The Rockcastle County Incentive Scholarship Trust (R.I.S.T.) Planning Committee hosted their First Annual Fund-raising Banquet at the Red Barn in Renfro Valley on April 22, 1997. The banquet proved to be very successful as the 48 people in attendance thoroughly enjoyed the evening.

The dinner meal served by the Renfro Lodge was delicious, and after dinner everyone enjoyed the entertainment provided by Mr. Loyal Jones, a well-known humorist and author from Berea, KY. Mr . Jones was able to help everyone realize the value of education by sharing some humor and stories about educators, students and "school life". He also stressed to the group the value of the whole community being involved in helping our students realize their potential in gaining an education. He said, "Some of the very brightest young people I have ever worked with are from Rockcastle County and Eastern Kentucky".

Mr. Sam Ford, local realtor, auctioned several donated items to the people in attendance. The donated time and the wonderful items given to this effort were certainly appreciated.
R.I.S.T. is a scholarship fund which will "pay for points" that students in grades 6-12 earn while in school. For example, this fall students in grades 6-12 will keep track of such things as their good grades, good attendance and electing to take higher level courses. Parents will be able to add to their children's points by attending workshops given to assist students and parents preparing for college. Students will "cash in" their points for money in May of their senior year provided they have been accepted into a two or four year college program or technical school.

The establishment of R.I.S.T. has been a joint effort of Berea College and the Rockcastle County School System. The college obtained funds through a grant from the Jesse Ball Dupont Foundation to support a community in raising their educational aspirations. As a result, the college joined with the school district in a three year partnership to help our students become more aware of postsecondary education.

In order to continue impacting the lives of students after the three-year formal relationship with Berea College has ended, Project R.I.S.T. has been established. This scholarship program will be maintained and controlled by a Board of Trustees and will totally belong to the community of Rockcastle County.

Development of insecticideresistant hom flies is a selection process similar to that used to
improve a cattle herd. Continuous use of a particular active ingredient can kill susceptible flies. Survivors produce offspring that are harder to
kill, meaning a control failure kill, meaning a control failure. The active ingredient that once
gave good is no longer effective.
Resistance had developed at several locat tags impregnated with
catte ear synthetic pyrethroid insecticides were used for several consecutive years. So far, no resistance
problem has been seen with organophosphate insecticides. These two insecticide classes attack the nervous system of the hom fly differently so rotation keeps from Here are some tips for using insecticide-impregnated ear tags: 1) Rotate synthetic pyrcthroids with organophosphates. Avoid contin-
ued use of a particular class of insecticide year after year. 2) Wait to tag. Begin treatment
per animal. This may not occur
until carly to mid-June. Treating too early, especially with ear tags may mean poor control in late abundant and can lead to resistance. 3) Change application methods regularly. Use dust bags, backrubbers or sprays instead of relying
continuously on ear tags. continuously on ear tags

Annually, on the 30th day of July, said fee shall be adjusted by the percentage increase or decrease in the previous year's Consumer Price Index (C.P.I.) published by the United States Govemment and approved by the 911 Board of Directors. Any and all increases/decreases approved by the 911 Boaro of Directors must be approved by the governing body of the County of Rockcastle prior to said fee's individual exchange basis, commencing on the day of 1997 , and each month thereater unloss modified by subsequent ordinance of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court. All WATS, public pay station lines, foreign exchange lines, incoming-only lines, or nom-originating lines shall be exempt from each fee The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court shall contract with any or all providers of local telephone service In Rockcastle County. Kentucky to collect the 911 Emergency Telephone Sevice fee from the telephone subscriber and remit said fee to the Rockcastle County 911 Board to be used in accordance with Kentucky Revised Statute 65.760 .

The terms of all other Board members shall not exceed two consective years. The By-Laws shall determin The Boad shall meet at least quarterly, or when so directed by the Chair than three (3) members deliver written notice to the Chair requesting a meeting. Special meetings may be called by the Chair or the Secretary upon 48 hours' writen or oral notice delivered to each member. The Board shall be a body corporate for all purposes and may contract and be contracted with, may enter into agreements to receive information from other law enforcement agencies. may purchase equipment and supplies in compliance with the Kentucky Procurement Code. KRS Chapter 45A. IEAS amendatory thereto or supplementary thereof, and, generally, do all things necessary and proper to provide for a proficient and efficient dispatehing service for all emergency senvices within Rockcastlic County, Kentucky. The Board may prosecute and defend suits, may retain and pay attorneys for the
