The Mt. Vernon City Council will
once again try to pass a final reading
of an ordinance that will tax the wages
of employees and the profits of businesses inside the city limit.
The ordinance calls for a half
cent of every dollar tax on the wages
and profits to go to the city each

Mrs. Kirby then requested that there be no examination of anyone's private records, unless it was ordered by the district or circuit court, after sait was brought by the city.

Mrs. Kirby said the employees at Infage Enry, were already paying a one percent fee back to Image Enry and that she did not think it was fair, because Image Enry is the only fac-tory the city will collect the sar from. Mrs. Kirby then asked the council to amend the ordinance in an effort to keep city limit employee from being double taxed.

She said the county may pass a similar tax some day and people should not have to pay the tax twice and should get credit from the city.

That request also was defeated in the same manner as the previous two requests.

She said she thought that the tax should be collected on the amount of wages after social security, fed-eral, state, medicare and five percent of 401K plans are deducted. # **Shirley Smith** lambastes Fiscal Court, Judge

By: Richard Anderkin Rockcastle County Sheriff Shirley Smith lambasted the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and Rockcastle Indge Executive Buzz Carlofits Tuesday during the monthly Rockcastle Fiscal Court meeting.

Smith's comments came during a Smith scomments came during a fifteen minute exchange with the County Judge and centered around a \$2,100 reimbursement to the Sheriff's office from the fiscal court for the

transportation of juvenile prisoners.

Smith told the fiscal court that they had never helped him during his ten years in office and that it had gotten especially worse the last three

gotten especially worse the last three years,
The \$2,100 reimbursement apparently dates back as far as 1996.
"Nobody cares about the law mit they need them," Smith said.
Carloftis took exception to smith's comments, saying the court always supported the Shernf's office, and that ultimately any shorrful always supported the Shernf's office, but that ultimately any shorrful be that ultimately any shorrful be made up by the fiscal court. "Under state law, the bucks stops here," Carloftis said.
The Judge said that actually him-

Carloftis said.

The Judge said that actually himself and the magistrates would be held personally responsible for short-slist. If they did not take action to see that money was available to cover them. That is why we had to pass the insurance tax or we could have landed in jail, he said.

The Judge also told Smith that the county had always paid the insurance tax or the county had always paid the insurance tax

to \$3,600.

He also pointed out that the Sheriff's office was required by law to haul juvenile prisoners and that the fiscal court did not have to reimburse

fiscal court did not have to reimburs him, but that they always had.
But Smith said he thought it was unfair that the fiscal court pay their janitors more than he was able to pay his deputies and that the fiscal court bought the county road workers uniforms and provided some of them with vehicles to drive back and forth

He also said he had recently paid

\$7,000 out of his pocket for three police cruisers and had put \$1,200 into his payroll account from his care account to meet expenses.

"There has never been a foot i, has done what I've done and there never will be," Smith said.

"When I first ran for office, all I head was that ith lastly had been the county out of a lot of money and now that you got an honest man in office, you won't help him," Smith told the fiscal court.

"I've had ten years of clean audits from the state and I'm getting tired of you guys "hoodooing" me," Smith

said.

Before the conversation began between the Judge and the Sheriff, the fiscal court had already unanimously voted to pay the reimbursement of the \$2,100 when money be-

the Sheriff also told the Judge that if the county did not wa for the insurance on his cars for the insurance on his that was fine with him.

that was fine with him.

However, the Judge pointed out
that he did not say the county did not
want to pay the insurance he merely
said that they do pay it.

But during the conversation
Rockcastle Jailer James Miller and
County Treasurer Joe Clontz told
Smith that the jail fund would pay
him after they received money from

Smith that the jail fund would pay him after they received money from the state for housing prisoners. Clontz said it would probably be by the 15th of February.

After the discussion between the Judge and Sheriff the court passed the Sheriff 2000 operating budget of \$187,000. That was an increase of \$15,000 from a year ago. Depuy Sheriff Sonya Prewist said the increase was based on higher projectly assessments and number of new homes being built in 1822,000 more erry assessments and number of new homes being built in the county. The budget also included \$24,000 more for deputy salaries

deputy salaries. After the meeting, the Judge pointed out several other expenses paid by the county for the Sheriff's office.

They include: one hundred percent of employers share of retirement, workers compensat

County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis is concerned that every household in Rockcastle County re-spond to the Census 2000 question-naires, and that they accurately rep-resent their family in the responses. According to the last census (1990), Rockcastle County was able to count

approximately 15,000 residents. Because much of a county's funding depends upon the number of people residing within a county, it is extremely important that every person be counted.

"I realize that a lot of people don't want the federal government know-ing anything about them, but they are often the same people who complain about roads and other services. The

government has been counting Americans since 1790, and this is the way we can increase our services." Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis said. Many in the county believe our numbers have grown - especially when you consider that we have sudens seruloted in suchool. This would mean that 1.349 preschooled in which out the county. This could be correct, but it would mean that we have an unusually high number of registered adults in Rockcastle County.





But consumer protection officials say, athores shopping is not without risk; Whether consumers are ordering roducts or services from a telemarketer, a directional advertiser, a deterision shopping or a door-to-door salesperson, they need to know their rights, understand the risks and know where to call for recourse if something goes wrong with the purchase. Here are a few



tips to help making shopping from home safer.

\* Know who you're dealing with. Shop from rendors you know to be legitimate. There's no fail-safe wally to check up on an unfamiliar safe, but you might be able to get information from friends, the state Attorney General's office or the Better Business Bureau.

\* Protect your privacy.

\* Protect your privacy. Towide personal information only if you know it's going to be used. Do not give out bank account numbers or credit card numbers to less make the call you. Give out account numbers only to companies that you contact.

\* Think it through. Don't act on impulse or buckle under to high pressure tactics.

\* Know what you're buying. Get a complete description of all terms of the transaction, including abluption policies if you're not satisfied.

\* Pay the safest way. A credit card offers the most consumer protections, including a \$50 liability limit for unauthorized charges.

Seek help if you run into a problem. If you can't resolve your problem by working directly with the company, contact the state Attorney General's office, the Better Business Bureau or the Federal Trade Commission's toll-free helpline at 1-877-FTC-HELP (382-4357).

Thus, the accused is given the shaft. In 1999, eight people on dear row in the United State were found innocent of the crimes for which they had been convicted. Since 1973, eighty-four people have been exon-erated after they had spent an average of 7.5 years on death row. How can these people and their loved ones be compensated for such gross injus-

tice?
The severity of punishment for the same offensive varies considerably from one locality to another. The South accounts for 80% of the executions carried out in this country. In 1999, Kansas had two people on death row while Texas led the country with 433

Senator Finegold recently re-marked, "We are a nation that pricely itself on the fundamental principles of justice, liberty, equality and due process. We are one of the first nations to speak out against torture and killings by foreign governments. It is time for us to look in the mirror. Leaders of the European Community have asked this proud nation to stop the practice of the death penalty. Our politicians like to appear to be fough on crime," each party trying

"tough on crime," each party trying to look a little more tougher than the

other, so we wind up with a system of injustice. It's time for a change.

We must expand our thinking on this matter and modify our behavior in approaching a more equitable and

1 On Thursday, January 27, 2000, the American Legacy Foundation released the 1999 National Youth Tobacco Survey (NYTS) data measuring use of all forms of tobacco among middle and high school students at the Healthy People 2010 Conference in Washington, D.C. The American Legacy Foundation in Collaboration with the CDC Foundation conducted the survey. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention provided scientific and technical assistance.

The NYTS is the first-ever study to measure the prevalence of current tobacco use among middle school students and to document the emerstudents and to document the emer-gence of bedis (also called beedis) and kreteks (also called clove ciga rettes) use among middle and high school students

Additional findings are as follows:

About one in 10 (9.2 percent) middle school students and more than a quarter (28.4 percent) of high school students were current cigarette smok-

students were current cigarette smokers.

• Cigars were the second most preferred tobacco product used by middle and high school students 6.1 percent reported smoking eigars in the past mouth. African American middle school students (8.3 percent) were significantly more likely to were significantly more likely to smoke cigars than white students (4.9 percent). Cigar use among high school students was 15.3 percent. An estimated one in five male students (4.9 percent) past year.


