## Counties may get three years to pay off KACo deficit

According to a recent story in the Lexington Herald-Leader, Kentucky Insurance Commissioner George Nichols III said counties might be given more time to pay off the deficit of the Kentucky Association of Counties All Lines Fund.

"We're trying to look at the impact of the deficit on the counties. We don't want to put the counties in a bad situation, Nichols said last Wednesday. "We might be able to give them some time to pay.

"We are holding the program responsible for climinating this deficit... But part of the process going on wis to see how we can protect counties from suffering too much pain."

pain."

A total of 112 counties bought liability coverage last year through the fund. But more than two dozen counties dropped out of the program after Nichols declared it to have a \$9.4 million deficit.

Department of Insurance examiners concluded that new premiums had been used to cover previous-vear

had been used to cover previous-year claims for at least three years. Nichols said July 17 that a special assessment fee charged to the program's mem-bers would be necessary to erase the

That would be in addition to rate increases of 10 percent to 70 percent that were already imposed for the fiscal year that began July 1. Gov. Paul Patton said Monday he

wants to give local governments three years to erase the deficit in their comned insurance fund, but he offered

ouned insurance fund, but he offered a warning to counties unwilling to pay the assessments.

Patton said that counties must understand they are repossible for paying the assessments imposed by the State Insurance Department to tate Insurance Department to the deficit in the Kentucky All

The fund, operated by the Ken-

tucky Association of Counties in-sures most counties and hundreds of local governments and agencies. Some counties no longer in the fund question whether they obligated to po-oligated to pay. Rockcastle County has bought insurance from KACo since the late 1970's and renewed their contracts with them last month for the fiscal year 1996-97.

Carloftis said this week he doesn't
know how much Rockcastle will be
obligated to pay, but Gov. Patton
made it very clear on Monday hat

I expect counties to pay their fair share, and any county that thinks it doesn't have to pay is going to find state government awfully hard to deal with, "Patton said in a public meeting in Livingston County.
Patton also told the crowd in western Kentucky that KACO would be able to use \$5 million from another roorgarm to soften the impact of

other program to soften the impact of the \$9.4 million deficit.

Nichols also said Monday that he is also willing to give individual counties two to three years to cover their part of the deficit, depending on their circumstances. But he said they must have "a legitimate plan" and the insurance fund must remain stable.

The program has until Aug. 15 to present its plan to Nichols to eliminate the deficit.

But, Nicholas said he is examining whether such a transfer can be made from one KAGO fund to another and that, "everybody is going to have to understand that if claims were to come in quickly," Nichols said, "the time frame may set itself."
Nichols was referring to the time counties will have to pay off the deficit.

# Legislative Update

While Kentucky's growth in ployment and personal income has employment and personal income has outpaced the nation over the past seven years, state financial officials advise that lawmakers use caution in dealing with the economy, an ap proach I have endorsed throughou my years of service as your legisla-

In the July 25 meeting of, the Appropriations and Revenue Committee, the Governor and Finance and Administration Cabinet Officials reassured lawmakers that Kentucky is in good financial state, and even has peveral million dollars in unbudgeted funds. Two officials, however, said that although the outdook is favorable, there are some factors that could cause Kentucky's economy to slow down.

Analysts with The Standard & Poor Creditweek Municipal reviewed

Poor Creditweek Municipal reviewed Kentucky's financial and economic data and published its findings on July 15. The report basically applauds July 15. The report basically applauds our efforts in managing the state's finances and balancing the budget. Since this has been made a priority, our fiscal year-end positions have steadily improved. The report attributes the state's steady growth to an /coconomy that has become more diversified and less dependent upon certain industries, such as coal and heavy manufacturing.

avy manufacturing. State finance officials told com-

mittee members that while there has been a decline in receipts of coal severance and corporate income taxes, the road fund enjoyed good growth from 1995 to 1996. There was a 4.4 percent increase, or 539.3 million. Regarding the coal market, no further decline is foreseen. Legislators also learned that there is enough money to fund several projects. At the close of this fiscal year, there is money in our budget for 27 projects initially approved during the regular session. These projects total \$103.4 million.

Currently there is \$64 million in unbudgeted funds, and plans for the surplus will be discussed during the surplus will be discussed during the

surplus will be discussed during the upcoming months. There is specula-

tion that the money could be appro priated if the Governor calls a special session on the budget. However, this money is likely to be used to cover s of revenue in the General run loss of revenue in the General Fund over the next three years. The General Assembly passed legislation that exempts state income tax on pensions, and raises the standard deduction on state income tax.



Back-To-School: Keep spending and sanity in check

If it weren't so hot outside, you might mistake it for Christmas. It's the annual late-summer, back-to-school shopping rush. Weeks, sometime months, in advance, stores herald the first symbol of the impending fall: the start of school. As if once, school-age youth and parents packing checkbooks crowd the aisles of stores and mails.

Many parents and children face the prospect with dread, but some

the prospect with dread, but some preparation can help ease the strain on the wallet and on the parent-child ionship.

Before you even get in the car, develop a game plan, cautions Maria Thompson Okorley, assistant profes-sor of apparel and textiles in the University of Kentucky College of Human Environmental Sciences. That plan should start with a look at influences on your children's cloth-ing styles—magazines, TV shows and movies.

ing styles—magazines, I v Snowand movies.

"I want my children to tell me or show me what they want before we ever go shopping," said Okorley, a mother of two children. Getting to know what your children like means even when they aren't shopping with you, you might be able to find something to match their style.

Some other tips:
"Establish a clothing budget for each child. Okorley estimates that 75-90 percent of the back-to-school wardrobe should be basics, with 10-25 percent fun things, such as vests or accessories.

\*To reduce potential conflicts, be sure to take children some place you

sure to take children some place you can afford to shop.

\*Don't forget about consignment stores for children's clothing bargains. Keep in mind that your child probably is still growing, so prepare for more clothes-buying in a few short

Uniforms—a parent's dream and a teenager's nightmare—are becoming the rule at some school's particu-

larly in the Northeast, Okorley said, as schools try to erase barriers among children. "It takes that status element away from the school environment and helps eliminate teasing," Okor-

lev said. ley said.

Back to-school shopping can have a positive effect. It's a good time to involve children in the workings of the family budget, suggests Kim Townley, UK associate professor of family studies. By adolescope, children should learn about the family studies. budget and how their clothing t

### Judge considering street paving ordinance

#### PLAYING OUR CARDS RIGHT

Kentucky's Henry Clay was known for his great oratory and leg-islative skills, but apparently he was a bit of a card shark as well. According to one story, a prim aristocratic woman once asked Henry Clay's wife, "Bn' it a pity your husband gambles so much?" Lucretta Clay replied, "Oh, I don't know. He usually wins." Unfortunately the same can't be said for Congress' card playing on the budget lately; government shutdowns, state and local officials unable to make long-term plans, wasteful spending, and repetitive votes. With a hand like that I'm sure many Kentuckians wish Con-cress would inst "fold!" on

unable to make long-term plans, wateful spending, and repetitive votes. With a hand like that I'm sure many Kentuckians wish Congress would just "fold'em."

It's true that when'it comes to making the hard decisions on deficit reduction, Congress and the country have to play with the hand they've been dealt. But we can change our strategy.

Thelieve that new strategy should be a two-year budget. I've been an advocate of the two-year budget since 1981 and just recently. I went before a Senate Governmental Affairs Subcommittee to promote the change in budget tactics.

Switching to a two-year budget cycle won't make the hard decisions necessary for read deficit reduction. But it will serve as a muchaneeded management tool for work on the federal budget and deficit reduction, With last year's government shutdown and repeated missed deadlines, it's an idea whose time has clearly come.

Under a two-year budget, one session of Congress would be reserved specifically for oversight and authorizations, providing Congress with the time to enact responsible spending proposals before the adoption of a budget resolution and appropriations bill.

This budget scenario would not only save time by cutting down on the number of repetitive votes, but also save money by allowing recipients of federal funds. I from government agencies to state and local governments to private organizations — to better plan and manage their funds.

A two-year budget also provides Congress with an opportunity to review spending decisions and to allow the executive branch to con-

age their funds.

A two-year budget also provides Congress with an opportunity to review spending decisions and to allow the executive branch to conduct compliance reviews.

Too often we hear that once a Federal program is created, it will be funded into eternity. The two-year budget provides Congress with the time to review existing programs and determine whether they should be modified, expanded or replaced.

That kind of oversight can help prevent another Savings and Loar crisis, can target instances of waste and abuse, and in the end, save tax dollars.

Perhaps most important, the two-year budget is a period dies. When

Perhaps most important, the two-year budget is a tested idea. When I went before the very first joint hearings on budget reform in 1981, the two-year budget was new notion here in Washington. But it was already standard practice in 22 states, including Keniucky.

When I was governor, two-year budgeting helped us to lay out a master plan for the entire state. And that master plan enabled agencies, local governments and constituency groups to do long-term planning. That planning led to greater efficiency, overall cost savings and equally important, peace of mind about future funding.

So while a two-year budget won't give us a new financial hand to play with, it could be just the new strategy Congress needs to play-those cards right.



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
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

### Party platforms making comebacks in campaigns

Penny Miller noticed a change in American politics after November 8, 1994. Republicans were celebrating victories, and Democrats were sur-veying the wreckage of massive losses that cost them their 40-year congres-sional majority. "The Democrats didn't think the Republican's 'Contract with Amer-

"The Democrats didn't think the Republican's 'Contract with Amer-ica' was going to work. It turned out to be really successful in winning that Congress for the Republicans," said Miller, a political science pro-fessor at the University of Kentucky.

The Contract with America amounted to a political platform for congressional candidates, a new wrinkle in U.S. politics. This year, Millersaid, congressional Democrats

have already released "Families First," their version of the GOP's "Contract," signing a new emphasis on political platforms. In fact, media pundits have been focusing on the platforms of the na-

tional Republican and Democratic

parties since, early summer, particu-larly on efforts by GOP moderates to soften wording of their party's long-held stance opposing legal abortion. Some media critics say the atten-tion results from a need by political reporters to find interesting news in a political campaign where both major parties nominees have long been

decided.

But Miller said the parties' platform debates have attained an importance beyond providing drama for
the television cameras. "There's a
real difference this time between the
parties. The platforms are a blueprint
for what the parties stand for," she
said.

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




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

ticians introduced the first platform at the Democratic Party's 1840 convention. Actually, he said, political conventions themselves were fairly young when platforms were created. "The first national political convention was held in 1831, when the Anti-Masons met in a saloon in Baltimore," Gross said.

The next year, a presidential election year, the Jacksonian Democrats convened their own national gathering in Baltimore, he said.

The conventions developed in the wake of concern by politicians that

wake of concern by politicians that the selection of presidential candi-dates had been controlled by a wealthy

and powerful elite. National conven-tions provided a means to increase participation in nominating the can-didates, Gross said.

"Adding the platform was very much designed to facilitate the elec-tion of their candidate," Gross said. The platform originally spelled out the issues that the party—and the candidate—felt was the proper focus for the government.

candidate—felt was the proper focus for the government.

But over the years, the platform took on an added dimension by providing a means to unite all pary factions behind the nominee.

"The tradition has been for the winning candidate to be-gracious to his rivals; Let them speak at the convention, and give them some say in writing a platform, as long as it

doesn't hurt or embarrass the nominee," Gross said.

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# Sometimes, though, the tradition has been violated — with disastrous effects. "An example of what you don't do is 1980, when Sen. Edward Kennedy challenged President Carter for the Democratic nomination. Carter's people refused to give any-thing to Kennedy in the platform committee. It led to a very nasty floor

The Democrats and Republicans now hire highly paid consultants and organize "focus groups" — panels of Americans from different ethic backgrounds and income levels — to identify issues that attract voter sup-





The study looked only at the phenomenon — not its causes. It also is limited in that it doesn't attempt to determine if people with those character traits choose sports, or if sports encourages the development of such traits, the researchers said.

"We observed certain interesting correlations, but as for causality, we can't say," Weiner said. "We can't conclude that athletics maculinizes females any more than we can say that more maculine females choose athletics."

The results have provoked the researchers' interest in further study of the issue, and they are considering expanding their research to a national sample.


