Disabled Children's Program available

By Brenda Smith Lawson If you have a Disabled Child you probably feel helpless at times, this article is about a program to help

prototoy tech neppess at unics, unis article is about a program to help your child. There is a federally funded pro-gram operated by the Commission (or Childron wild Special Health Care Negara (DCP). This program pro-vides cane coordination and a variety of services for infans, toddlers and preschool children who meet certain of services for infans, toddlers and preschool children who meet certain critera. The programs purpose is to provide support to improve the child's ability to benefit from subsequent education or training or otherwise solf-sufficiency or self-support as an adult.

adult. Eligibility is based on the deter-mination of eligibility for Social Security Insurance (SSI) and the child must be between ages birth through, six and not have entered Kindergar-ten. Most children exit the program at age

age 5. Services are delivered through the Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Centers. A Case Manager is assigned to each child and is responassigned to each child and is respon-sible for contacting the child's family or guardian and meeting with the family to determine their concerns and to assist with determining the child's needs. The Case Manager is child's needs. The Case Manager is also responsible for writing an Indi-vidual Service Plan (ISP) for each child which is submitted to the DCP coordinator for approval. After the ISP is approved, a child can begin to receive services for his or her development needs. Available services include adaptive equipment,

developmental day care, early inter-vention, educational toys, infant stimulation, medical devices, medi-quien, occupational therapy, ortho-podie shoes, parent training, physical therapy, physicalian services, resplic care, speech therapy and transporta-tion. DCP funding is contingent upon federal grant moties. Referrals on newly appointed SSI recipients are sent directly to the DCP coordinator's federa a hid whom they belave awing ender a hid whom they belave awing the analytic of the top the made heraling the office of the state coordinator at (SO2)S88-3264 or by calling the Iocal Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center and ask for the DCP contact person.
