking. They are carriers of harmful bacteria. \*Cooking. Inadequately cooked meats poulty and eggs can harmful hacteria. Do not eat any raw foods of animal or marine origin. Lower plant populations are answer to tobacco transplant shortages

Tobacco producers facing transplant shortages in 1996 should consider lower plant populations as a way to stretch limited transplant supplies and increase net return in the bargain. Using 6500 plants per acre instead of 8-9000 will allow more acres to be transplanted with earnen unther of transplants.

Ten years of university research and several years of farmer experience have also shown that lower populations will reduce production costs dramatically ... as much as twelve cents per pound.

tower populations will reduce production costs dramatically....as much as twelve cents per pound. Wider spaced plants yield more per plant, offsetting almost all of the yield reduction associated with fewer plants. Research results suggest that a 25% reduction in plant population will result in less than a 10% decline in yield per acre. Farmers who have moved to wider plant spacings report that the yield reduction is hardly noticeable. This is probably due to the fact that yields vary more than 10% from year to year or even from field to field within the same year. The economic benefits result from producing the same amount of quota using fewer plants. This results in coxt savings in plant

production costs, barn costs, and most important, labor. The following table illustrates where and how costs are reduced with lower plant populations.

16x40 24x40 9801 · 6534 2580 lb 2481 lb 0.26 lb 0.38 lb

In this example, nearly 12,000 fewer plants can be used to produce the same quota on 0.15 a more land. Labor requirements are reduced by more than 20 hours per acre. Barn space, which may be limited if we produce our quota increase and carryover quota, is also lowered... by more than 125 rails.
