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

REPLACEMENT FOR THE CURRENT IRS TAX CODE

Small-business owners across the country are fired up about a new campaign by the National Federation of Independent Business to abolish the IRS Code. But beyond sunsetting the code, many are thinking what the replacement tax code should look like. It is important to become familiar with the various proposals so you cari voice your concerns and preferences during the national debate. Basically, all tax proposals fall into one of two categories income-based tax systems and consumption-based system. The current system is an income-based one. A consumption-based system taxes people on what they purchase, not what they earn.

based system takes pro-they earn. While many of the tax reform proposals vary by tax rate and exemptions, they all fall into one of these categories:

Flat Tax: The flat tax would wipe away the five tiers of the current code, taxing all income at a single rate. Flat tax backers tout its simplicity, which dramatically reduces compliance costs.

The various flat tax proposals differ primarily in the num ber of deductions allowed and the rate assessed. Many deduc

ber of deductions allowed and the rate assessed. Many deduc-tions are populate, but all add to the system's complexity. While some proposals are for a "pure" flat tax with no deductions, others continue certain exemptions, such as the home mortgage and charitable deductions. House Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Tex, and Sen, Richard Sheby, R-Ala, have introduced a plan that would tax all income at 17 percent with no deductions. Under this plan, a family of four would be able to exempt the first \$36,800 from taxes alto-sether.

Income Tax Simplification: Some of the tax reform pro-Income tax simplification: some of the tax retorm pro-posals don't abolish the current tax system but propose differ-ent rates and changes in the exemptions and deductions. House Minority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., and Sen. Pete Domenici, R-NM. have separate proposals that support elimi-nating most deductions and loopholes, but keeping multiple taxts for different incomes. The top rate would be 34 per-

National Retail Sales Tax: The retail sales tax is a con-sumption tax on all goods or services upon delivery or sale. Under such a system, retail establishments become the nation's tax collectors. In theory, a sales tax would be simple to ad-minister. But most proposals allow for limited exemptions (for prescription drugs or food) or credits against the tax. Legislation introduced by Reps. Dan Schaeffer, R.-Colo. and Billy Tauzin, R-La., would exempt purchases of sales and services that have a business purpose, such as manufacturing parts or wholesale merchandise to be resold.

Our tax system will not change overnight. Achieving fun Our tax system will not change overnight. Achieving fun-damental reform in this century is a monumental task. Most small-business owners agree that the current tax system should be replaced. But it will be up to them to consider the alterna-tives and speak out against our current burdensome code and grandchildren.





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CARBON MONOXIDE-THE UNFORESEEN DANGER

Quard and protect you from harm. Your eyes and ears detect approaching objects. Your sense of touch tells you if something is too hot. Your sense of smell alarms you if something is burning. But what if the danger is colorless, odorless and tasteless? What if the danger is carbon monoxide!

Carbon monoxide is an unforeseen danger that lingers in the air, but there is nothing your body can do to detect it. Each year, thousands of people are injured and hundreds die from carbon monoxide poisoning

Carbon monoxide poisoning causes symptoms such as headaches, fatigue, nausea, dizziness, rapid heartbeat, loss of consciousness, and vomiting.

"Symptoms may be mild and mistaken for other illnesses," said Dr. Tony Arvin of Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center. "The key Isto notice if other members of your family are experiencing the same symptoms and if the symptoms seem to subside if you leave the house for a period of time."

Carbon monoxide is created every time you use a car or appliance which runs on a combustible fuel, such as gas, oil, charcoal, wood or kerosene. Normally, safe amounts of carbon monoxide are released by these appliances. However, when proper ventilation becomes blocked, the concentration can build-up.

Carbon monoxide enters your body through your lungs and combines with hemoglobin, the part of your blood that carries oxygen to your body's cells, and prevents it from absorbing oxygen. This blocks oxygen from reaching your tissues and organs—oxygen your body needs to survive.

The bond carbon monoxide creates with your bloodstream is extremely strong, making it difficult to eliminate any build-up in your body. This is why carbon monoxide can slowly

attack your body over a long period of time, and can be as serious as exposure to a high concentration level for a short amount of time.

Because of the slow attack carbon monoxide can take, it is important to equip your home to detect a build-up of carbon monoxide. The Consumer

Product Safety Commission recommends at least one carbon monoxide detector, which costs about \$30, per household. The following guidelines will assist you in inistalling your detector

- The detector should be placed in the bedroom or at least within hearing dis-
- tance from your sleeping area.You should try to install the detector at
- eye level or above. • Since carbon monoxide rises quickly,
- do not install a detector near the floor. • Install it at least five feet away from
- cooking appliances.A second detector could be placed near any fuel-burning appliances, fireplaces
- or your garage.If the detector goes off, immediately leave your house and call the local
- fire department. Do not re-enter your house until the fire department has informed you that it is safe to do so.

Stevens suggests that if you plan on taking an animal to visit a nursing home or long-term care facility, remember the following guidelines.

 Ask permission from a member of the staff or loved one and abide by any rules they may give you. All dogs should have some form of basic training, including exposure to loud, sudden noises, quick movements and rolling wheelchairs.

 Do not take your animal to a nursing home if it is aggressive towards other animals or people.

• Do not take pets to visit during meal times.



To The Parents of Students Enrolling Into Entry Level Primary (Kindergarten) in the Fall of 1998

The Rockcastle County Board of Education has been informed by the State Department of changes in the immunization requirements for school enrollment. Beginning with the school year 1998-99 all children enrolling into Entry Level Primary (Kindergarten) will be required to have 3 doses of the Hepatitis-B vaccine.

Many of the pre-schoolers have already received the required three doses of Hepatitis B vaccine. There are some children, however, who have either not received any doses or have not received all three doses of Hepatitis-B.

All students enrolling into Entry Level Primary in the fall of 1998 must present an immunization certificate showing the following vaccines:

DTP-4 doses with one of these doses being after age 4 or he/she will have to get a fifth dose.

Oral Polio-3 doses with one of these doses being after age 4 or he/she will have to get a fourth dose.

- MMR-2 doses
- Hepatitis B-3 doses

The students must also have a TB skin test certificate and a physical to be enrolled in school. Those students who have attended pre-school should have these records already one file. Be sure to check with the school to see if these records are within the time frames required by the State Department.

The Hepatitis-B vaccine is a 3-shot series that is given over a six-month period. Your child should be taken soon to the Health Department or to the Doctor to get the series started. Waiting until the summer will be too late to get all three shots before school starts.

By letting you know now about the Hepatitis-B vaccine requirement we hope that you can get the shots early so that there will be no problem with enrolling your child into Entry Level Primary.

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
