



If a Livingston Fire Truck was left astigockeastle Hospital there would not be an operator there to operate the truck. Mt. Vernon Fire Dept, has excellent truck operators, but they are not familiar with our truck court of the truck of the controls, as we are not with theirs. If there was a fire anywhere else in Mt. Vernon, the truck would be sitting there unless compromising fire protection.




Tiger Pause

The team teachers came up with the theme, along with other pri-mary teachers at their school, as a way to connect the new primary DWoK module, What's Up in Our Neighborhood, with the module they'd been using, America's Family

they'd been using, America's Family Stories.

"We were very excited to use the new module," says Ponder. "We decided to take the theme of neighborhood past and present and officus on the animals and plants they proceed to the control of the control of the process of the control of the contr and the U.S. as a chronicle of diverse people, and a variety of art forms. Students wrote research papers and published facts and articles in their class magazine, "New\$flash." For heir research students were required to read at least two different sources (including encyclopedias, library books, magazines, and the Internet) from which they built a folder of facts. Students combined their facts to create a classroom library on animal topics. Connecting art with science, students sketched animals and

plants they observed in nature and later made three-dimensional paper mache models of them. As a culmination, students adopted the abandoned Alumni Garden on the Brodhead Elementary campus. They planted trees and flowers that they heave would attract local animals. They invited alumni of Brodhead Elementary dating back to the 1950s to a garden gelebration. Field trips to Eastern Kentucky University and materials for this intensive project were paid for by an art grant the Brodhead teachers received from the Rockeastle Arts and Humanities Council. "A professional goal for me has been to apply for an art grant," says Ponder. This was challenging for me because I had never gone the extra step to write out my plans in a grant form. I'm glad idd til."

"I've gained valuable insight by doing this project. Teaching through the arts is very challenging and at the same time creates a sense of good same time creates a sense of good feelings that promotes high self-es-teem for all involved. I've come to realize that students learn best when realize that students learn best when their projects are meaningful, con-nected to the arts, and tied to an instructional theme. I'm grateful for the support of Allen Pensol and our principal Mark McKinney, both of whom helped make this v learning experience possible for the

children."

Former prosecutor has another day in court

Former Rockcastle County Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael, who is currently in Carmichaet, who is currently in the federal prison at Manchester will have another day in court on Friday, May 14 when he begins civil proceedings to retain his sal-

The disqualified prosecutor also has a scheduled hearing in Laurel Circuit Court on several motions in the state's case against him to decrease the salary he continues to draw.

Several motions, including a motion to dismiss, will be heard by Laurel Circuit Judge Roderick Messer, who was appointed as a

special judge in the case. The hear-ing begins at 1 p.m. Carmichael, who was con-victed by a federal jury on charge of attempting to extort at least \$50,000, is acting as his own law-yer, although he has been dis-barred.

In his counter claim, he is ask-

ing to keep his salary and is also seeking \$45,000 to cover expenses he incurred during his legal travils

last year.

He filed a motion to dismiss an Attorney General's civil action asking that his \$81,210 salary be

reduced while he That motion will be heard during the May 14 hearing.

Carmichael maintained in his

motion that there is no cause of action to support the attorney general's claim.

He also argued that the law serving as the basis for the attor-ney general's claim does not pro-vide that a civil action can be

Carmichael presented the ar-gument that it would be necessary to have a judge from another cir-cuit appointed to review the com-

He maintained that if the Attorney General's complaint was sucessful, the sitting circuit judge would have to be named as a de-fendant in the matter. Since a judge cannot review a case in which he is a defendant, Carmichael says another judge would have to be appointed.

His last argument in support of dismissing the claim was that Pulaski Circuit court does not have ruissiction to remove him as Commonwealth Attorney-some-thing he says the Attorney Gen-eral is seeking to accomplish. In the document seeking \$45,000 for legal expenses, Carmichael said while he was performing his duties as Commonwealth's Attorney, he was allegedly involved in certain acts which resulted in an indictation. ment dated the 12th day of August, 1997."





have to learn to live with it. Earlier breeding is one way to do that. At the University of Kenucky's Research and Education Center in Princeton, a study was conducted by starting the breeding program a month earlier, on April 20. From April 20 to May 20, there were 17 of 20 cowes successfully re-bred. From May 20 to June 20, 17 of 21 were re-bred. Then from June 20 of, only 8 of 16, or 50%, of the cows were successfully re-bred. That certainly supports the thesis that an earlier beginning to the breeding program is better. UK is continuing to look at the experiment, but it is believed that the previous year's data will be repeated.

begin his breeding program earlier? Many people don't want their cows

Many people don't want their cows to calve in February because of the cold but February is really not much colder than March and it may be less muddy, which would be an advantage during calving time. February is also a less busy month for most farming activities which would be an advantage. Also, if the calves were born earlier, the farmer would have increased weating weight in the fall, because the calves would be a month older. By starting the breeding season in early May, his would give cows 2 heat cycles, or 2 chances, to get bride before how weather sets in Farmers may consider these facts as they plan next years calf cropy.

5. The proceeds of the sale shall first be applied to the costs of this action, including sale costs and attorney liess.


6. Unpaid taxes grillens of record at the time of entry of judgment shall be paid out of the proceeds of the sale.
