



gun!
Perchance, if you were in the
Maretburg community last Friday
around 3:00 p.m. you may have recaround 3:00 p.m. you may have rec-opinized the mapping crew. We were the four people in the White Jeep Cherokee — three males and one female— who acted as though they were lost or having mechanical diffi-culties. The large magnetic signs on the side of the jeep reading "91 Survey Vehicle" may have tipped you off as to our identity! Now that we have made a "trial nun" and have reamed them; or so houses and asmapped twenty or so houses and as-signed addresses successfully, (or at

signed addresses successfully, (of at least we hope so) you'll be seeing us on a regular basis. Although I have been referring to this process as "mapping" it is also known as assigning "locatable ad-dresses." It involves a few pieces of moderately expensive equipmen sturdy vehicle, a driver and some trained to assign the addresses. It is a time consuming and tedious job, but one that pays off richly in informa-

tion that can be used by many agen-cies. As with any project of this magnitude, I was abit fearful until we went out last Friday and actually, mapped a road or two. In order that you may have a sense of just exactly what we did last week, I will briefly explain the process. There are three items that are cru-cial to the mapping crew. the Digital Measuring Instrument, which is coon-nected to the rear axle of the vehicle of the control of the control of the Digital Measuring Instrument is mounted inside the vehicle on the dash boardy, field glasses that are capable of measuring distances in feet, kilometers and yards (these ar-really mothing more than farey) bis coulars); and a laptop computer of the coulars of the control of the control of the safe from the U.S Postal Service into has been downloaded with a data base from the U.S Postal Service into which the addresses are entered. Once the crew has determined which road or segment of a rural route to map and the equipment has been checked f accuracy the process can begin. 

Toxicity Problems In Tobacco

excess amounts it causes a disorder
commonly referred to as manganese
toxicity. This usually occurs early
in the growing season just after
transplanting.

Visual symptoms of manganese toxicity are characterized by a light green or yellowish color between the vein and stunted growth. However, growth may be reduced by manganese toxicity even when the vein symptoms are not visible. On the symptoms are not visible to manganese toxicity is prevention. Once symptoms become visible in the field, damage has already occurred.

toccurred.

The use of large amounts of nitrogen fertilizers causes soil pH of one unit below the initial pH level. When soil pH drops below about 5.5, manganese toxicity may occur. Prevention may be as simple as annual soil testing and lime addition to bring soil to a pH of 6.4 to 6.6 ideally, lime should be applied at color allow time for lime to react, For this season, if a field has a

borderline pH of 5.8 to 6.4 and

borderline pH of 5.8 to 6.4 and time has not already been added to correct this problem, then consider the following practices to reduce manganese toxicity.

Band 80 to 90 percent of the nitrogen fertilizer, at least 10 to 12 tinches from the tobacco row ten days after transplanting. This separates the bulk of acid-forming fertilizer from young plant roots. Use ammonium nitrate instead of UREA.

Apply molybdenum in setter

### Court will have to decide which is best way to feed prisoners during renovation

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court discussed the ongoing jail renovation and expansion project at length Tuesday, during their regular

monthly meeting.

Rockcastle County Jailer Joe
Howard told the court that it would
soon be time to tear out the old kitchen,
making it necessary to come up with a plan to feed the prisioners.

The court had originally agreed to temporarily move the kitchen to

another part of the courthouse, while the renovation was taking place. But, Howard said that if the kitchen is moved the state was re-quiring that a new exhaust fan be installed. "That would be expensive," Howard said.

The only two options for the court
is to have food brought in for the
inmates or to take them out and feed
them. "That would also be expensive," Howard said.

Construction site foreman, Billy Curtis told the court it would be about two weeks before they had to make a final decision. The court discussed the matter for a few minutes and them tabled any decision for about two weeks.

(the court) wanted him to pay any of
the current outstanding jail bills, they
would have to transfer money from
the general fund. But, executive secretary Anna Rose Mullins told the

"We have enough money to meet our obligations in the general trub, but we may need to wait and see how much we have to put in the jail fund," she told the court. Clontz said there was enough money in the jail fund to make this week's payroll and that the jail may receive some more money for holding state prisioners. So the court did not move any more money into the move any more money into the

So far this year, the court has transferred \$84,000 into the jail fund

from the general fund. Carloftis told the court that once Carlofis told the court that once the jail project was completed and the county could house more state and federal prisoners, the jail would pay its way and more. The jail project is slated to be completed in October. In other action the court voted to pay an \$8,000 bill owed Western Rocksatle Water Association for work at the new industrial park last fall.



### The Real Facts About Our Finances

According to an advertisement in last week's Signal, our county judge seems to be blaming county judges and magistrates for the past 26 years for the disastrous financial condition our county finds itself in. That's four former county judges -- three of whom are now deceased -- and numerous magistrates that are somehow being held responsible. He also seems to be blaming me, who has never been a county judge or a magistrate or had a vote on county business. Yet, no where in the advertisement was I able to find where our county judge accepted any responsibility himself for our financial predicament, even though he has been county judge for the past 4 1/2 years.

In that same advertisement, our county judge seems to claim to have raised your taxes to save you money, a statement that most poeple would find incredible. (That kind of addition and subtraction would get us a failing grade in our arithmetic class). The FACT is that the state does not set the tax rate for counties. It simply says that a county's budget must be balanced and leaves to the county the method for balancing it. When our county judge said, 'I did my duty to save you money, what he meant was, I voted to raise your taxes. And, folks, in my mind, going broke and laying a heavy tax on the people is not moving forward.

As to the statement made about the courthouse annex...I am told by responsible officials in Frankfort that the county gets paid by the state to cover the annex debt.

Revenue Sharing: The disastrous financial condition of our county is not due to the loss of Revenue Sharing money. You will recall that Revenue Sharing was instituted July 1, 1971 during the administration of the late Richard Nixon. It was discontinued in the mid 1980's...long, long before my opponent became county judge.

As to the housing of juvenile delinquents...It would seem logical that the addition to the jail -- now under construction -- should have contained a place to house juvenile offenders. I am told, however, that it does not. This means that Rockcastle County will still have to pay large bills to other counties to house our juvenile offenders -- a condition that caused Clark County (Winchester) to sue us for nonpayment just a few months ago. I never remember our county being sued before by another county.

I believe you all know me as a positive campaigner. I have tried very hard to conduct a positive campaign and am still trying to do so. But, when inaccuracies abound to the extent they have in my opponent's articles for the past two weeks, it is only fair to you -- and me -- that I try to clear things up. That's what this article is about.




