

If second vote is successful, tax will become law Court to decide fate of 911, insurance tax

By: Richard Anderkin On Thursday the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will vote on whether or not the 911 emergency dispatching program will be implented in the county.

If the court passes the first read-If the court passes the first read-ing of an ordiance concerning 911 is questionable at best. Rockcastle County Judge-Execu-tive Buzz Carloftis, who has not sup-ported 911 in the past, said last week that he was in favor of the ordiance

and hoped the court would pass it. "I think there are enough votes to pass the ordinance," he said.

Think there are enough votes to pass the ordinance," he said. The court will hear the first read-ing of the ordinance at 10 a.m. Thurs-day during a special called meeting. If the ordinance passes residents with phones will see an estimated bill. 
