



Allowing Seniors to Make Their Own Health Care Choices

Imagine being forced into a government-knows-best health care plan. Sound familiar? It should. One of the Clinton Administration's first major legislative initiatives in 1993, attempted a federal takeover of our nation's private health care system. Fortunately, outraged Americans helped Republicians and moderate Democrats beat back this assault on market choice five years ago. Well, President Clinton's big government boys are at it again, and this time they're using Medicare to restrict a senior's right to contract with the doctor of their choice.

Through a cartly interpretation of the Medicare law, the Clinton Administration is forcing doctors to choose between participation in the Medicare program and treating seniors who, by their own choice, want to pay out-of-pocket for a medical service rather than bill Medicare. Under the President's rules, a doctor who contracts directly with a senior for medical care is banned from the Medicare

directly with a senior for medical care is banned from the Medicare program for two years.

By threatening to deny doctors the right to treat Medicare patients, the government is placing seniors between a rock and a hard place. Seniors who are newly enrolled in Medicare may find that their doctor of choice is no longer accepting me Medicare patients. They must either find a new doctor who is accepting Medicare patients, or they may decide to go to the physician they prefer and pay for services out-of-pocket. But remember, if a doctor participates in just one direct contract with a Medicare norlele, that physician is prohibited from serving any other senior using Medicare for two years. This basically climinates 96 percent of all doctors from participating in any direct contract with a Medicare eligible senior!

Not much of a choice, is it? In fact, the Congressional Budget

Office has predicted that "private contracting will almost never be

I see no reason why seniors should be prohibited from using their own judgment about health care when they turn 65. This is why, I last year, supported a provision in the Balanced Budget Act to repeal the section of the Medicare law that the Clinton Administration used to force doctors to choose between participating in Medicare and serving the patients who come to them for care. To my great dismay, the Clinton Administration threatened to veto the entire balanced budget agreement over this commonsense provi-

sion.

After the Clinton Administration rejected our proposal to repeal the private contracting ban, I joined with forty-six of my Senate colleagues in cosponsoring the Medicare Beneficiary freedom to Contract Act of 1997. This measure will allow doctors who file Medicare claims to enter into private contracts with seniors who want to use their own money to pay for their medical care. It along with other Senators concerned about the issues facility and America's senior citizens, am determined to fight to get this bill enacted into law this year.



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# Kentucky accepting applications for **Environmental Quality Incentives program**

David G. Sawyer, Kentucky State Conservationist for the Natural Re-sources Conservation Service (NRCS), an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), has announced the 1992 ranking period for the USDA's Envi-ronmental Quality Incentives Pro-gram (EQUE)

ranking peason and Quality Incentives Program (EQIP).

EQIP is a USDA program created by the 1996 Farm Bill to address agriculture's periority natural resource and environmental concerns. It reflects the commitment of USDA and the Congress for a flexible, effective, voluntary conservation program for agricultural land.

voluntary conservation program processing agricultural land member of the EQIP program proved to be a winner from the beginning, "stated Sawyer. "In less than a year, it has become one of the most popular conservation programs at USDA, not to mention the lasting environmental benefits. There is a strong demand for voluntary conservation efforts, and EQIP helps farmers meet that demand with financial, technical, and cial, technical, and ince." Sawyer said

Under EOIP, USDA can provide cost-share assistance to land users for up to 75 percent of the costs of certain environmental protection practices such as grassed waterways, filter strips, manure management facili-

ties, and wildlife habitat enhanceties, and wildlife habitat enhance-ment. USDA may also provide in-centive payments to encourage pro-ducers to apply selected land man-agement practices that are not cur-rently in use on their land. Total cost-share and incentive payments are limited to \$10,000 per

payments are limited to \$10,000 per person per year and \$50,000 for the length of the contract, which can run from five to ten years. The program is limited to persons who are engaged in livestock or agricultural produc-

tion.

For federal fiscal year 1998, Kentucky will receive \$2.89 million. Approximately 70 percent of this will be used in six locally identified priority areas and 30 percent will be used for other significant state wide natural resource concerns including water

quality, animal waste management, soil erosion and wildlife concerns. Funds will be distributed on a competitive basis. While the sign-up for EQIP is considered to be continuous, cut-off points will be identified where all applications received up to that

point will be scored according to gank-ing criteria. Applications with the most environmental benefits for pro-gram costs will receive the highest consideration for funding. Because of the limited funding, all counties may not receive funding.

The first ranking period will be from April 1, 1998, until May 29, 1998. All applications received through May 29 will be scored and ranked against each other. All funds are expected to expended during this ranking period and it is unlikely that there will be another ranking period in 1998.

# Wildlife habitat incentive program to receive \$24 million

On February 27, Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP) will receive \$32 million during FY 1998. Kentucky is expected to receive \$337 yoloo in financial assistance in 1998. The WHIP, administered by the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service, provide financial and technical assistance to help landowners improve fish and wildlife habitat on private lands. The WHIP allows each state to laid its program to ensure the greattailor its program to ensure the great-est benefits for threatened or endan-

east benefits for threatened or endan-gered habitats and/or animals. Kentucky's WHIP focuses on the restoration of Kentucky's native habi-tats that are in decline. These habitats that are in decline. These habitats successional habitat, wetlands and other habitats where threatened and endangered wildlife abide. Practices eligible for cost share assistance include native grass estab-lishment fewsy conversion tree.

assistance include native grass estab-lishment, feecue conversion, tree and shrub plantings, wetland creation, fencing for livestock exclusion from woodland and streams, alternative water, aquatic habitat restoration, wildlife watering ponds, and other practices. WHIP pays up to 75% cost

share to establish manage and main

snare to estudistin, manage and mani-tain these practices during a five to ten year cost share agreement period. WHIP sign-up will begin April 1, however, after that date a continuous sign-up for the WHIP is offered. Ap-plications must include more than the acres to ensure enough area than the acres to ensure enough area to noticeable habitat improvement. WHIP is a competitive program where applications are ranked ac-

cording to their environmental ben efits. Applications having the great-est benefit to wildlife habitat will receive cost share. Applications rank-ing periods will occur throughout the year as money is appropriated to Kentucky. The first application rank-ing period will extend from April 1 to

May 29. To ensure that your wildlife habitat improvement project receives consideration during the first ranking consideration during the first ranking period, sign up a your local Natural Resources Conservation Service of-fice or talk to your Jocal Kennucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources biologist between April 1 and May 29.

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



# Legislative Update

By State Rep. Danny Ford
A dramatic rise in the level of
activity at the State Capitol was evident early in the 10th week of the
General Assembly, Committee agendas lengthened, more bills were
passed; and the number of visitors to
the Capitol increased. Of the 275
House Bills passed so far this Season,
118 were passed in the first four days
of this week. Approximately onethird of the tour groups that have
visited the General Assembly since
January, did so during the first two sited the General Assembly since nuary, did so during the first two ceks of March. The halls of the Capitol will be very busy as an addi-tional one-hundred tours have been scheduled for the next couple of

weeks.
Legislative issues for the week reflected a wide range of suggested changes in our laws. Emergency telephone service was addressed in two bills. House Bill 560 requires that private telephone companies be able bills. House Bill 560 requires that private telephone companies be able to operate effective emergency service systems within three years and that they provide automatic number identification information for persons making emergency calls. House Bill 673 requires additional service of the emergency 911 system for cellular phones and allows for an additional charge of seventy cents per month on cellular phone bills for the additional enhanced emergency service costs.

Also relating to telephone service is

House Bill 582 which prohibits the switching of a customer from one to another telecommunications provider without the customer's written au-

without the customer's written au-thorization.

House Bill 327, which reduces blood alcohol concentration to .08 for purposes of DUI laws, also pro-vides for police officers to take an operator's license. First offenders will be issued temporary licenses for use until their court hearing, which is required to be held within twenty-one days. The bill passed by a vote of 90-4.

House Bill 490 moves the fiscal responsibility for transportation costs involved in moving juveniles from one facility to another, from the county to the state Department of Juvenile Justice. The actual transporting would continue to be carried out by the county sherifor jailer. The bill now avaits Senate action.

When House Bill 85 was called for consideration on the House Floor mid-week, it ended a long silent period on a very femotional issue in our society. The passage of HB 85 is the

most significant piece of legislation relating to the right of unborn chil-dren in this decade. It ended the long silent period in which bills to restrict dren in inst accaoe. I entoduced not give in the state of the best abortions have been introduced and then buried in the committee system never to be debated or be voted on by legislations. The debate on HB 85 lasted over five house and sone, a message from our citizens was ent back out from the General Assembly that the Commonwealth does reflect a sincer respect for the rights of the unborn.

Thirty-five amendmients were filled to HB 85 in an attempt by abortion proponents to either guit or mitigate the intentions of the bill. Thirteen of these amendments were called and debated before HB 85 passed by a vote of 75 to 17.5 pontsored by Representative Kate Stine of Northern Kentuck, yt HB 85 requires that women

resentative Katte Since of Northern Kentucky. HB 85 requires that women seeking an abortion must wait at least twenty-four hours after contacting a physician or clinic. During this period, the woman is to be given infor-mation and is required to sign a state-ment that she understands the abor-tion procedure, possible side effects, and adoption alternatives. The last measure restricting abor-tion to be signed into law in Ken-tucky was Senate Bill 136 during the 1994 legislative session. This legis-lation reduced consent requirements prior to a minor receiving an abortion

by requiring that only the minor and one parent or legal guardian, instead of both parents or legal guardian, would have to sign a consent form. With the House passage of HB 85, we are one step closer to further restricting abortions in Kentucky within the limits set forth by the United States Supreme Court. A second social and heavily emotional issue that was called and passed

ue that was called and in the House was House Bill 13. This bill would ban the recognition of marriages between two or more pe sons of the same ex. Such marriages are currently not recognized under Kentucky law, but other states have liberalized their laws on marriage and without the outright ban, Kentucky could be required to recognize such marriages that are legally performed in another state. After lengthy debate that kept the flouse in session until 1000 p.m. the bill passed on a vote of 84 to 9.

Other legislation that passed included provisions that will allow for the development of community trails sons of the same sex. Such marriages

the development of community trails along closed railways; increased medical services access for children; part time expansion capabilities for the parole board; juvenile curfews for citizens under the age of eighteen; and greater authority for the state to remove a child from the family in certain circumstances.





The greenhouse and float transplant production systems offer many advantages to tobacco transplant producers. A diligent sanitation program is a MUST! The media and water being used should be pathogen-free. All equipment and/fools that come in contact with the system should be pathogen-free! That means either new trays must be used or re-used trays must be properly

What is available to disinfect trays? Steam, methyl-bromide furmigation, chlorine-bleach, and quaternary ammonium chloride

Most studies indicate that the trays need to reach at least 160 degrees F for 30 minutes, but this method presents problems for farmers in developing equipment to meet the temperature and time required.
